Each year on November 9th the Church throughout the world celebrates the Feast of the Dedication of the St. John Lateran Basilica in Rome. While it may seem a bit out of place to celebrate the dedication of a church in Rome here in Watertown, the Lateran Basilica is the official church of the Bishop of Rome and the Bishop of Rome is none other than Pope Leo XIV. The Feast reminds us that we are all one Church and the parishes of our Collaborative, St. Patrick and Sacred Heart are connected to and part of this one Church. Our First Reading for the weekend from the Prophet Ezekiel has the image of the Prophet standing at the Temple where water flows on all sides. As Catholics and Christians, we see the water representing the spread of the Gospel as well as the Sacramental life of our Church, particularly Baptism, the Eucharist, and Reconciliation. When Ezekiel speaks of the waters making things fresh and able to grow, giving food for the hungry and making all things new, we are reminded of the importance of our outreach as a faith community. Though Ezekiel was speaking about five hundred years before the Birth of Christ, his words summarize Jesus' final commandment to his followers to "Go out and teach all nations, Baptizing them in the name of the father, and Son, and Holy Spirit, teaching them all, I command." The commands of Jesus we hear in the Gospels call us to be disciples, grow in faith, and be the presence of Christ for others, all of which our parishes help us to do.

We are approaching our Grand Annual Collection, a time that is good for us to reflect on what it means to be a parish today. We can look at the challenges of our time and view St. Patrick and Sacred Heart as an oasis or the calm in the storm, but that is not the call of Christ.
