PASTOR'S ANNUAL LETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF SAINT NICHOLAS AND SAINT WILLIAM


As I reflect upon the past year, I am filled with gratitude and hope for the journey we have undertaken on the road to spiritual renewal, taking as our roadmap our Diocesan Pastoral Plan— **“Renewed in Christ. Together in Mission.”**

I am glad that you have both the opportunity to receive and the time to review our 2024-2025 Saint Nicholas and Saint William Annual Report, which includes our annual financial report.

"Peace be with all of you!" The first words of **Pope Leo XIV**. The Conclave elected Robert Francis Cardinal Prevost as the 267th Bishop of Rome. The new pope was announced to the waiting crowds by Cardinal Protodeacon Dominique Mamberti on May 8. *Never did I ponder the thought of a pope from Chicago, some 350 miles from my native birthplace in Cleveland, Ohio.*



Some of the highlights this past year include:



Meeting Fr. Gary Thomas, former pastor of St. Nicholas, at the **2025 West Coast Walk for Life**.



Hosting Fr. David Michael Moses for an evening of music, teaching, prayer, and laughter. The place was packed!



Taking center court at Santa Clara University for the annual **Revs vs. Sems Basketball Game**.



Opening the doors of St. William Church for **Adoration and Confessions** every Wednesday evening.



Celebrating the **Sacraments of Initiation** at the Easter Vigil.



Carrying the Blessed Sacrament on an eight-mile journey through Santa Clara with over a thousand people as part of this year's **Camino de California Eucharist Pilgrimage**.

Traveling to **Lake Tahoe** to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance with over 250 youth, including several from our own parish.



Is the **Shroud of Turin** the first witness to Christ's resurrection? Amazing talk on the story of the Shroud. St. William Church was overflowing with about 550 people! **Fr. Andrew Dalton's** knowledge is extraordinary regarding this gift from Jesus to all of us, thousands of years later.



We celebrated the end of the year with our annual Volunteer Fiesta, featuring margaritas, Tacos, and a Mariachi Band. Thank you for your service to our parish.

We offer 11 daily Masses and 8 Sunday Masses. Each Mass needs the support of liturgical ministers (choir members, ushers, lectors, altar servers). Our several choirs have grown and taken on the task of ongoing formation under the pastoral leadership of our liturgical team. Please consider sharing your time and talent in support of the liturgical assembly that gathers for the Sunday Eucharist. **Pastoral Plan – Worship (Objective I)**

We offer a vibrant faith formation program for both children (pre-school through grade 5) and youth (grades 6-12). Imagine if your education in writing, science, and math ended in the second grade. Catholic faith formation is a **form of evangelization**. It describes all the ways the Church—including clergy, religious, and all the baptized faithful—teaches, celebrates, and witnesses to the gospel message with the aim of conforming hearts and minds to Jesus Christ. **Pastoral Plan – Faith Formation (Objective II.)**



The introduction of "Friday Night Café" gathered both parishioners and school parents for an evening of community and learning. This year's topics were "Whether STEM really is the foundation of a good education today", "Catholicism and the Family: How to Keep the Light On" & "Does AI Enhance or Diminish Human Dignity". "In our parishes and schools, the People of God, especially parents of all types, can expect:

Training and formation on how to share the Catholic faith with their children and grandchildren, whether they are infants, children, teens, or adults." **Pastoral Plan – Family Ministry – Objective V.**

Liturgy



Over the past year, we have continued strengthening our liturgy and the formation of our liturgical ministers, with a strong emphasis on recruitment. Thanks be to God, we have seen our number of active ministers continue to grow. This year, we were blessed with 78 lectors, 71 Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, 29 altar servers, 19 sacristans, and 55 hospitality ministers.



With many transitions this year—including welcoming our new music coordinator, Clare Lee—we were not able to maintain the same number of workshops as the previous year. Even so, we successfully held two Altar Server training sessions, a Lector Workshop, and a joint Eucharistic Minister Workshop with St. Thomas Aquinas Parish, hosted at Our Lady of the Rosary in Palo Alto.



Sound at St. Nicholas

We've made some improvements at St. Nicholas, with an updated sound system and ambo microphone.

