MISSIONOPOLY

PURPOSE:

Through our Baptism, we are all called to be missionary disciples at every age. In Jeremiah we hear how we are not too young to have faith in God or be a missionary.

But the Lord said to me, "Do not say, 'I am too young.' You must go to everyone I send you to and say whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you and will rescue you," declares the Lord. (Jeremiah 1:7-9)

Students will learn how to answer their call to be missionaries by hearing stories and facts about children around the world, spending time in prayer for others, and learning about how they can better share Christ's love with others.

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Share with your students the purpose of this mission game.
2. Remind them what each of the images mean.
3. Tell the students they should hold onto the cards they pick up. *(All cards should be collected before they move to the next table game or activity.)*
4. Have students each pick a playing piece. *Let students know that many of these are artifacts from around the world.*
5. Invite students to divide up among the boards.
6. PLAY!
7. The winner is the student who has the most variety of cards picked up.
