

Dear Friends,
St. Teresa of Avila, whose memorial we celebrated this past week, was a prominent mystic during the late 16th century.

She began as a Carmelite, but felt that the order was too "comfortable" for her. Responding to an urging of the Holy Spirit, she founded the discalced (shoeless) Carmelite order, which incorporated austere poverty into the communities she founded.

Be completely devoted to God

Not everyone was happy with her choice, and there were some who were vehemently opposed to what she did and tried at every turn to discredit her and suppress the communities she founded. In essence, Teresa was attempting to remove as much of the world as she could, allowing her heart to be totally and completely devoted to God.

ant lesson: in order to receive the many graces Jesus wishes to give us, we must have a heart that is completely and totally focused on Him. The more we look to Christ and live only for Him, the more graces He is willing to pour into our hearts.

The world is the evil one's domain, and the more we gravitate toward Christ and empty ourselves of worldly things, the more the evil one will try and chain us to the world and the things that keep us from loving Christ with all our heart, soul and strength.

Be in the world but not of it

It's a delicate balance of having to interact with the world, but not allowing the world to loom over us and control us.

Teresa's forming of the Discalced Carmelites was how she chose to answer the Lord's call to be totally His ... how do we answer that call, friends?

There is a beautiful Lenten hymn entitled *Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling*. He is calling every one of us to be totally His, and in doing so, we receive a treasury of graces and gifts that are more than the world could ever give us. Updates around campus