Sunday Mass attendance

Mass attendance this year averaged **921 people per weekend**. In addition to our daily 8:00 a.m. and 12:10 p.m. Masses, we continued our Wednesday Adoration and Confessions, as well as Thursday morning Adoration, both of which have seen a growing number of faithful participants. We also celebrated occasional Wednesday evening Masses—often organized by our Young Adult community—and we are planning to make this part of our regular Mass schedule moving forward.



Floral Ministry

While we have continued to grow our floral ministry at St. Nicholas Church, we have also begun building a small Floral Ministry team at St. William Church.

Music Ministry

We are thrilled to share that our Music Ministry continues to flourish!

Not only is the number of choir members growing, but their musicianship is also developing beautifully. All four choirs are now singing in parts, and each group has its own unique character.

At **St. Nicholas Church**, we feature the organ with choir every Sunday at 10:00 AM, and a lovely combination of solo voice, violin, and piano at the 8:00 AM Mass.

At **St. William Church**, our Sunday morning liturgies are enriched by piano, violin, guitar, and ukulele. The 5:00 PM Mass is led by a talented band, which continues to be a favorite among our young adults.

This past year, we celebrated many highlights:

- Welcoming several new members to each choir and supporting them in finding their voices.
- Expanding our repertoire to include both traditional hymns and contemporary liturgical songs.
- Providing opportunities for people to participate as cantors, instrumentalists, and singers.

We are deeply grateful to all our choir members, cantors, instrumentalists, and sound technicians for their dedication, time, and talent. Your commitment makes every liturgy an uplifting experience for our parish communities.

Looking ahead, we hope to continue strengthening our choirs' skills and explore new ways to integrate music into parish events and outreach, enriching our spiritual life together.

Thank you to everyone who supports the Music Ministry with encouragement, prayer, and participation. Together, we lift our hearts and voices to the Lord!



Lenten Soup Suppers

Adoration, Stations of the Cross, & Soup



We came together as a community on Fridays during Lent for Adoration and Stations of the Cross. We then gathered to share a simple meal of meatless soup and practice outreach to the vulnerable through the Corporal Works of Mercy.

That's why it's called SOUP: **Share Ourselves to Uplift People!**

Outreach projects during Lent included:

- *Give Drink to the Thirsty*: Juice Box collection for Catholic Charities
- *Shelter the Homeless*: Hygiene items for Catholic Charities
- *Alms for the Poor*: Rice Bowl donations
- *Visit the Imprisoned*: Prayer Hands for Kairos Prison Ministry

Outreach Ministry

Compassion Week - September 2024

Over 190 projects were completed throughout the bay area, providing various opportunities for everyone regardless of age or ability. Participants came together to focus on specific concerns such as hunger, homelessness and education.

At Saint Nicholas and Saint William parish, we offered the following projects:

- Rise Against Hunger - 65 volunteers prepared 11,016 meal kits
- Fleece Tie Blankets - 50 volunteers prepared 30 blankets
- Hygiene Kits - 75 volunteers prepared 800 hygiene kits for Catholic Charities
- Crayon Sorting - Thousands of crayons sorted for the Crayon Initiative project
- Blood Drive - 31 units of blood collected



Outreach Ministry (continued)

In addition, St. Nicholas School offered the following projects for the students:

- **Brown Bag Decorating** - 50 students/volunteers prepared 50 bags
- **Hygiene Kits** - 50 students/volunteers prepared 400 hygiene kits
- **Fleece Tie Blankets** - 90 students/volunteers prepared 90 blankets
- **Rise Against Hunger** - 70 students/volunteers prepared 10,152 meal kits
- **Cards of Affirmation & Care Kits** - 55 students prepared 55 kits



Hugs in a Mug Outreach - December 2024

Our Volunteer Angels delivered close to 100 “Hugs in a Mug” care packages, bringing comfort and connection to seniors and the homebound parishioners.

Bridges to Community

Over the past year, our parish community has continued to serve with generous hearts, meeting the needs of our neighbors through a wide range of outreach efforts.

