PASTOR'S PULSE ON THE PARISH

Dear Friends,

One of my favorite gospel readings came up in the daily Mass cycle this past week, and it's one that we know very well. The Lord teaches His disciples how to pray, and by His own prayer, He introduces us to the Lord's prayer.

Examining forgiveness

I think the second half of the prayer is most poignant, as Jesus makes a second reference to it in the gospel. It has to do with the forgiveness of transgressions. In one sentence, we ask the Lord to "forgive us our trespasses," and as He has forgiven us, we offer that forgiveness to others as we "forgive those who trespass against us."

The Lord's forgiveness is always freely given to us in the grace of the sacrament of reconciliation. How do we do in freely offering forgiveness to our brothers and sisters who have wronged us? People tend to withhold forgiveness because they don't think it's deserved. They may demand an apology from someone before forgiveness is offered. What of those people who won't apologize or who go behind our backs and plot against us? How do we possess a patient, forgiving heart in the image of Christ?

As we continue in this month of the Sacred Heart, it's a worthy question to consider in our prayer time. In order to break out of the valley of retaliation, we sometimes need to be the ones that rise above whatever it is that's going on and be the bigger person.

Den. Tim made an excellent point in his homily last weekend when he said that we oftentimes define the terms of surrender and peace. It's not we who make those choices, friends - those choices are already made for us as we embrace the heart of Christ and love as He has loved us.

Love demands that we be forgiving when we have been wronged. If we hold on to


hatred and bitterness and find pleasure in the crosses of our adversaries, we are far away from the way Christ fashioned our heart. Jesus reminds us to pray for those who persecute us. The evil one cannot be conquered through equal acts of aggression and retaliation. The evil one is conquered through love. That is the people we are called to be!

Updates around campus

It's been another week of great progress amidst a flurry of activity. We are now fully transitioned over to our new electrical services in the church and rectory. Between the two buildings, we have a total of 1,800 amps! With the church on the new service, the chiller was successfully awakened from its one-year slumber to begin providing cooling to the church. With the hot summer days upon us, our workers are grateful for the refreshment!

Our liturgical painters have returned, and they have made tremendous progress this week. The first portion of the front mural is now complete. Work continues to progress on the terrazzo floors. It's been a fascinating process to watch ... from the initial blob-like substance it is when first applied to the beautiful, sparkling aggregate that begins to show more and more with a series of sandings done to the floor. It's been a very clean process overall, with large vacuums collecting all of the sanded material, which is then disposed of.

This week coming, the steel support structure that we've been patiently waiting for will be delivered and erected. That will put the bell technicians into motion as they prepare to attach the bells to their new framing. Once attached, the entire structure will be lifted by a crane into the tower, where it will rest on the interior steel supports that have been put in the tower. At this time,

MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS



Today is the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, designated the Friday after the Second Sunday after Pentecost (Corpus Christi Sunday).

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

“Beloved brethren, since it had been ordained by a merciful Providence that the Church should be formed from the side of the crucified Christ and that the words of the Scriptures be fulfilled: They shall look upon Him whom they have pierced — a soldier armed with a lance opened the sacred Breast. The Blood mingled with water, which was shed from that pierced side, was the price of our salvation. Flowing from the hidden fount of the Sacred Heart, it gave to the sacraments their power of conferring the life of grace, and to those already living in Christ a draught of the living fount, gushing forth unto life eternal.



“Arise, therefore, O soul friendly to Christ! Cease not your vigil; bring close your lips, that you may draw waters from out the Savior’s fountain. Oh, how good and how pleasant it is to dwell in this most Sacred Heart. Your Heart, dearest Jesus, is the great treasure, the precious jewel which we will find in the dug field of Your sacred Body. Who is there who would throw away this jewel? Rather would I throw away all my own jewels, my thoughts and my affections, and cast my cares upon Your Sacred Heart, which will nourish me without fail. I beg of You, sweet Jesus my God, place my prayer among those that You will answer. Draw me wholly into Your Heart. For unto this end Your side was pierced, that an entrance would lie open to us. Unto this end Your Heart was wounded, that detached from worldly tumult, we would be able to dwell in it.

“But above all, Your Heart was wounded so that a visible scar would enable us to see the invisible wound of Your love. For how could the ardor of Your love be better shown than by this, that not only Your Body but even Your very Heart was pierced with a lance? Truly the wounds of the flesh showed forth the wounds of the spirit. Who is there who would not love One so loving? My dearly beloved, let us pray that the Sacred Heart may deign to wound our heart still so hard, still so impenitent, and bind it with the sweet bonds of His love.”
