


SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

"Every year the **Feast of Corpus Christi** invites us to renew the wonder and joy for this wonderful gift of the Lord, which is the Eucharist." states EWTN. This year, the Solemnity of Corpus Christi is on June 19, but it is transferred to **Sunday, June 22** in some dioceses.

What does Corpus Christi Mean?

Corpus Christi is a Latin term meaning "body" (corpus) of "Christ" (Christi). The feast by this name was



Initially the feast was called simply, "Corpus Christi," and has retained that name in the local Catholic customs of many countries. It is also called "Corpus Domini," which similarly means "Body of the Lord." The official name in English is, "The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ." This name more accurately summarizes the entire mystery of the Eucharist, as it includes Jesus' body and blood.

Currently, the feast has been moved in many places to the Sunday following Trinity Sunday to make it possible for more of the faithful to participate in the **Mass of Corpus Christi.**



We owe the feast of Corpus Christi to a 13th-century Belgian nun named Juliana. Orphaned at the age of



5, she and her sister were housed on a small farm belonging to a double monastery of Norbertines.

She had a deep devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and Jesus gave her a mission through visions. From the age of 16 on she had a series of visions of the full moon obscured by a dark spot. At first fearing that her visions were of demonic origin, Juliana came to discern that instead the moon represented the Church's liturgical year, and the dark spot was a missing feast in honor of Christ present in the Sacrament. She set out to make the church

recognize a special feast for the Body and Blood of Christ. But how? She was a nun in the middle ages without any power or influence. Enter Father Peter of Prague. He was wrestling with the debate at the time about just how real the Real Presence was. His doubts were quelled when he was celebrating Mass and blood began seeping from the consecrated host. Father Peter brought this miracle to the bishop, who was also aware of St. Juliana's visions. That same bishop soon became Pope Urban IV, who proclaimed the feast of Corpus Christi to the whole Church.

While Holy Thursday commemorates the institution of the Eucharist, the joyful mystery of the Transubstantiation was, Juliana believed, overshadowed by the solemn events of Holy Week. Juliana thought her visions were telling her to promote such a feast, to be celebrated on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. Restoring the Eucharist to its central position in our lives is quite simply the only hope we have of getting through the dark nights. *(aleteia.org)*

THE GIFT AND MYSTERY OF THE PRIESTHOOD

Each time we celebrate the ordination of new priests we have an opportunity to reflect on the gift and mystery of the ordained priesthood in the life of the Church.

Every member of the Church benefits from the ministry of priests. Priests, bishops and even Pope Leo himself depend on the ministry of priests for their sacramental life. No one can be a priest to himself. There certainly are different states of life in the Church – clergy, lay, consecrated religious – however, every member of the Church, regardless of his or her state of life, is a disciple in need of priestly ministry.



Saint John Paul II was fond of quoting Saint John Marie Vianney, the Cure of Ars, who said, "The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus."

Jesus is the paschal lamb who revealed the Father's love and poured out his very being for us in his incarnation, passion, and death and resurrection. It is through the holy priesthood that Jesus continues to pour himself out for his people.

Each of the seven sacraments is an outward visible sign instituted by Christ, which communicates his invisible grace. The Sacrament of Holy Orders communicates a participation in Christ's own mission, which he entrusted to his apostles and their companions.

The priest is an ordinary man configured sacramentally to Jesus Christ so he can be an efficacious sign of Jesus' presence with his people and to care for them. The Good Shepherd continues to accompany his people through the humanity of his priests.

Our reflection upon the great gift and mystery of the priesthood leads us to a greater awareness of God's presence and action in our lives. It also can lead us to an awareness that priests do not drop out of the sky, but come from ordinary homes, families and parishes. Just like the bread and wine for the Eucharist come from wheat fields and vineyards, and the water for Baptism comes from rain and reservoirs, the man called to be a priest comes from a family and a parish.



It is a great blessing in the life of a parish when a son of the parish, after discernment and formation, is ordained a priest. The experience of someone being called from among us provides insight into the humanity of the priest and his priesthood. Seeing someone who you watched grow up celebrating Mass for the first time is a profoundly moving moment.

The priests, who will minister to future generations here in our archdiocese, are in the pews of your parishes today. Some have already begun to hear the Lord's mysterious call inviting them to consider the possibility of a vocation to the priesthood.

We need young men who know and love the Lord Jesus. Young men who, as Pope Francis said, are convinced that "it is not the same thing to have known Jesus as not to have known him."

We need men who have a hunger for souls, who say with Saint Paul, "Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel." The Church needs men of service and communion willing to lay down their lives for the good of their brothers and sisters.





Our times call for courageous shepherds ready and equipped to lead with confidence in the way of truth.

On June 28, the Lord will provide two new priests for the people of God in the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City. We give thanks to God for the gift of Father John Grim and Father Jonah Beckham. Their ordination is a sign to us of God's faithfulness and that the Church is constantly being renewed by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Empires will rise and fall, but the Catholic Church continues to be renewed in each new generation. One day these brand-new young priests will be wise old priests, and they will witness the ordination of priests who are not yet born. The mission will stay

the same even though the world in which the Church will find itself will change.



There still will be men the Lord calls to lay down their lives as shepherds in service to their brothers and sisters. Souls will stand in need of the care and accompaniment of the Good Shepherd, and he will not cease to call and raise up priests to be signs and instruments of his grace and mercy.



A NEW PRIEST AND HIS FIRST BLESSINGS.

One of the most impactful aspects of being a newly ordained priest is the opportunity to give first blessings. This typically begins immediately after priestly ordination, when many of the faithful line up to receive from the new priest words of peace spoken over outstretched hands recently anointed with sacred chrism — hands set apart as Christ's instruments to bless and sanctify.

While I knew it would be moving to bless family members and friends, I was surprised by the number of strangers who approached me. Many of them came with special requests for prayers: for their families, for themselves, for healing, peace, conversion, and other needs. These were intimate moments, in which I was invited to step into the dialogue of faith and trust between Jesus and his people, as one chosen to be his representative in their midst. My new configuration to Jesus was palpable as, like the master during his earthly ministry, crowds gathered to seek his attention to their needs and burdens.

The experience of first blessings is certainly a witness to the power of the ministerial priesthood. It is also, however, a witness to the profound solidarity that exists among us all, manifested whenever we share our burdens with others in request for prayer. Solidarity is a feature of our common humanity, which binds us together in the shared vulnerability of human beings in a world that is difficult and fallen. This sharing is intensified by the sacramental bonds of baptism and the Eucharist, that make us one in the Body of Christ that is the Church. Thus can St. Paul conclude, "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (1 Cor 12:26).

The experience of imparting priestly blessings is a special one, yet it also exemplifies the power of prayer in general to bring together people, who would otherwise be strangers, into an intimate sharing of spiritual goods. We all have the power to give and receive blessing. We bless and are blessed by owning our common vulnerability as human beings and as Christians, by sharing each other's burdens, and by interceding before the Lord on each other's behalf. Wherever you may be in your journey of faith, whatever the needs and prayers you have to contribute to our common spiritual treasury, I encourage you to harness this power. (Aleteia.org)
