The Forth Sunday of Lent ~ Laetare Sunday

Traditionally, the Fourth Sunday of Lent is called Laetare Sunday (Rejoice Sunday). Anticipating Easter joy, today's readings invite us to rejoice by being reconciled with God through repentance and the confession of our sins and by celebrating our coming home to be with our loving and forgiving God.

In the first reading, the Chosen People of God are portrayed as celebrating, for the first time in their own land, the feast of their freedom, by using wheat that had grown in the Promised Land. In today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 34), a rejoicing Psalmist invites us, "Glorify the Lord with me; let us together extol His Name!" In the second reading, St. Paul invites the Corinthian Christian community to rejoice because Jesus has reconciled them with God by his suffering and death.

Today's Gospel celebrates the joy of the prodigal son on his "homecoming" where he discovers his father's forgiving and overflowing love. It is also the story of the joy of a loving and forgiving father who celebrates the return of his prodigal son by throwing a big party in his honor, a banquet celebrating the reconciliation of the son with his father, his family, his community, and his God. At the same time, in his self-righteous elder brother's angry reaction to the prodigal's return, Jesus invites us to avoid self-righteousness and self-justification by imitating the repentant younger brother. Let us admit the truth that we are an assembly of repentant, sinful people, who are now ready to receive God's forgiveness, to experience Jesus' Personal Presence in the Holy Eucharist as our loving and forgiving God and so to love and forgive each other making, generous and lasting peace.

Life messages: 1) Let us return to our Heavenly Father with repentant hearts: As prodigal children, we face spiritual famine all around us in the form of drug and alcohol abuse, fraud and theft in the workplace, murders, abortions and violence, pornography, premarital sex, marital infidelity, and priestly infidelity, as well as in hostility between and among people. All of these evils have proliferated because we have been squandering God's abundant blessings, not only in our country and in our families, but also in our personal lives. Hence, let us repent and return to our Heavenly Father's home.

2) Holy Mass enhances our "pass over," from a world of sin to a world of reconciliation. At every Mass, we come to our loving Heavenly Father's house as prodigal children acknowledging that we have sinned ("I confess to Almighty God"). In the Offertory, we give ourselves back to the Father, and this is the moment of our surrendering our sinful lives to God our Father. At the consecration, we hear God's invitation through Jesus: "... this is My Body, which will be given up for you... this is the chalice of My Blood ... which will be poured out for you..." (= "All I have is yours"). In Holy Communion, we participate in the banquet of reconciliation, thus restoring our full relationship with God and our fellow human beings. (Fr. Tony's Homilies)



The psalmist begins with a resolute commitment to constant praise, acknowledging God's unwavering faithfulness in all circumstances. This consistent recognition of God's character flows naturally from a devoted heart.

The psalm also extends an invitation to collective worship, emphasizing the strength in shared faith and encouraging a unified expression of adoration. Uniting voices amplifies individual spiritual experiences and fosters mutual encouragement.

The psalmist then shares a personal account of seeking the Lord and finding solace and liberation from anxieties, highlighting a responsive relationship with God. Such personal experiences powerfully testify to God's active presence.

The passage further encourages focusing on the Divine, urging us to allow His grace to transform us and dispel discouragement, leading to inner peace.

Ultimately, Psalm 34 emphasizes the paramount importance of a personal relationship with God, particularly during Lent. It reminds us that He is our Savior, the ultimate source of our trust and hope. As those chosen and loved by Him, this season offers a unique opportunity to draw closer and, together, glorify the Lord.

This week, I'd like to start by sharing something that I recently read about the traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

I've spent many Lenten seasons believing I was praying, fasting, and giving so that I could do something for Jesus. The reality is that, instead, every Lent Jesus has desired to do something in me. The prayer practices, Lenten fasts, and extra almsgiving are only the methods by which I open myself up to this work Jesus is doing.

I fast from something so that I prevent any disordered attachments from forming that would keep me from loving Jesus well. In my fasting, I free up areas of my life where—in the absence of one thing—I can experience Christ more deeply. He wants to work in this fasting.

In my prayer, I encounter Jesus in a new way during Lent. By going to common Lenten prayers, like Stations of the Cross or a parish mission, I give Jesus opportunities to speak to me or, simply, to be with me. He wants to move in these encounters.

And when I give during Lent, whether through financial charity or serving others, I encounter Jesus within the space I create. He reminds me that he has given me the greatest gift, and as I receive, so I should give.

Lent was never about what we do for Jesus, but I've often made it that way. Instead, Lent is about the new thing that Jesus wishes to do in my life, and what I "do" is merely open up my heart to receive it.

So often, when we choose to 'give up something for Lent', it becomes us testing our own willpower. How long can we go without this or that thing which we enjoy? Spoiler alert: it's pretty much always less than 40 days, even if we allow ourselves to indulge on Sunday. That's why I really like this perspective on the Lenten disciplines. Now, there's nothing wrong with testing our willpower, or building up our self-control; but is that really what Jesus is calling us to do? If all we're doing is strengthening our resolve, we're missing the point of Lent.


Instead of relying on ourselves to make a holy Lent, let us all try to rely on Jesus. Our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving should lead us to Jesus, be our way of seeking him in this penitential season. The things we do during Lent should open us to what Jesus wants to do for us and in us during Lent.

Last week, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Annunciation, when the angel Gabriel came to the Blessed Virgin Mary and told her that she would be the mother of God. I'm not expecting angels to appear to us - though if you do see one, I'd love to hear about it! But I am expecting God wants to tell us something, he has a message for every one of us. We need to be open to hearing him, we need to be quiet enough to give him the opportunity to come to us. God is a gentleman; he won't interrupt, he won't let himself in. He stands at the door and knocks. We may not be full of grace to respond, "Let it be done to me...", but may we have enough grace to listen and to give a response.


Easter Flowers

Let There Be Light!

Dear Parishioners,

As many of you have noticed, the lighting in our worship space has been less than ideal—some lights are too bright, some are not working at all, and others flicker, causing discomfort. We are aware of these issues and have consulted with a lighting company to find a solution that won't break the bank.



The good news is we've received a proposal for new light fixtures that will fit into our existing fixtures, provide better fitted lights, and eliminate the harsh glare. We have 92 fixtures that need to be updated. The total cost for materials is \$1,259, with labor at \$5,520, bringing the entire project to \$6,779 – that's \$74 per light, including labor.

We're grateful to share that a generous parishioner has already donated \$1,200 toward this project (thank you, anonymous benefactor!). Now, we're reaching out to see if you'd be willing to help us improve our sanctuary by "buying a light." Donations can be mailed to the parish office or placed in the Offertory basket with a memo that reads: "Buy a Light."

We're so thankful for your ongoing support and generosity. May God bless you for your kindness!
