



# **Pastor's Page**

# SOME DON'T SEE IT, I GUESS . . .

If a person talks about it theologically, it's called "losing a sense of the sacred." It's not a new experience: mankind since the fall of Adam and Eve have always found this to be part of our experience living in a fallen world. However, it still seems to me that we in our time are in the process of ever more losing that "sense of the sacred" and moving more and more into a non-sacred, self-centered way of life.

Self-centeredness is the necessary consequence of losing a sense of the sacred. The "sacred" refers primarily, of course, to God Himself, but it also refers, at least secondarily, to the things of God. And when we lose sight of God and the things of God in our life and begin to live in a way in response to that, we inevitably turn in on ourselves - whether we realize it or not. Our "self" becomes more and more the center of our lives - and we lose sight more and more of the things outside of ourselves - God first, the things of God second, and even the things of this world and the people we live in it with.

That's why it behooves us to engage in the battle to *not* lose the sense of the sacred. We dare not lose sight of God and the things of God - He (and they) keep us grounded in reality - and reality is *not* my own self-centeredness. It gets so bad that often the very things we claim we "love" are those things - and only those things - that serve us and that we love for what we can gain from them. And this can happen - as I mentioned before - without our ever quite realizing that is exactly what is happening. (And then when someone else points this out, we often react not by accepting the wisdom of the correction, but of criticizing and rejecting the message and the messenger who brought it to our attention.)

Why am I bringing this up? Something recently occurred at our church that precipitated this reaction on my part. But it's only that this is the last in a series of similar happenings that have occurred over the course of years, and perhaps I've reached what might be called "the last straw." What happened was not a hugely significant thing in the big scheme of things. But frankly, it is often the smaller things that are an indication of bigger things to come, and part of my pastoring is looking ahead to prevent my flock from straying into further ill-gotten pastures abroad.

After the Sunday Masses last weekend, I was making my usual rounds about the church, putting things away, straightening things up, re-stocking cards and candles, etc., and I ran into two terribly disappointing scenes: First, when I entered the cry room I was shocked - and a bit grossed out - by the food mess that was left in the room. This wasn't the usual cracker crumbs that have fallen on the floor. This was a gooey mess of crud that I assume started out as food, that perhaps had been chewed on a bit, but perhaps then was spit out and amidst other articles of food was spread out over a few square feet of the carpet and almost ground into it. I couldn't believe it . . . I still can't believe anyone would just leave the room that way. I can fully understand that messes happen with young children, but that kind of mess . . . and then just getting up and leaving it that way? On the one hand, NO ONE would enter anyone else's house, have that kind of thing occur, and then simply get up and walk away. NO ONE would do that. But this person obviously does not see this as GOD'S HOUSE - frankly, they must see it as nothing more than a place to be used and then left without a further thought . . .

I continued on my way and got to the Providence Shrine to peek my head in to see if anything needed to be done there. It all appeared to be fine - and then I noticed something at the base of the St. Jude statue that was out of place. It was a piece of white plaster - hm? I picked it up and turned it over, and the other side was flesh-toned. Something clicked in my brain, and I raised my eyes to the statue . . . and sure enough, one of the hands of St. Jude was cracked, and a small piece of the hand was missing (the piece of plaster). I couldn't believe it . . . I still can't believe anyone would just leave the statue that way and not tell us about it. Perhaps it was an accident - I'm assuming it was. But the statue gets cracked and broken, and I just walk away? On the one hand, NO ONE would enter anyone else's house, break something, even by accident, and then simply leave without saying anything to the owner. NO ONE would do that. But this person obviously does not see this as GOD'S HOUSE.

This is what I mean by "losing the sense of the sacred." Not so much that things happen - of course things happen. But here they happen . . . and so often there's no response. Let's just get up and walk away . . . Someone else will take care of it. It's just "the church" - they mean the *building*. NO ONE would have this happen in anyone else's house and simply walk away - but this isn't a house - it's a church. The janitor will clean it up, I guess. Someone else will fix it. I'm certainly not going to offer to help pay for any damages.

This is just the two latest examples - and perhaps two of the most egregious. Kneelers are broken most every week, and only a few are brought to our attention. Most people just get up and leave them for us to discover they are now broken. Food is strewed over pews and on the floor - and in the missalette boxes. People blow their noses - and leave the still-moist

(what word would that be?) Kleenexes stuffed in the missalette boxes for me to dig out and throw away. Little kids have vomited, and the folks have walked away. Bulletins are taken and read - during Mass - and then simply left, folded up and not thus reusable, in the pews and missalette boxes. Missalette and music supplements and ripped and torn and chewed on and jammed together with now-bent covers and thus rendered good only for throwing away. I am blown away by the lack of propriety that some of our own parish family show in its dealing with GOD'S HOUSE. But that's the point - more and more people are losing a sense of the sacred. It's not "God's house" - it's a church building. Although I am glad to see that on the one hand they are coming to Mass, one must wonder at what level of faith they are coming with. Living with a sense of the sacred around me - and it doesn't get much more sacred in terms of a particular space than God's house, the Catholic church where the Lord Himself is Really Present in the tabernacle - is a critical accompaniment of a faith life.

And what are we teaching our kids about going into someone else's space, using it and then abusing it even in small ways, and simply leaving - much less the fact that this someone else's space is **GOD'S**?

The Lord God - and His things - need to be seen for what they are and treated accordingly. Accidents happen mistakes are made - errors occur. But our concern for **GOD'S HOUSE** should be at least as deep as our concern for our own house - if not more.






