Entrance Antiphon (Psalm 25:15-16)

My eyes are always on the Lord, for He rescues my feet from the snare. Turn to me and have mercy on me, for I am alone and poor.

First Reading (Exodus 17:3-7)

A reading from the book of Exodus

Tormented by thirst, the people complained against Moses. 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt?' they said. 'Was it so that I should die of thirst, my children too, and my cattle?' Moses appealed to the Lord. 'How am I to deal with this people?' he said. 'A little more and they will stone me!' The Lord said to Moses, 'Take with you some of the elders of Israel and move on to the forefront of the people; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the river, and go. I shall be standing before you there on the rock, at Horeb. You must strike the rock, and water will flow from it for the people to drink.' This is what Moses did, in the sight of the elders of Israel. The place was named Massah and Meribah because of the grumbling of the sons of Israel and because they put the Lord to the test by saying, 'Is the Lord with us, or not?'

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Through our Lord Jesus Christ by faith we are judged righteous and at peace with God, since it is by faith and through Jesus that we have entered this state of grace in which we can boast about looking forward to God's glory. This hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at His appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die - but what

proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners.

Gospel Acclamation (cf John 4:42, 15)

Glory and praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ! Lord, You are truly the Saviour of the world; give me living water, that I may never thirst again. Glory and praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel (John 4:5-15, 19-26, 39-42)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give Me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to Him, 'What? You are a Jew and You ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' - Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give Me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and He would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could You get this living water? Are You a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give

will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.' 'Sir,' said the woman 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see You are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while You say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know; for salvation comes from the Jews.
But the hour will come - in fact it is here already - when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth:

truth:
that is the kind of worshipper
the Father wants.
God is spirit,
and those who worship

must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to Him, 'I know that Messiah - that is, Christ - is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in Him on the strength of the woman's testimony when she said, 'He told me all I have ever done', so, when the Samaritans came up to Him, they begged Him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when He spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard Him ourselves and we know that He really is the saviour of the world.'

The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

World Youth Day, Lisbon 2023



Every two-three years since 1987 Catholic youth have gathered from around the world with the Pope at a World Youth Day, hosted in a different city. Many I'm sure would recall the 2008 WYD in

Sydney, which provided an incredible injection of faith across the country. The last World Youth Day was in 2019 Panama City, Panama. Since then, the ability to organise an international WYD has been prevented by COVID restrictions on both large gatherings and international travel. Four years on, the next WYD will be held in Lisbon, Portugal between 1st-6th August, 2023.

The World Youth Day is designed to be a pilgrimage for young people to experience the universality of the Catholic Faith, celebrating the faith with other young Catholics from all over the world. Portugal is a country steeped in a rich Catholic culture. It is the birthplace of St Anthony of Padua, St Elizabeth of Portugal and home to the miraculous apparitions of Our Lady at Fatima.

The Archdiocese of Melbourne is offering three pilgrimage options: *Direct to Lisbon* (14 days); *The Italian Way* (via Rome - 19 days); and *Footsteps of Jesus* (via the Holy Land - 21 days). Registrations are currently open for any young Catholic aged between 16-35.

If you wish to travel with one of the three Melbourne groups you will need to register by 17th March.



World Youth Day is a lot of fun, but it is a pilgrimage, not a holiday. Experience shows that it is often a formative and galvanising experience for young Catholics who are maturing in their faith. The last thirty years shows that WYD produces future leaders for the Church and even a few vocations. Although not cheap to undertake, it is an investment in the future of the Church: today's youth are tomorrow's leaders.

If there are any young people who are interested in finding out more about the WYD (dates, itineraries, costs, etc.) check out the website for the Archdiocese of Melbourne (see link below). Should there be any young people from the parish who are interested in joining the Melbourne group I am happy to discuss a partial subsidy of the costs involved and we can also look at the possibility of some parish fund-raising if there is the interest. If you have any questions or are seeking financial assistance from the parish, feel from to contact me via the parish office. Note that due to the cut-off date for registrations being on 17th March you will need to contact me ASAP.

I have the good fortune of having been appointed as one of the chaplains to accompany Melbourne WYD pilgrims on the *Footsteps of Jesus* pilgrim route. My last WYD was in 2008 (when I actually qualified as 'youth'!) so I too will be looking forward to this unique experience. Hope to see you in Lisbon!

Lenten Wisdom from the Saints



St. Augustine of Hippo Sermon 205, 1

"As we begin our annual Lenten observance with its solemn call to conversion...it is more than ever my pastoral duty to nourish your minds with the word of God when you are about to mortify your bodies by fasting. We are soon to celebrate the Passion of our crucified Lord. It is therefore in keeping with our commitment to him that we should crucify ourselves by restraining the desires of the flesh.

As St Paul says: You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all your self-indulgent passions and desires. Such is the Cross upon which we Christians must continually hang, since our whole lives are beset by trials and temptations. Not for us, as long as we live, to be rid of those nails we read of in the psalm: Pierce my flesh with the nails of your fear. Flesh means the desires of our lower nature; nails, the demands of God's justice and holiness. With these the fear of the Lord pierces our flesh and fastens us to the Cross as an acceptable sacrifice to him.

In a similar passage the apostle Paul appeals to us by the mercy of God to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God. To hang on such a Cross brings no shame to the servants of God; it is something in which they glory, as Saint Paul does when he says: Far be it from me to glory in anything except in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. This crucifixion, I repeat, is something that must continue throughout our life, not for forty days only. It is true that Moses, Elijah, and our Lord himself fasted for forty days; but in Moses, Elijah, and Christ we are meant to see the Law, the Prophets, and the Gospel, and to learn from them not to cling to this present world or imitate its ways, but to nail our unregenerate selves to the Cross. Christians must always live in this way. without any wish to come down from their Cross, otherwise they will sink beneath the world's mire. But if we have to do so all our lives, we must make an even greater effort during these days of Lent. It is not a simple matter of living through forty days; Lent is the epitome of our whole life."