In July, our blood drive collected **40 units of blood**, while the annual Backpack Drive provided **94 backpacks and \$3,575 in gift cards** to help students begin the school year prepared. During Compassion Week in September, Bridges to Community took the lead with preparation of the **hygiene kits**.



In November, we **welcomed 30 handicapped guests** for Mass, a warm luncheon, and a creative art project through the Handicapables ministry.



December's **Giving Tree** was a tremendous blessing once again, distributing **\$14,220 in gift cards** to eight charitable partners, including St. Vincent de Paul, the Day Worker Program, Heritage Home, Sacred Heart Homework Club, Help One Child, Refugee Youth services, the After School Reading Program, and a local Domestic Violence program.



Outreach Ministry (continued)

The new year began with a January **blood drive** that collected **32 units of blood**, followed by a remarkable **Coat Drive** that provided **702 coats**—along with sweaters and scarves—to LifeMoves.



In February, the **Layette Drive** collected **200 baby items** for distribution by visiting nurses to families in need.

The **Works of Mercy** during **Lenten Soup Suppers** in March inspired an outpouring of generosity (report on Page 9)

In June, parishioners responded once again with compassion, filling a carload of **hygiene items** for the families of **St. Leo's Parish**.

Throughout the entire year, ongoing monthly deliveries of **non-perishable food** were made to **St. Vincent de Paul and CSA**, sustaining vital support for individuals and families facing food insecurity.

Together, these acts of service reflect a parish community living out the Gospel with love, generosity, and steadfast commitment to those in need.


- **Glühwein**

Sunday Hospitality Ministry

Each Sunday after the morning Masses at both St. Nicholas and St. William, our Hospitality Ministry provides donuts, coffee, tea, and juice—and on the first Sunday of the month, bagels with cream cheese are also served. The ministry seeks to foster a warm, faith-filled community by giving parishioners an opportunity to gather after Mass, enjoy a treat, and socialize. We are grateful for the many volunteers whose dedication makes this ministry possible and keeps it thriving.



Events Hospitality

We are blessed with a team of dedicated volunteers who assist with hospitality at various events, including Parish Missions and Speaker Nights.



Bereavement Ministry

Our Bereavement Ministry continues to answer the call to accompany those who are grieving with compassion and dedication. The group is for those who seek consolation after death of a loved one - be the death recent or not. The ministry seeks to give voice to our unique journeys of grief with the hope of finding healing and spiritual growth.


Since last year, the ministry has offered two grief-support cycles. Each cycle typically includes **5–6 weekly meetings**, lasting **two hours** each. The sessions are led by **Carin Powers** and **Lynn Hastings**, who serve as the ministry's lead facilitators. They are supported by the calling team, whose members reach out to participants for regular welfare checks and continued care.

Homebound Ministry

We currently bring the celebration of the **Holy Eucharist** to Bridgepoint and The Terraces. Mass is held once a month in each Facility. We also have ministers who visit The Terraces, Bridgepoint, Sunnyvale Sub Acute Facility and homes. A goal for this ministry is to be able to lead a communion service in the Facilities on a regular basis.

Vocations Ministry

The purpose of the Chalice Program was to encourage families to pray and promote vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life. The Consecrated Chalice is a tangible reminder of this particular intention for the Church. The Second Vatican Council highlights the laity's responsibility to pray for and support vocations. This urgent call has been strongly affirmed in the writings and addresses of Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI. Praying for vocations is the most powerful way to support them.



A vocation is a call from the Holy Spirit, a gift from God nurtured in prayer. When we pray for vocations, we lift up to our Father those men and women whom He is calling Him in an exceptional way.

This program at Saint Nicholas and Saint William began on the first Sunday of November 2024 as we celebrated the Vocation Promotion Week, and we continued it through the end of March 2025.



Faith Formation

Within our Faith Formation program for children, we are grateful to have introduced the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd this year for our 3 to 5 year olds. This program is a catechetical program inspired by the methods of the Italian Catholic physician and educator Dr. Maria Montessori. It combines teaching from Scripture and liturgy with Montessori education methods — think of a prepared environment with a lot of sensory, hands-on work, aiming to align to a child’s development level. We continue to offer our sacramental prep classes for First Holy Communion in Years I & 2, while broadening the children’s relationship with Christ as well as providing religious education through 5th grade.



