Dear Friends,
This past week, we celebrated the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. In 1858, our Lady appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous, who was born in 1844. She was 14 years old when the apparition of the Blessed Virgin appeared to her in the small village of Lourdes. The family had fallen into deep poverty, residing in a converted jail cell as that was all they could afford. Poverty contributed to her many struggles, including asthma, malnutrition and very little schooling. And yet, it was to this young girl that Mary revealed herself.

One day, Bernadette was fetching firewood along with a friend, and at the grotto of Massabielle, she saw a lady dressed in white. She was very frank in her visions and described exactly what she saw. She endured a host of ridicule, interrogations and disbelief with incredible faith. Many have come to receive miraculous healings at Lourdes, as can be witnessed by the many crutches and wheelchairs that are left at the shrine as a testament of the Lord's healing graces coming to the afflicted through His mother.

Pray, offer penance, trust

Mary's command was simple: pray, offer acts of penance, and trust. Those three pillars establish a firm foundation of the spiritual life. Mary encourages her children to remain close to the rosary. It carries a multitude of spiritual merits that can be used for ourselves and those that we entrust to our Lady.

As Lent begins next week, it's a perfect opportunity to offer acts of penance for those in need. When I offer an act of penance or suffering, I never do so for a specific purpose. I simply entrust it to our Lady and know that she will use those graces for those who are most in need. In all things, we trust - even when the vision is clouded and we may not necessarily know the way. If we truly believe that God is with

us, we know with all our hearts that He will sustain us through the many twists and turns life brings to us. Mary's trust was complete, and she encourages all her children to possess the same trust she had. Those graces are ours, friends; all we need do is ask for them, and they will be given us.

As Lent begins

We have arrived at Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the season of Lent. Please see the insert in this weekend's bulletin about Lenten observances. Opportunities for Adoration and the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available throughout the season.

Lent is a penitential season, but it is also a season to re-establish spiritual disciplines that may have grown a bit lax, and to experience the great love and mercy of the Lord in reconciliation. We'll also have some opportunities to pray the Stations of the Cross together as we journey with our Lord in His passion and cross.

Each year, we adopt a Lenten Service Project in which we offer our gift of treasure to a group or organization that cares for the poor and needy. This year, our sponsor will be the Solace House. It's a hospice home dedicated to the homeless. Those who are homeless and diagnosed with terminal illness are referred to Solace House for hospice care so they may receive the loving embrace of the Lord through skilled caregivers as they navigate end-of-life issues.

It's a beautiful facility, and I have great admiration for the wonderful ministry they provide there. Gifts of treasure can be sent

via the offertory system (use the Lenten Service Project fund) or a check in the basket labeled "Lenten Service Project." I'll put a few reminders in my column throughout the season.

Pray for Sinsinawa Dominicans

We recently lost two religious sisters who were daughters of the cathedral. Sr. Anne Morehouse and Sr. Mary Rathert died recently. Sr. Anne was a Racine Dominican sister, and Sr. Mary was a Sinsinawa Dominican sister. We join in prayer with their communities as we thank the Lord for their faithful ministry for so many years.

I read some sad news about the Sinsinawa Dominican house. The decision has been made to raze their chapel. Throughout the past several years, the Sinsinawa Dominican campus has been shrinking in size due to the high costs of maintenance and the decline in the number of new vocations. I have several wonderful memories of the chapel and the 30-rank Cassavant pipe organ that filled it with beautiful music. Please keep the Sinsinawa Dominican community in prayer as this process moves forward. I have no doubt that it was a painful decision to make.

Staff updates

I spoke with Lori this past week, and she is recovering well. She is grateful for all the prayers and notes of support. Becca Fischer is now in her third week with us, and I'm doing my best to impart the "divine knowledge" she needs! ☺ She's doing a great job and is a wonderful addition to the staff.

Diocesan interviews are beginning for the sacred music director position. A committee has been formed and will interview the candidates chosen from the initial interviews.

Wishing you all a blessed beginning to the Lenten season. May it be a time to grow more closely to the Lord as we detach from the world and embrace Him in the shelter of His wings.

REFLECTION ON ASH WEDNESDAY

February 18, 2026

The following information is found at www.catholicculture.org:

On Ash Wednesday small children are thrilled to receive ashes. We can tell them simply that ashes are placed on our foreheads to remind us that someday we will die and go home to heaven. For older children we need to go more deeply into the origin and significance of the day.



The season of holy Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, a solemn day of fast and abstinence. The day receives its special name from the blessing and imposition of ashes in the form of a cross on our foreheads. "Remember man that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Ashes, made by burning palms blessed the previous Palm Sunday, symbolize the transience of our earthly status. The body must fall temporarily into dust. This fact should serve as a challenge to spiritual accomplishments. Through grace we were "buried" in Christ that we may rise with him and "live unto God."

Ashes are a sacramental. Their reception with humility is a sign of penance. We wear them publicly to acknowledge our need to atone for our sins. "God desires not the death of the sinner." He is moved by our humiliation, and his justice is appeased by satisfaction.

The rite for the blessing and imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday follows the homily at Mass. It begins with an invitation to prayer, whereupon the priest continues with the Blessing of Ashes in which he asks God in his mercy to hear us because of his love for us; to bless the ashes which will mark our foreheads to remind us that we are only dust and will someday return to dust. He asks that we be faithful to the Lenten observance and thus be able to celebrate with clean hearts the paschal mystery.
