Dear parish family,

Greetings!

Last Tuesday evening I had a wake for the following day funeral. As it is the schedule of every Tuesday 6:00PM Confession and 7:00PM St. Anthony's Novena Mass I planned to go to do the wake around 5:00PM. When I got out of the rectory it was already dark and since during the day it was not that cold, I just had a sweater on me but the weather outside had drastically changed and it was very cold which made me run back into the rectory to get the jacket. As I was getting the jacket on me, I checked the temperature and it was 35* degree, no wonder why I felt freezing. After taking the jacket, I took my car and went to do the wake. At the funeral parlor they had the heat on and it was nice and warm and yet when I was taken by the funeral parlor person to introduce to the family, one of the family members asked him to raise the heat to feel better. After the prayer when I was coming back, I was thinking about how I went back to the rectory to take the jacket to keep myself warm and feel better and how that person at the wake made the request to raise the heat to make himself and others to feel better. It was very interesting to realize that in our lives without any exception we all want to feel better and have the best. It could be with the temperature, health, finance, relationship and you name it. The reason why I am mentioning about this is:

Over the past months we have, each Sunday, been reading from St Luke's telling of the good news of Jesus. We have heard him talk of how we are to live our lives, how we are to celebrate this meal, how we are to treat each other as baptized sisters and brothers. Today our thoughts move to the future: our future as individuals, as the community that is one body in Christ, and the ultimate destiny of the creation. As we come to the end of the year, it is a case that we now start thinking of 'ends' rather than 'means'. We have been called by Jesus to move along our pilgrimage of life toward our final destination; so now let us fix our thoughts on that destination and ask the Father to forgive us our wanderings in other directions that we may have the better and best in Heaven.

The Day of the Lord: This weekend we celebrate “the Thirty Third Sunday in Ordinary Time”. The readings warn us about the final days of the world, our own death, and the final judgment. The ideal way to accept Jesus' apocalyptic message is always to be ready to face our death. Folks, to avoid the cold temperature affecting our body and feel better we pick up the jacket, raise the heat and bundle ourselves with wither gears, we who do that with our physical side, what do we do to make our soul to feel better?

The readings tell us that we must live holy lives of selfless love, humble service, mercy, compassion, and unconditional forgiveness, remembering the demands of justice in our day-to-day lives. We must also take time to rest and to pray in order to keep our hearts alive to God's presence with us and within us. Daily examination of our conscience at bedtime and asking God's pardon and forgiveness, also prepares us to face God at any time to give an account of our lives. Here please remember the quote of St. Rose of Viterbo, “Live so as not to fear death. For those who live well in the world, death is not frightening but sweet and precious.” May God help us all to stay blessed here on this earth and have the best in Heaven!

Noticias desde la Casa del Timón

Querida familia parroquial:

¡Saludos!

El martes pasado por la tarde tuve un velorio para el funeral del día siguiente. Como es costumbre todos los martes, confesiones a las 6:00 p. m. y misa de la Novena a San Antonio a las 7:00 p. m., planeé ir al velorio alrededor de las 5:00 p. m. Al salir de la rectoría ya había oscurecido y, como durante el día no había hecho tanto frío, solo llevaba un suéter. Sin embargo, el clima afuera había cambiado drásticamente y hacía mucho frío, lo que me hizo correr de regreso a la rectoría por la chaqueta. Mientras me ponía la chaqueta, revisé la temperatura y marcaba 35 grados Fahrenheit (1.7 grados Celsius), con razón sentía tanto frío. Después de tomar la chaqueta, fui en mi auto al velorio. En la funeraria tenían la calefacción encendida y hacía un calorcito agradable, pero cuando el empleado me llevó a presentarme a la familia, uno de los familiares le pidió que subiera la calefacción para sentirse mejor. Después de la oración, al regresar, pensaba en cómo volví a la rectoría a buscar la chaqueta para abrigarme y sentirme mejor, y en cómo esa persona en el velorio pidió que subieran la calefacción para sentirse mejor él y los demás. Fue muy interesante darme cuenta de que, en nuestras vidas, sin excepción, todos queremos sentirnos mejor y tener lo mejor. Puede ser en cuanto a la temperatura, la salud, las finanzas, las relaciones, etc. La razón por la que menciono esto es la siguiente:

Durante los últimos meses, cada domingo hemos leído el Evangelio de San Lucas, que narra la buena noticia de Jesús. Hemos escuchado cómo debemos vivir nuestras vidas, cómo debemos celebrar esta comida, cómo debemos tratarnos unos a otros como hermanos y hermanas bautizados. Hoy nuestros pensamientos se dirigen al futuro: nuestro futuro como individuos, como comunidad unida en Cristo, y al destino final de la creación. Al acercarnos al fin de año, es momento de pensar en los fines, más que en los medios. Jesús nos ha llamado a continuar nuestra peregrinación de la vida hacia nuestro destino final; así que fijemos ahora nuestros pensamientos en ese destino y pidamos al Padre que nos perdone nuestras desviaciones para que podamos alcanzar la gloria celestial.

El Día del Señor: Este fin de semana celebramos el Trigésimo Tercer Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario. Las lecturas nos advierten sobre los últimos días del mundo, nuestra propia muerte y el juicio final. La mejor manera de aceptar el mensaje apocalíptico de Jesús es estar siempre preparados para afrontar la muerte. Hermanos, para evitar que el frío afecte nuestro cuerpo y sentirnos mejor, nos abrigamos bien, subimos la calefacción y

nos ponemos la ropa adecuada; pero nosotros, que hacemos esto físicamente, ¿qué hacemos para que nuestra alma se sienta mejor? Las lecturas nos enseñan que debemos vivir una vida santa de amor desinteresado, servicio humilde, misericordia, compasión y perdón incondicional, recordando las exigencias de la justicia en nuestro día a día. También debemos tomarnos tiempo para descansar y orar, para mantener nuestros corazones abiertos a la presencia de Dios con nosotros y dentro de nosotros. El examen diario de conciencia antes de dormir, pidiendo el perdón de Dios, nos prepara para comparecer ante Él en cualquier momento y rendir cuentas de nuestra vida. Recordemos aquí las palabras de Santa Rosa de Viterbo: «Vivan sin temor a la muerte. Para quienes viven bien en el mundo, la muerte no es aterradora, sino dulce y preciosa». ¡Que Dios nos ayude a todos a ser bendecidos aquí en la tierra y a alcanzar la gloria celestial!
