

This weekend at the 9:30 Mass we will observe the first of the three scrutinies. The second and third scrutinies will occur the following Sundays. These short rites are meant to help those entering the Church at Easter prepare to receive the sacraments. Each scrutiny is a reminder to them, and all of us, of our need to repent from sin and live a new life in Christ. There's a great line in St. Paul's letter to the Colossians where he writes about God the Father, "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of the Son of his love" (1:13)

I love this translation because it says that we Christians have been "translated" into the Kingdom of Jesus. Other versions of the Bible use the words transferred, moved, or brought. The ritual of the scrutiny helps to spiritually prepare the elect to be "translated" into Our Lord's kingdom. This happens through prayers and the laying on of hands by the priest. Please keep Paige Leo in your prayers as she goes through these ceremonies. Also pray for Lane Leo, Mary Barrett and Ashley Connor as they, too, prepare to enter the Church at the Easter Vigil. We will be celebrating the Easter Vigil this year on Saturday, March 30 at 8:00 PM.

I've been thinking (or "pondering" you could say!) a lot recently about Our Lady of Refuge. And by that, I mean not the parish, but the Woman. Reflecting on Mary as my refuge has been very helpful in my adjustment to being here at this parish as the singular priest. When I was getting settled in my office, I found a book that had been left there. It is a history of the parish, written in 1968. One line mentions that back then, the parish had nine Sunday Masses! I want to quote for you a beautiful passage written about the title of Our Lady of Refuge. I have found it to be great food for thought, and perhaps it will benefit you as you walk with both Jesus and Mary this Lent.

The Blessed Virgin is honored under many titles. The reason for this is due to the fact that all her dignity and greatness cannot be expressed or understood in one name. She is like a diamond with many facets. In order to give her due honor, the church celebrates many of her noble qualities under a separate title and often on a separate feast day.

Our parish is dedicated to the Blessed Mother under the title, "Our Lady of Refuge." What is the meaning of this title?

A refuge is defined first as a shelter or protection from danger or distress; second, that which shelters or protects. The word comes from Latin—"re," meaning "back," and "fugio," meaning "to flee."

The word "refuge" is frequently connected with ships that are being tossed about in a storm. The Captain immediately directs the course of the ship to a harbor or cove wherein the ship will be sheltered. Such a spot is a refuge.

What is true of ships is also true of our lives. At times people can be buffeted by temptations—by sin—by confused thinking. They need a refuge—a place of calm; they need to get out of the winds of living.

In the Litany of the Blessed Mother one of the invocations is, "Refuge of Sinners, pray for us." How wonderful it is to know we always have a Refuge—a Mother—to harbor us during life's storm. "Our Lady, Refuge of Sinners." What a beautiful title! She who is God's Mother and our Mother, is our Refuge, our Harbor. Her Divine Son seeks the sinners who are lost. His Mother guides them to Him. She stretches out her hand and leads them to an all-forgiving Son Who is God.

We are happy that our parish and parishioners are dedicated to her under this title of "Our Lady, Refuge of Sinners."






On Monday March 4 at 7 PM in Social Hall, I will be giving a talk to National Pastoral Musicians Detroit Chapter entitled, Music and Technology in Liturgy. It is really addressed to other church music directors, but anyone interested is welcome to attend. Below is a summary of the talk.

How can pastoral musicians employ technology in music ministry without intruding on worship? Topics in this session will include:

□ Livestreaming techniques and issues
 □ Projected lyrics vs. printed resources
 □ Sound system considerations (volume, intelligibility, balance with singing congregation)
 □ Virtual choir and recording techniques
 □ Creating and distributing SATB learning tracks and rehearsal recordings
 □ Best practices for incorporating parish website and social media into music

For these next three weeks, we will be doing the Cycle A readings and Psalms in correspondence to the scrutinies of the OCIA candidates. This Sunday we have Psalm 95, If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts. In the first reading Moses strikes a rock and life-giving water flows out to the thirsting Israelites in the desert. This Psalm has a muted desert-like joy.

Come, let us sing joyfully to the LORD; let us acclaim the Rock of our salvation. Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us joyfully sing psalms to him.

During Lent, if we have a catechumen, an unbaptized Elect member of the Order of Christian Initiation, we have special prayer services called Scrutinies. These occur during the 3rd ,4th and 5th Sundays of Lent. Those attending the 9:30 am Masses will experience these as Paige Leo comes forward with her Sponsor following the homily.

These celebrations help to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life." These are prayers we all offer through special Prayers of the Faithful. Another point of interest is that the readings during these three weeks of Lent come from the Gospel of John – Year A.

On the 3rd Sunday of Lent we hear the Samaritan Woman at the Well which teaches us about Christ the Redeemer. The 4 th Sunday of Lent about the Man Born Blind representing Christ as the light of the world. The 5th Sunday of Lent is the Raising of Lazarus which represents Christ as our resurrection and life.

I am grateful for these special moments as it reminds me in a beautiful tradition to scrutinize myself. Webster defines scrutiny as "a searching study, inquiry, or inspection: examination." All of us are called to examine our conscious every time we enter our church. It becomes especially meaningful if you do this prior to blessing ourselves with holy water as we enter the church proper. We should be aware of the grace that is washing over us and cleansing us in preparation to receiving the Eucharist.

These weeks are centered in Lent. We still have time to adjust and dive deeper into our Lenten journey. How is our Lent going? Are we growing? It is not too late to try harder.



This is part 6 of an ongoing series on the Eucharist, based on the guidelines from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. These guidelines can be found on USCCB.org under Prayer and Worship - The Mass.

- 16. At the same time an appreciation for reception of "the whole Christ" through one species should not diminish in any way the fuller sign value of reception of Holy Communion under both kinds. For just as Christ offered his whole self, body and blood, as a sacrifice for our sins, so too is our reception of his Body and Blood under both kinds an especially fitting participation in his memorial of eternal life.
- 17. From the first days of the Church's celebration of the Eucharist, Holy Communion consisted of the reception of both species in fulfillment of the Lord's command to "take and eat . . . Take and drink." The distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful under both kinds was thus the norm for more than a millennium of Catholic liturgical practice.

While Christ is truly and fully present in each of the Communion elements separately, both the bread and wine, Body and Blood, are the sign of the sacrament. Just as water is the sign of Baptism, the laying of hands is the sign of Confirmation, and the couple themselves are the sign of Marriage; the Body and Blood together are the sign of Communion.

Every sacrament in the Church uses a sign to point to a spiritual reality. Jesus is the visible image of the invisible God (Col. 1:15) and so the sacraments use visible, physical signs to help us understand spiritual realities. Our sins are washed away in the waters of baptism. The Holy Spirit is given to us in the laying on of hands, and the grace of a permanent, partnered, fruitful, and faithful relationship is shown by the man and woman together in front of the altar. Similarly, the whole of Jesus: Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity is present under the appearance of bread and wine. His one, eternal sacrifice is made present anew for us in every Mass.

It is important to note that it is only the "sign value" that is fuller when Communion is received under both kinds. As part 5 of this series demonstrated in the doctrine of concomitance, Jesus' Body and Blood are not separated when they are before us under the appearance of bread and wine. So we do receive both the Body and Blood even if we only consume the host or only drink from the cup. However, it is much easier to understand how we receive both the Body and Blood of Jesus when we both eat and drink at Communion.

Finally, we know from written sources in the earliest days of Christianity that all people gathered to share in the Lord's Supper did receive Communion under both kinds and that it was a later development in the Church which led to the practice of the lay congregation receiving only the host.




