FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parish Family,

Laetare Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Lent, calls us to rejoice amid our penitential season. The very word "Laetare" means "rejoice," reminding us that even as we journey through the challenges and sacrifices of Lent, God calls us to remember the joy that awaits us. Our Gospel reading today is one of the most beloved parables ever told by Jesus: the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:1-3, 11-32). We encounter three key figures—the younger son, the older son, and the loving father. Each character offers us an invitation to reflect on our own journey of faith and our relationship with God.

The younger son's story is one of recklessness. He demands his inheritance from his father and leaves home, squandering his wealth on a life of indulgence. It is not until he finds himself destitute, hungry, and humiliated in a distant land that he comes to his senses. This moment of conversion, born out of desperation, is one we can all relate to. How often do we, too, find ourselves spiritually impoverished because we have chosen our own way over God's way?

But the most remarkable part of this story is not the son's return, but the father's response. Instead of anger or reproach, the father sees his son from afar and runs to embrace him. This loving father does not wait for explanations or apologies, he rushes to show mercy. In this way, the father in the parable mirrors the heart of God, who welcomes us back whenever we turn toward Him.

As we reflect on the father's extravagant mercy, we must also consider the reaction of the older son. His heart is filled with bitterness, unable to rejoice in his brother's return. He represents those of us who sometimes struggle to forgive and let go of resentment. His sense of justice is clouded by self-righteousness, and he misses the joy of reconciliation. The father's gentle invitation to the older son challenges us to examine our own hearts and see if we harbor any unwillingness to forgive or celebrate the mercy shown to others. This parable calls us to conversion not only from the reckless ways of the younger son, but also from the pride and jealousy of the older son. Both sons are in need of transformation.

Perhaps you find yourself identifying with the younger son, having wandered far from God and yearning to come home. Or maybe you resonate with the older son, feeling overlooked despite your faithfulness.

As we celebrate this joyful Sunday, let us also consider how we, as a community, can mirror the father's mercy. Are we quick to welcome back those who have strayed and invite those we know to live more fully? Do we rejoice when someone finds their way home, or do we hold onto old grudges?

God's mercy is deeper than any mistake, and His joy at your return is greater than any resentment. May we, like the father in the parable, run to meet those who seek reconciliation and embrace them with love and mercy.



What is Laetare Sunday?

The fourth Sunday of Lent is called **Laetare** Sunday. Instead of **purple**, the altar and priest are dressed in **pink** or **rose**. This is similar to Gaudete Sunday during Advent, a day of rejoicing during a time of reflection and penance. The name comes from the words in Latin at the start of mass: "Laetare Jerusalem" — "Rejoice, O Jerusalem."

There is a tradition of visiting the church of your baptism, also called your "mother church," on this Sunday.

Ask a family member to tell you a story about where a grandparent was baptized, or a notable baptism story in the family!
