Pastor's Reflection

Dear Sisters, Brothers and Friends of All Saints Catholic Church: Greetings and Praise the Lord.

The Path to True Happiness: Living the Beatitudes.

On this Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Church places before us one of the most powerful teachings of Jesus—the Beatitudes. In them, Christ reveals the heart of the Gospel and the true meaning of blessedness.

Every person longs for happiness. We often search for it in success, security, comfort, or recognition. Yet Jesus teaches us that true joy is not found in what the world offers, but in a life shaped by God's grace and rooted in His Kingdom.

In the first reading, the prophet Zephaniah calls us to “seek the Lord... seek justice, seek humility.” God promises to remain close to the humble and lowly—those who place their trust not in pride, but in Him. Humility is not weakness; it is the doorway through which God's blessing enters.

Saint Paul echoes this truth as he reminds the Corinthians that God chose what is weak in the eyes of the world to reveal His power. The Kingdom of God is not built on status or strength, but on hearts surrendered to Christ. Everything we are and everything we have is a gift from the Lord.

In the Gospel, Jesus ascends the mountain and teaches us how to live as citizens of His Kingdom. The Beatitudes overturn worldly values and point us toward lasting happiness.

To be poor in spirit is to depend completely on God. To mourn is to trust that God's comfort is stronger than sorrow. Meekness is strength guided by humility. Hungering for righteousness is a deep desire to live according to God's will. Mercy opens the door to receiving mercy. A clean heart allows us to see God at work in our lives. Peacemakers reflect the very heart of Christ. And those who endure hardship for the sake of righteousness are assured that their faithfulness is never in vain.

The Beatitudes are not distant ideals—they are the way of Christ Himself. Jesus is the humble, the merciful, and the peacemaker. When we live the Beatitudes, we are not simply following teachings; we are becoming more like Him.

This week, let us take one step on the path to true happiness: Begin each day with humble prayer. Choose mercy instead of resentment. Work for peace instead of conflict. Seek what is right, even when it is difficult.

May the Lord shape our hearts according to the Beatitudes, so that we may live in His joy now and share in His Kingdom forever.

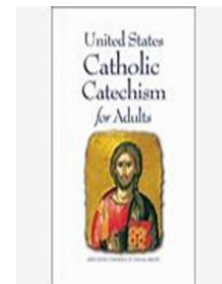


OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults)

OCIA stands for the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. It is the Church’s process for preparing adults (and older teens) who are not yet Catholic—or who have not completed their sacraments—to become fully initiated into the Catholic faith.

OCIA is for those who are:

- not baptized,
- baptized in another Christian tradition, or
- baptized Catholic but have not received First Holy Communion and/or Confirmation.



Through OCIA, participants learn the Catholic faith and prepare to receive the sacraments of Baptism (if needed), First Holy Communion, and Confirmation.

Our parish OCIA program is a meaningful sign of evangelization—people are responding to Christ and seeking a deeper relationship with Him through the Church. We warmly welcome anyone interested in becoming Catholic or simply learning more about the Catholic faith. Every inquiry is a reminder that God continues to draw hearts toward deeper faith and sacramental life.