Faith Formation Enrollment numbers

- Catechesis of the Good Shepherd – 10 students, 2 catechists
- Faith Formation (1st to 5th grades) – 45 students, 8 catechists
- OCIA adapted for our youth (includes all initiation sacraments not yet received) – 12 students
- VBS – 40 campers, 19 youth counselors, 7 adult counselors



Vacation Bible Camp

In June, we had a very successful Vacation Bible Camp. 40 campers enjoyed a Totally Catholic and Totally *True North* week of praise, worship, fun and friendship!



Mental Health Ministry

Our Mental Health Ministry continued this year with the Sanctuary Course for Catholics (a seven week course to help understand mental health and end the stigma), we introduced the Blue Christmas Service in December and hosted the NAMI Mental Health 101 Class.

We are proud to have been named as **A Mental Health Friendly, Stigma Free Congregation** by NAMI Santa Clara County FaithNet based on our programs we have offered to our community.



Youth Ministry

This past year has been one of tremendous growth and grace in our youth and young adult ministries. By God's glory, our high school ministry doubled in size compared to last year, and our middle school and young adult groups continued to flourish in faith and fellowship.

Our youth participated in powerful experiences, such as LA Congress and the Diocesan Youth Retreat (DYR), and **31 young people received the Sacrament of Confirmation**. We were also blessed to celebrate one of our teens, Joseph Tadros, who received the **St. Maria Goretti Award** at *Saints in the City*.

It has truly been a joyful and fruitful year—one filled with community, discipleship, and the abundant blessings of God.

Care for Creation Ministry

This past year, the Care for Creation Team continued its mission of fostering environmental stewardship across our parish campuses. At the request of the Care for Creation Team, bike racks were installed at both churches to encourage sustainable transportation. Throughout the month of September, Care for Creation banners were prominently displayed to commemorate the month, culminating in the celebration of St. Francis' feast day.



During Lent, the team hosted one evening of Stations of the Cross focused on care for creation. We also advocated for the inclusion of environmental intentions within the Prayers of the Faithful at Mass. One of our committee members remains actively involved with the Diocesan *Stewards of Our Common Home* Committee, strengthening our collaboration with parishes across the diocese.



The team was pleased to add a third tree to the St. William campus, further enhancing our parish greenery. In support of waste reduction, we requested that the small organic waste bin be made available on Donut Sundays, as all items used are fully compostable. The team also continued to explore the possibility of solar installation for the parish.



Members of our team attended the Climate Action Summit in Los Altos, sponsored by Rotary, to stay informed and connected with broader community efforts. Additionally, our committee regularly monitors waste disposal at parish events, helping parishioners make proper choices about recycling, composting, and landfill materials.

Garden Ministry

The Garden Ministry keeps the St. Nicholas grounds beautiful and well-maintained. Their work includes mowing, blowing, raking, sweeping, and detailed gardening tasks. We are deeply grateful for the many hours our volunteers—affectionately known as “Garden Angels”—have dedicated to making the parish grounds so welcoming.

In September 2024, thanks to a generous restricted donation, our Garden Ministry at the St. Nicholas site completed an important enhancement project: the irrigation system for the lot across from the Church on Sherman Street was replaced and upgraded. M. Oteiza Landscaping was contracted to carry out the improvements.

This upgrade will ensure that our plants will continue to thrive and the property remains beautiful for all who visit.



The ministry meets weekly on Friday mornings and has thrived under strong leadership.

Don and Gretchen McPhail served faithfully for many years before retiring in December.

In January, Ron Pellegrini assumed leadership, and the ministry is growing, with new parishioners joining and contributing to this important work.



Facilities

The remodel of the Saint Nicholas and Saint William Parish Office was completed in November 2024, creating a fresh, welcoming, and functional space to serve our parish community. The updated office features new floors, cabinets, LED lighting, expanded workspaces, and a new parlor for meetings. The remodeled office provides a comfortable environment for both administrative work and parish gatherings. 



Financial Report




