


Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and Our Lady of Loreto Parish PRAYER FOR PARISH SPIRITUAL RENEWAL

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

LENTEN REGULATIONS FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Lenten fast and abstinence regulations for the Diocese of Worcester are as follows:

- Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics fourteen (14) years of age and older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- ◆ Fasting is to be observed by all Catholics who are eighteen (18) years of age but not yet fifty-nine (59) years of age on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed Lenten penitential practices.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

DEAR FRIENDS,

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent and on this Sunday traditionally the Church covers statues and crucifixes. Why is this done? Covering crosses, statues and images or "veiling" with unadorned violet opaque cloths. It is an older custom of the Church that remains an option even to this day. The exact era it began no one is sure, but the origins seem to come from a medieval tradition of the "hunger cloth" which was a huge violet cloth hung in front of the altar to keep the congregation from viewing the altar. Originally Lent was a time that public sinners were "banished" from the church and had to do a public display of penance. Over time the understanding that everyone is a sinner prevailed and sinners were no longer restricted from the liturgy in church, but the hunger cloth gave all attending a "fast of the eyes." The cloths over time changed to smaller sizes and with more decorations.

The actual covering of images came later, perhaps continuing that theme of "fasting of the eyes."

At the end of the thirteenth century Bishop William Durandus of Mende (Southern France) explained this custom by the fact that Christ veiled his divinity during his passion. Durandus saw this explanation as implied in the Gospel passage which read: "But Jesus hid himself and left the temple" (John 8:59). The Church is reminding us of Jesus' humiliation and thus to imprint the image of the crucified Christ more deeply on our hearts.

In these last two weeks of Lent, let us make a more concerted effort to draw closer to our Lord Jesus in His suffering and death so that we can experience the true joy and freedom from the lasting effects of sin that Easter brings!

Scrutinies: Examining our lives

The primary way that the Catholic Church assists the catechumens (called the elect after the celebration of the Rite of



Election on the First Sunday of Lent) in the conversion process during Lent is through the celebration of the rites called Scrutinies. These ritual celebrations on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent are communal prayers celebrated around the elect to strengthen them to overcome the power of sin in their lives and to grow in virtue. To scrutinize something means to examine it closely. The community does not scrutinize the catechumens; the catechumens scrutinize their own lives and allow God to scrutinize them and to heal them.

All of us are called to continuing conversion throughout our lives, so we join with the elect in scrutinizing our own lives and praying to God for the grace to overcome the power of sin that still infects our hearts.

Every Catholic should spend some time reflecting on what obstacles to gospel living exist in his or her own life. Then when the Scrutinies are celebrated, we will all know that the prayers are for us as well as for the elect.

Taking seriously this dynamic of scrutiny and conversion gives us a richer perspective on Lenten "giving up." What we are to give up more than anything else is sin, which is to say we are to give up whatever keeps us from living out our baptismal promises fully. Along with the elect we all need to approach the season of Lent asking ourselves what needs to change in our lives if we are to live the gospel values that Jesus taught us. Our journey through these forty days should be a movement ever closer to Christ and to the way of life He has exemplified for us.

This year, during the next three Sundays, March 12th, 19th, and 23rd. we at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel & Our Lady of Loreto Parish, will join with Catechumen/Elect, Mylinh Nguyen and candidate, Brad Germain, who are continuing their journey to becoming members of the Catholic Church or continuing their initiation, in celebrating these scrutinies.

RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

"Abortion Distortion": When is a child a child? This was a headline in an article that appeared recently in the National Catholic Register. This was a true event that occurred in Massachusetts. In the Commonwealth v Peter Ronchi, the defendant stabbed and killed his pregnant girlfriend a week before her due date. Her unborn child also died, not from stab wounds, but from loss of blood circulation from the mother. The defendant was convicted of two counts of first-degree murder and given two consecutive life sentences. The trial court's instructions to the jury were "killing is not murder unless a human being is killed". A viable fetus is a human being under the law of homicide. Then why is the killing of a viable fetus by abortion not a crime of homicide? This is the "abortion distortion", one norm when it comes to abortion and a different norm when it comes to everything else. Harry Blackman in the 1973 Roe V Wade decision said the word "person" does not include the unborn. In 1981, The MA Supreme Judicial Court recognized the essential, fundamental right of "choice" in abortion. A homicide occurs when the defendant causes the victim's death with intent to kill or reckless regard for life. This describes every abortion! The infliction of injuries on a pre-born baby resulting in death is a homicide. Then why is the murderous act of abortion not a homicide? This is an untenable and illogical situation. The only difference is the mother's approval. The notion that life begins at viability is an unscientific assertion invented by Harry Blackburn to effect a political settlement of a moral crisis. The definition of human life then becomes entirely subjective. These two principles do not connect logically. There should be no double standard. Life exists from conception to natural death!