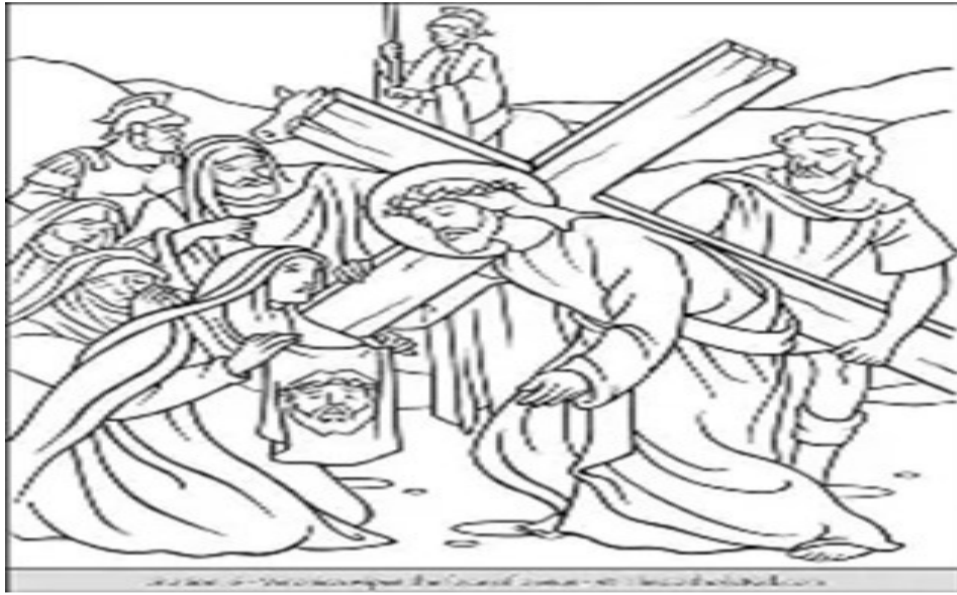

Evangelization Goals for 2026

- Strengthen outreach efforts so visits are consistent and meaningful

2) Strengthening Mass Attendance

Mass attendance reflects the spiritual health and connection of our parish family. In 2026, we hope to grow through personal invitation, hospitality, and welcoming love.

Our goal for 2026: Let us all aim to increase participation through invitation and a renewed spirit of welcome. We encourage every parishioner to invite someone: family members, household members, friends, or neighbors. Growth begins with personal witness.

Consider:

- How am I supporting my parish community?
- How can I help others feel welcomed?
- ◆ How do we remain strong even as we face the reality of aging and loss?

3) Financial Stewardship

Financial stewardship is not about fundraising—it is about supporting the mission of the Church and ensuring that we can continue serving God's people faithfully.

We invite every household to reflect prayerfully:

- How can we strengthen consistent offertory giving?
- How can each household participate in a meaningful way?
- ◆ How can each ministry support parish needs through creative initiatives?

In 2026, each parish ministry is encouraged to plan at least one fundraising or support effort for the parish. We will work together so that ministries feel supported, prepared, and successful.

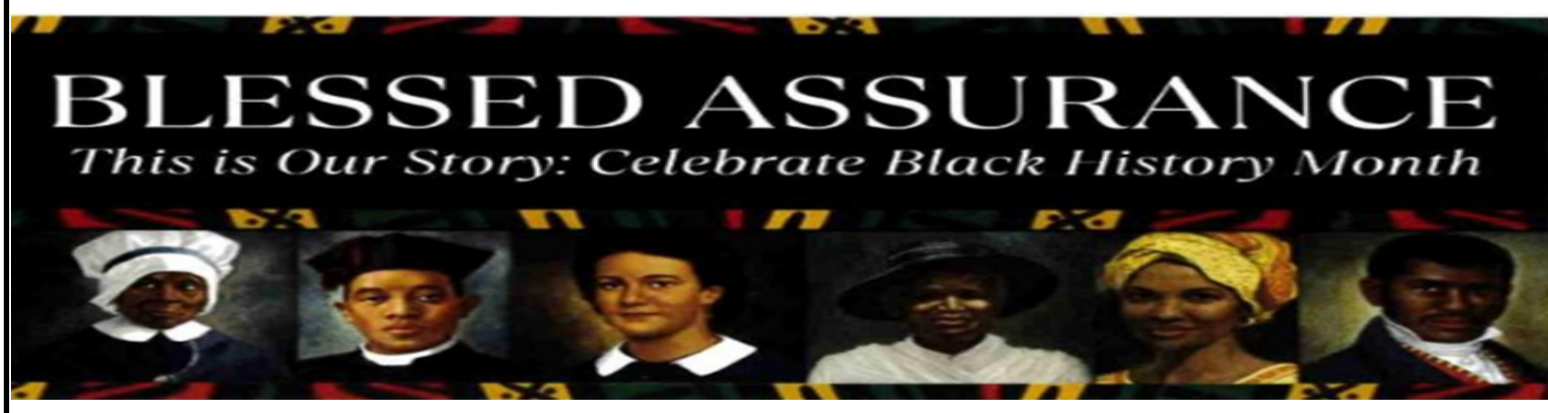
Black Catholic History: Rooted in Faith, Community, and Education

