

TENDING GOD'S FLOCK

Pentecost Sunday, Year A




- 1. Today is the **Jewish feast of Shavuot**. It is also called the "Feast of Weeks" because it is celebrated seven weeks after Passover. It is one of the three "pilgrim" festival of the Jewish people, the other two being Passover and Sukkot, the Feast of Booths. All Jewish males were required to observe them at the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Originally, Shavuot was a harvest festival, celebrating the first fruits, but after the destruction of the second temple the celebration focused on the anniversary of the giving of the Covenant and the Law to Moses at Mt. Sinai. The two holidays, Passover and Shavuot are linked. The Jewish people gained their freedom from the Egyptians on Passover, and o received the Torah, the Law, on Shavuot, fifty days later. Christians call this feast Pentecost from the Greek word for fifty.
- 2. In the **first reading** from the Acts of the Apostles, Luke tells us that the disciples were in one place together, and a mighty wind arose, and it filled the entire house. Then there appeared to them as tongues of fire, which came to rest on each of them. And they began to speak in languages, and were understood by the crowd that had gathered, each in their own language. Fire symbolizes the transforming energy of the Holy Spirit. Just as Jesus his ministry at his baptism by the descent of the Holy Spirit, the Apostles begin theirs when the Holy Spirit descends on them on Pentecost. This is considered the birth of the Church. We receive the Holy Spirit at Baptism and Confirmation, which completes Baptism.
- 3. In our **Gospel** reading from John, the coming of the Spirit occurs on Easter evening while the disciples are hiding in a locked room. Jesus appears to them and breathes the Holy Spirit giving them the authority given to him by his Father. They receive the power to act in Jesus' name and in his person. It is a call to mission, to spread the mercy of God through the forgiveness of sins. And today, through their successors, the priests, and bishops, we continue to experience God's mercy on a personal level.



We celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, also known as the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, on the weekend of June 10 and 11. This solemnity celebrates the Real Presence of the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus in the consecrated elements of the Eucharist.

At all weekend Masses, we will distribute communion under both species of bread and wine. Communion



from the chalice will be available from the Deacon and two Eucharistic Ministers. We encourage you to drink from the chalice, but it is purely voluntary.

Corpus Christi Sunday also marks the beginning of the second phase of the National Eucharistic Revival (NER), where the focus is at the parish level. We will have a Eucharistic procession at the end of the 8:00 am Sunday Mass, and incense will be used during this Mass. Weather permitting, we will process with the Blessed Sacrament outside, a public display of our faith and belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.





Use Good Judment

Use good judgment when deciding if conditions are safe to travel to Mass. In the event that roadways are not clear and weather conditions are unsafe to travel, the faithful are reminded that the obligation to participate in the Sunday Mass does not apply when there is grave difficulty in fulfilling this obligation (Code of CanonLaw, Canon 1248 §2).




