

Unsolicited Calls

ometimes life calls us to a place that feels just right, as if it's where we're meant to be. I know a person who has always wanted to be a dad, and so he is—a stay-at-home dad of three, and he loves it. On the other hand, sometimes life's calls unfold in directions beyond our plans and seem to flow from a wisdom greater than our own. Author John Grisham studied to be a lawyer, something that unfolded into his becoming a writer of mysteries and thrillers instead. Calls seem to be written upon our spirits. How else would God call us?

Isaiah, Paul, and Peter found themselves called by God into lives they never wanted, baffled by God's whys and wherefores. Their calls pushed them into lives they initially resisted.

Such calls can happen to us as well. A man finds himself caring for his aged mother after his father's death. His siblings seem unwilling or unable to help, so there is no one else. Grandparents find themselves raising their grandchildren because their son's or daughter's life is frayed beyond repair, and there is no one else to nurture and love the children. The calls of God at times are calls into lives not of our own choosing. They arise from greater needs when there seems to be no one else but us to say

"yes." Our reluctance and anxiety may attest that these calls come from God. They then become paths to ever-deepening faith and trust in God.

We Are Pilgrims of Hope: On May 9. 2024 Pope Francis solemnly announced that the Church's Jubilee year 2025 "will be a Holy Year marked by a lively experience of grace and an opportunity to be renewed in the hope that does not fade, our hope in God. May it help us to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relation-ships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation. May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth, where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfilment of the Lord's promises."

"Hope is the virtue that gives inward direction and purpose to the life of believers so that we may bear credible and attractive witness to the faith and love that swell in our hearts; that our faith may be joyful and our charity enthusiastic; and that each of us may be able to offer a smile, a small gesture of friendship, a kind look, a ready ear, a good deed, in the knowledge that, in the Spirit of Jesus, these can become, for those who receive them, rich seeds of hope."

Our Pilgrimage Journey to and with Jesus: A pilgrimage is both an outer journey to a sacred place, and an inner journey to meet Christ and deepen our relationship with him. Thus, Pope Francis desires that this Jubilee Year be a time "to encourage and sustain the hope that guides our steps towards the goal of a genuine, personal encounter with the risen Lord Jesus, who is not only the destination of our earthly pilgrimage but also a constant presence in our lives. Initiation (OCIA) - Since the very beginnings of the Church, there has been a process for non-Christians to enter into formation to be received into the Church, part of which is described in St. Luke's writings in the Acts of the Apostles. As this process evolved over the first few centuries, the basic process became known collectively as the Sacraments of Initiation. This period of preparation was to teach and encourage the new birth, growth, and nourishment of these new Christians, with the culmination of their formation mainly celebrated at Easter when they were received into the Church with their Baptism, reception of Eucharist, and Confirmation. One of the major revisions of the Second Vatican Council was to reform the rites of these sacraments of initiation, and in 1972, it released the new Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, or as we came to know it, the RCIA. This revised process, was subsequently implemented by the bishops of the U.S. in its current application in 1988. In 2021, the U.S. Bishops adopted a further revision of the RCIA, now known as the OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults), to be consistent with the new edition of the Roman Missal, and to allow for a more pastoral implementation of the initiation process. This process applies primarily to adults, both the non-baptized and the baptized. For baptized adults, it includes those validly baptized in other Christian traditions who wish to come into full communion with the Catholic Church, as well as baptized Catholics who did not complete their sacramental formation in their youth (First Communion and Confirmation.) There is also a rite for non-baptized children of a catechetical age, which can be in conjunction with a parish CCD program. On 11/15/2023, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops approved the statutes of the OCIA revisions, and they were submitted to Rome for approval, and after receiving recognition by Pope Francis, its use is now obligatory as of Ash Wednesday, 3/5/2025, in the dioceses of the U.S. The purpose of this process of Christian formation is described in the General Introduction of the OCIA: "For having been incorporated into Christ through Baptism, and formed into the People of God, and, having received the remission of all their sins and been rescued from the power of darkness, they are brought to the status of adopted sons and daughters, being made a new creation by water and the Holy Spirit. Sealed with the gift of the same Spirit in Confirmation, they are more perfectly configured to the Lord, and filled with the Holy Spirit, so that bearing witness to Christ before the world, they bring the Body of Christ to its full stature without delay. Finally, participating in the Eucharistic assembly. . . they may receive eternal life and show forth the unity of God's people." -Deacons Corner-St. Patrick's Church, Merced

Dear Padre,

Who was St. Valentine? Do our Valentine's Day traditions of love and romance have anything to do with the actual St. Valentine?

There were actually three St. Valentines. One was a priest who was beheaded in Rome on February 14 in the year 269. Another was a bishop, who was also martyred in the third century. Both are buried on the Appian Way in Rome. The third St. Valentine is a lesser-known saint who died in Africa with a number of companions during the early

centuries of the Church. The tomb of this St. Valentine became a center of popular devotion in the early Middle Ages. In 496, Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honor this particular St. Valentine.


The popular romantic customs that surround our present Valentine's Day trace their origins back to the Middle Ages. The English writer Geoffrey Chaucer noted that halfway through the second month of the year, February 14, the birds begin to choose their mates. For this reason, the day was looked upon as specially consecrated to lovers and as a proper occasion for writing love letters and sending lovers' tokens. People who gave or received these tokens or letters were referred to as "valentines." In the Middle Ages, a legend also developed that St. Valentine the priest left a farewell note for his jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and that he signed that note "From Your Valentine."
