From the Desk of Father Schaefbauer

OFFICE HOURS

Monday - Friday 8:00am - 5:00pm The ancient Greek city of Corinth was home to a Panhellenic event known as the Isthmian Games. This sporting event was similar to the Olympic Games and occurred in the 2nd and 4th years of the Olympiad cycle (that is, the year before and the year after the Olympic events). These games were very popular and widely known in the ancient Greek world. So, St. Paul was very much justified in using athletic metaphors in his letters. He used these sports analogies for two reasons. First, because his audience was well aware of athletic life and the competitions for which they trained. Second, because the self-control practiced by athletes is very similar to the self-denial demanded of Christians.

Think, for example, of an athlete's training regimen. They refrain from certain foods and beverages, undergo intense workouts that target specific areas of the body, and maintain a consistent sleep schedule. Notice the theme: the athlete says 'no' to certain good things while saying 'yes' to less desirable or difficult goods. By learning true self-control, the athlete can truly order the good of his body to achieve a status of athletic excellence. But for what purpose? To attain a trophy, a title, an honor, that, ultimately, fades away.

The Christian life is no different. We learn to deny ourselves certain things not because they are bad, but because there is a certain excellence we desire to achieve. Of course, this is something we are to do daily; but the Church—like a good Mother caring for her children—provides us with an entire Liturgical Season (i.e., Lent) to practice and focus on self control. During these solemn 40 days, we are asked to say 'no' to some good things and 'yes' to less desirable or difficult goods. The more we can deny ourselves of good things, the easier it will be for us to say 'no' to that which is harmful to us, namely, sin. But we will also be more capable of receiving all the good that God offers us in this life, and ultimately the next. Christian self-control is rewarded with a prize that will never fade, but will last for all eternity. We call this beatitude, or union with God—Goodness itself—in which all our desires and labors will find rest and true satisfaction that will never fade.

Characteristics of Sacred Music - Universality



Universality...St. Pius X tells us that when sanctity and goodness of form exist, together they will create universality. This characteristic is significant not only concerning Sacred Music, but the Church as a whole. This allows the Church and her music to be equally accessible to countless diverse cultures throughout the world. Because the Church has always encouraged and supported progress in the arts, she does allow modern music in addition to our rich repertoire of Gregorian Chant. However, it must respect both the liturgical spirit and the true values of the art form. For many reasons, to be discussed in the future, because Gregorian chant is the supreme model of sacred music, it continues to be an element of unity within the Roman Liturgy, Furthermore, St. John Paul II reminds us that "the sacred context of the celebration must never become a laboratory for experimentation or permit forms of

composition and performance to be

introduced without careful review."
