A REFLECTION BY FR. WILLIAM HERIC

Dear Friends in Christ,

The month of October this year is full of several graced-filled opportunities for the Catholic Church far and near. October is "Respect Life Month" when we reaffirm the sanctity of all life from the moment of conception to natural death. That is an ongoing issue for the church and one that requires deep prayer.



October is also the **"Month of the Rosary,"** a powerful prayer indeed. A reminder that a group regularly meets at St. Bridget's on Wednesdays at 5:30 pm to pray the rosary together. All are welcome!

This October is also the much anticipated "Synod on Synodality" in Rome, attended by 478 bishops, priests, sisters, and laymen and women. Our own Archbishop Paul Etienne is a delegate to the synod. So, what's it all about? The document Instrumentum Laboris which will guide the work of the delegates asks a wide range of questions focused on how the Church can foster communion, strengthen participation, and carry out its mission. Topics considered include caring for creation, ecumenism, the participation of the baptized in the life of the Church, the role of women, and the inclusion of marginalized groups, as well as considerations around leadership and decision-making at the local, national, and global levels.

These are topics we have prayerfully discussed in our own synod listening sessions. They are at the heart of the "Partners in the Gospel" planning process to renew Catholic life through a reorganization of the parishes to which we belong. We are in the public phase when the people of our parishes are asked to offer their input and feedback on the proposed draft of families that will come together on July 1, 2024. Last weekend, I announced that our proposed family for St. Bridget's is to join with Assumption and Our Lady of the Lake parishes. The initial feedback has been positive, but it's time to go deeper.

So, our **next synod gathering** to consider our proposed family of parishes will be this **Sunday, October 1**, following our 9:30 am Mass. There will be another opportunity on **Tuesday, October 3** at 7:00 pm. Please consider attending to offer your feedback about our proposed family. What excites you about it? What concerns you? What alternatives would you propose? Your voice matters and will be considered in the final makeup of the family. Thanks!

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Towards a Listening Church SYNOD Q & A

What is a Synod?

The Church is in Synod! The word "synod" literally means "on the way together," and refers to a gathering of the Church for discernment or decision-making.

Who is part of the Synod?

This Synod is unprecedented in the breadth of participation. In the fall of 2021 and the winter and spring of 2022, millions of people all over the world participated in listening sessions—the widest consultation of the people of God, and indeed of the human family, in history. In our own Archdiocese of Seattle, 11,000 people took part in listening sessions, in their parishes or online. In October 2023, laypeople as well as bishops will serve as official delegates to the Synod—a first. Our own Archbishop Paul D. Etienne was named a delegate by Pope Francis. He will be one of 363 voting delegates, including about 20 Americans, in Rome in October, 2023.

What documents has the Synod produced?

The Synod is more about the experience of listening to one another and to the Holy Spirit than it is about documents. Indeed, the preparatory documents for the Synod stated: "The purpose of the Synod... is not to produce documents, but to plant dreams, draw forth prophecies and visions, allow hope to be nourished, inspire trust, bind up wounds, weave together relationships, awaken a dawn of hope, learn from one another, and create a bright resourcefulness that will enlighten minds, warm hearts, (and) give strength to our hands." That being said, the Synod has created a number of significant documents, at the local, the national, and the worldwide levels. Each round of consultation has produced a synthesis document, which in turn have informed further listening.

What happens next?

All of the work that has happened to this point has prepared the way for the gatherings of delegates in Rome in October of 2023. The work of the delegates will be guided by the *Instrumentum Laboris* for the Synod. What happens next depends on their deliberations. We know that the Synod will continue into a second session in October of 2024.



What will be talked about?

The Instrumentum Laboris which will guide the work of the delegates this fall asks a wide range of questions focused on how the Church can foster communion, strengthen participation, and carry out its mission. Topics considered include caring for creation, ecumenism, the participation of the baptized in the life of the Church, the role of women, and the inclusion of marginalized groups, as well as considerations around leadership and decision-making at the local, national, and global levels. Ultimately, the focus of this synod is synodality itself: how can we walk together more effectively? How can our decision-making processes engage the whole people of God? How can we listen to one another and to the Holy Spirit more intentionally? How can we overcome polarization and divisions and walk together without erasing difference, but holding them in creative tension?

Where can I find out what's happening at the Synod this October?

The Synod Assembly is likely to be widely covered in the media. It is important to choose reliable sources, as many popular media outlets will likely focus on any controversial topics that are discussed, possibly losing sight of the big picture: the Synod is not about a single topic, but rather about how we walk together as Church in every aspect of life and ministry. What can we do now?

As individuals or in parishes, this is a good time to read, reflect on, and discuss the *Instrumentum Laboris* and the other documents the Synod has produced so far. Above all, let us pray for the Synod, that the delegates in Rome may listen deeply to one another, and most especially, to the Holy Spirit!

radical solidarity

In the Gospel of John, shortly before he is to suffer his Passion, Jesus proclaims to his disciples: "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (Jn 13:34). And it is love for one another that Jesus says will be the identifying characteristic of his disciples.

The Church's entire social doctrine is guided by the fundamental principle that every human life has innate dignity and incomparable value: "Every human being is the object of God's infinite tenderness, and he himself is present in their lives." As disciples of Christ, we are called to make a sacrificial gift of ourselves for the sake of our neighbor, for "to love someone is to desire that person's good and to take effective steps to secure it."²

Fulfilling Christ's command to love one another takes shape in our practice of solidarity. Solidarity is the means by which we put our love for others into action, making the good of others our own. Solidarity "is not a feeling of vague compassion or shallow distress at the misfortunes of so many people... On the contrary, it is a firm and

John 13:34

persevering determination to commit oneself to the common good...to the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all."

In reaction to the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*, some areas of the country now protect the child in the womb, while others are doing all they can to increase access to abortion. At this critical moment, we have been entrusted with new *opportunities* and new *responsibilities* to build a civilization of authentic love. Our culture claims to offer women so-called "choice," but ultimately abandons mothers to make tragic and painful decisions alone. We must lead the way in showing the alternative: "*In firmly rejecting 'pro-choice' it is necessary to become courageously 'pro woman,' promoting a choice that is truly in favor of women.* ... The only honest stance,

in these cases, is that of radical solidarity with the woman. It is not right to leave her alone." 4

Experience shows that when a mother is supported, "she is even capable of heroism."⁵ Radical solidarity compels us to come alongside vulnerable mothers in profound friendship, compassion, and support for both them and their

preborn children. It requires us to address the fundamental challenges that lead an expectant mother to believe she is unable to welcome the child God has entrusted to her. We must do all we can to provide mothers, children, and families with the support they need to flourish. This cannot be accomplished by laws or policy alone, but requires the continual transformation of our own hearts, recognizing in every person the face of Christ, and placing their needs before our own.

Radical solidarity "refers to something more than a few sporadic acts of generosity. It presumes the creation of a new mindset."6 A culture of radical solidarity "gets involved by word and deed in people's daily lives... and it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others." We each have our particular gifts, role, and obligation within the Body of Christ to help build a culture of life. We must honestly ask ourselves, "What radical, out-of-the-ordinary, actions have I taken to help a pregnant or parenting mother in need, or to proactively contribute to a culture of life in some other way?"

Inspired by Christ's own example of love, may we "enter fully into the fabric of society, sharing the lives of all, listening to their concerns, helping them materially and spiritually in their needs, rejoicing with those who rejoice, weeping with those who weep."8 May we work together to bring about a culture of life through radical, sacrificial, Christ-like love.