Black Catholics have been a part of this country for over a century prior to the foundation of the United States. Formerly enslaved people, who converted to Catholicism in the 17th century, helped to establish the oldest city in the country, St. Augustine, FL. Despite racism and the evils of slavery in communities all around them, these courageous and trailblazing individuals thrived in St. Augustine until the mid 1700s. But our story doesn't end there....

In the years prior to the Haitian Revolution, Pierre Toussaint, a formerly enslaved businessman in New York City, established charities including a school and orphanage for the formerly enslaved and when the yellow fever epidemic decimated the city, he cared for the ill and opened his home to homeless youth. His dedication to service was rooted in his Catholic faith and in 1996, he was declared Venerable by Pope John Paul II. Again, our story doesn't end there....

In the city of New Orleans, Black Catholics have had an imprint on the city since the late 18th Century. After the Haitian Revolution when the population of Free People of Color in the city increased, Black Catholics in the Spanish colony, women in particular, challenged traditional social structures and were legally married in the Catholic Church and had their children baptized as well. This growing community of faith, in search of a place to worship free of racial constructs, established St. Augustine Catholic Church in 1842. The historic church is built on land dedicated by the Ursuline nuns. Located in the historic Treme neighborhood, this church was a house of worship not only for Free People of Color but for the enslaved in the city who practiced the faith. Our beloved Parish was founded and rooted in this tradition as well. Faithful Black Catholics on the Westbank of New Orleans demanded a place of worship that did not confine them to the raptors of the church. In 1919, under the leadership of the Josephites and Rev. James Albert, S.S.J., All Saints Catholic Church was founded. Both of these historic parishes are listed on the National Register of Historic Sites. The Free People of Color in New Orleans turned their faith into activism and advocacy. Henriette Delille, a Free Woman of Color who came from a family of status in the city, dedicated her life to being an advocate for the enslaved and formerly enslaved. At a young age, she was involved in catechizing and served as godmother to many enslaved individuals. In 1836, along with Juliette Gaudine and Josephine Charles, she began her religious order, Sisters of the Holy Family. The order was dedicated to serving and educating the poor in the city and that work continues today at St. Mary's Academy and the LaFon Nursing Home. Our story continues...

Be it education, activism, and most importantly, faith, Black Catholics did not wait for permission to forge their paths and create places and spaces for them to worship, educate, and be a refuge for the community. The National Black Catholic Congress, Knights of Peter Claver and Ladies Auxiliary, Xavier University of Louisiana, and many other organizations continue to keep the legacy of Black Catholicism in this country, in this world alive. In New Orleans, despite the closure and consolidation of many traditional, predominantly Black Catholic Parishes, our community is more alive than ever. We stand on the shoulders of trailblazers and giants and today; we honor and thank them for their dedication and sacrifices.



On Saturday, January 10, 2026, the Trailblazers Ministry was enlightened with two awesome presentations, one on AI, Artificial Intelligence, by church member Elyse Harrison and the other on cybersecurity by church member and Xavier University Professor Austin Orgah. Special thanks to Eurydice Bush Harrison for bringing us these two informative

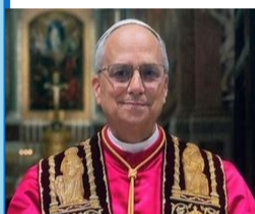
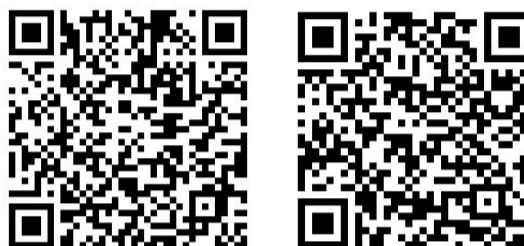
FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME
