FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parish Family,

The story of Martha and Mary speaks profoundly to the challenges we face in our world. Its depth continues to unfold, offering fresh insights into our spiritual lives, especially concerning the sneaky traps of comparison and judgment.

Martha is diligent and dedicated. Her intentions are noble, her efforts commendable. She's serving, working, and making sure everything is perfect for Jesus. Then we see Mary, quietly seated at the feet of Jesus, absorbing every word He utters. Here lies the heart of the tension: Martha's frustration boils over as she compares her laborious service with Mary's seemingly inactive devotion.

How often do we find ourselves looking around and judging the choices of those around us? Living in an interconnected, social media-driven culture, this tendency is amplified to an unprecedented degree. We are inundated with curated glances into the lives of other people. Their achievements, their travels, their seemingly perfect families, their effortless successes. It's easy to scroll through feeds and feel inadequate. At the same time, it's just as easy to fall into the trap of judgment, silently critiquing another's choices because they don't align with our understanding of what is right.

Martha's frustration with Mary wasn't rooted in Mary's lack of love for Jesus, but in Martha's perception of how Mary expressed that love. Martha felt unseen in her efforts, and she projected that feeling onto Mary, believing she was derelict in her duty. The subtle danger of comparison is that it blinds us to the unique gifts and callings of others. It shifts our focus from our journey with God to an external, superficial evaluation of others' journeys.

Jesus' gentle response to Martha is key. Jesus doesn't invalidate Martha's service. He acknowledges her worry and distraction while also affirming Mary's choice, highlighting the profound importance of prioritizing the spiritual nourishment that comes from being truly attentive to His word.

This passage is an invitation for each of us to pause and reflect. What is our "better part"? What is our unique calling from God? It might be active service, like Martha, but perhaps in a different form. It might be a contemplative life, like Mary, nurturing a deep spiritual well. Or, more likely, it's a beautiful blend of both, adapting to the seasons of our lives and the specific needs of our communities. The Church thrives precisely because its members live out their faith in various ways.

When we trust that others are also seeking God, also trying to live out their faith, we can release the need to scrutinize and critique their every move. We can replace judgment with charity, with understanding, and with prayer.

If we can reorient our gaze back to Christ and to the unique path He has laid out for each of us, nurturing our own relationship with Him can help us discern our "better part." This will free us from the draining weight of resentment and inadequacy as we dive into a deeper appreciation for the diverse tapestry of faith that enriches our Church, enabling us to become more accepting, loving, and Christ-like.

Pope Leo XIV writes:

In proclaiming the Kingdom of God, Jesus often used the image of the seed. [...] Seeds are buried in the earth, and there, to our wonder, life springs up, even in the most unexpected places, pointing to the promise of new beginnings. We can think, for example, of flowers springing up on our roadsides from seeds that landed there almost by chance. As those flowers grow, they brighten the gray tarmac and even manage to break through its hard surface.

In Christ, we too are seeds, and indeed, "seeds of peace and hope."

'Till & Keep'

The first book of the Bible, Genesis, tells the story of God's creation from the very beginning. There, it says that people must 'till and keep' the land. Pope Francis started World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation ten years ago, saying: 'Tilling' refers to cultivating, ploughing or working, while 'keeping' means caring, protecting, overseeing and preserving.




