Life of humility, humbleness

Updates on campus

It's been another whirlwind on campus this past week with a flurry of activity. Work continues at the north end of the parish center to form the roof bases at the edge of the building. In the rectory, work continues on the second floor suite areas, and we've received word that cabinetry will be arriving on Monday for the first floor.

In the church, the tile in the sanctuary is coming together beautifully and is being formed around the two predellas (platforms) that elevate the bishop's cathedra (chair) and the altar.

Last week, our pipe organ vendor was on campus to inspect the work that has been done in the loft area. He was very pleased with what he's seen. Given the logistics in schedules, we're aiming for mid-October to begin installation of the organ.

Construction on the shaft for the handicap lift continues, as well as the ramp entrance to the sacristy.

Next week, we'll begin installation of the lightning protection system for the church. There is a faint light beginning to shine at the end of the tunnel for the church and rectory!

We've also done some visioning for the episcopal crypt and have sent our ideas to the bishop for his thoughts. The permitting for the crypt has been completed, which will allow us to move forward with the crypt visioning. More to come!

LIVES OF THE SAINTS

The Church celebrates the Memorial of St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153). Bernard was born near Dijon and died in Clairvaux, France. He was of a noble family and received a careful education in his youth. With his father, brother and thirty noblemen he entered the Benedictine monastery of Citeaux. Two years later he led a group of monks to establish a house at Clairvaux, and became its abbot. The monastic rule which he perfected at Clairvaux became the model for 163 monasteries of the Cistercian reform. He was a theologian, poet, orator, and writer. He is one of the last Church Fathers.



St. Bernard of Clairvaux

Bernard, the second founder of the Cistercians, the Mellifluous Doctor, the apostle of the Crusades, the miracle-worker, the reconciler of kings, the leader of peoples, the counselor of popes! His sermons, from which there are many excerpts in the Breviary, are conspicuous for genuine emotion and spiritual unction. The celebrated Memorare is ascribed to him.

Bernard was born in 1090, the third son of an illustrious Burgundian family. At the age of twenty-two he entered the monastery of Citeaux (where the Cistercian Order had its beginning) and persuaded thirty other youths of noble rank to follow his example. Made abbot of Clairvaux (1115), he erected numerous abbeys where his spirit flourished. To his disciple, Bernard of Pisa, who later became Pope Eugene III, he dedicated his work *De Consideratione*. Bernard's influence upon the princes, the clergy, and the people of his age was most remarkable. By penitential practices he so exhausted his body that it could hardly sustain his soul, ever eager to praise and honor God.
