

THE SURVEY SAYS... “GET NEW PRIEST”!

Just kidding. In fact, I was overwhelmed and humbled that the average response for the question “Would you recommend your pastor?” was an 8.9 out of 10, (only slightly behind the rating for the parish which was 9.1). That’s a B+! During my educational career, I have never scoffed at a B+! Similarly, about 86% find my homilies helpful for their faith growth, which I am very grateful to know.

Priest joke: What do you call a priest who got Bs in seminary?
Answer: Father.

This survey (or assessment) was very helpful for me and for my team. Thank you for your openness and honesty in filling it out. We have been analyzing the data and will use it to implement improvements in what we are doing, how we are communicating, and what we are offering. Of course, we don’t have trend data yet, but as we repeat this in a year or so, we will have some gauge as to how we are succeeding or where we can continue to grow. Like I never tire of saying (even if you tire of hearing it) God loves us right where we are and he wants us to change--individually and collectively!





I will be sharing some of the findings in this article and in homilies when the time presents itself. Some of the results are really just for in-house purposes. And some aren't terribly helpful until we have something to compare them with.

Over 300 surveys were filled out (though some questions were left blank), which is about $\frac{1}{4}$ of our adults at Mass on a weekend. We decided to conduct the survey at Mass, because it tends to yield a higher response rate than a digital survey. We also did this because we are most interested in feedback from the people in the pews. When McDonald's wants to improve their food, they ask people who frequent McDonald's not people who frequent Taco Bell, because if you want tacos, you shouldn't go to a burger place.

WHAT PEOPLE APPRECIATE MOST

What people say they love most about the parish are (in this order) The reverent traditional liturgies, the welcoming community and families, and the super-awesome pastor (well, they didn't say "super-awesome" but they did put the pastor). Next on the list were our beautiful churches and our school.

These responses are very encouraging, since it has been one of our primary aims to have transcendent, beautiful liturgies that draw our hearts and minds to God. 90% of parishioners agreed or strongly agreed that Masses do just that!

Another one of our goals is to foster authentic relationships within our parish community, and 90% of parishioners agreed or strongly agreed that we have a "welcoming parish".

This is no small feat. It often seems that beautiful liturgies and welcoming parishioners are mutually exclusive; that we can successfully balance both is a real testimony to everyone here!

DEMOGRAPHICS

Here is some interesting demographic information. Of those who filled out the survey (which of course did not include children) 29% consider themselves Baby Boomers, 18% Gen Xers, and 23% Millennials. Whereas not quite $\frac{1}{3}$ of our parishioners have been at St. Max for 25 years or more, nearly 40% have only moved here or started attending Mass here only during my tenure, i.e., the last 6 years. That is quite a shift!

When it comes to Mass times, nearly half of parishioners (and oftentimes it is well over half) say 10AM is their normal Mass time, whereas about a quarter hold claim to the 8AM, and a little less than that the 5PM.

Over half of every “tenure” group with the exception of those who have been here for *longer than 25 years*, prefers the 10AM Mass. Moreover, twice as many Millennials as Boomers attend the 10AM and the same in reverse for the 8AM. My best estimate (even excluding small children) is that the 10AM is nearly 20 years younger than the 8AM. This is not to put one group over another, it’s just to say we have a very young parish.


We could dice the numbers up even further, but suffice it to say, this serves as a good reminder that if we tend to only come to one Mass time, we only see a portion of the parish and not the whole of it. Of course, we tend to be friends with those in the same generation or neighborhood or other associations. A 10 o’clock-only parishioner will perceive the parish very differently than an 8 o’clock-only parishioner. This should serve to caution us in making unfounded judgements and perhaps even invite us to come to a different Mass time every once in a while and meet a new person.

Did you know: the 10am Mass is our “high” Mass; it is always celebrated on the high altar, it has more Latin, and uses incense. The 5pm and 8am have less Latin, no incense, and use the high altar less frequently.

SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

The survey revealed some really encouraging information about our faith practices. Most impressive is that 29% of parishioners go to confession at least monthly! And another 29% go quarterly! A full 80% going at least annually! For reference, the national average as of last year was 42% go annually, and the other 58% don't go at all. Now, I don't know if that is Mass-going Catholics, or anyone who calls themselves Catholic, however, I do know that, when I first got here we were pretty average. We used to only have confessions 3 days a week. Now we have confessions every single day of the week, except Monday, which is my day off. And it is not because people started sinning more!

Also, encouraging are the 50% of parishioners that tithe at least 5% of their annual income to the parish, the 37% who are in small groups, the nearly 50% who are in the adoration chapel regularly, and the almost 40% find ways to serve in the parish.

OPPORTUNITIES

Of course there are always opportunities for growth. When asked how the parish can help you to be transformed in Christ, we found there is a desire for the following: more large group studies, more small groups, and more youth events. The parish staff is already looking at the calendar to see how we can accommodate these requests and fulfill these desires, so stay tuned. Other suggestions in the areas of homebound ministry, music, and other requests will need more explanation and teaching to be properly understood. That is another outcome of this survey, my own recognition that I need to communicate and over-communicate way more than I thought, something I will be taking up in coming months.

Additionally, some areas for improvement for all of us are the 8% of people who feel they lack community in their life--that means we all can do a better job reaching out. Also, I'd like to work to see an increase in registered adorers, the number of people taking 20+ minutes of silent meditation each day, and servants.



HOW YOU STACKED UP

In my own private survey that only I filled out, I rated you my beloved parishioners a whopping 9.9 (always room to grow)! I am very honored to be your pastor, and to be entrusted with the great task of caring for your souls. I know, I probably fail more than I succeed. But with the help of the Holy Spirit and you the faithful people of St. Max, I will continue onwards.

As I enter my 7th year here (the last of my first term), I hope to be here for many more years, and it seems we are in agreement on that point. There is much work to be done. And I feel I've only just begun!

How long have you been parishioners? We have been parishioners at St. Max since August 8th, 2017.





THE RACE BEGINS AND ENDS AT ST. MAXIMILLIAN KOLBE ACADEMY

Fr. K has long been trying to figure out a way to use his running to promote the parish and school.
