### Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



Dear friends of Blessed Trinity, Faith is a gift but also a responsibility.

Like any youngster, my brother and I very much enjoyed any time we received a gift as children. Whether it

was our father coming home from a work trip with a small matchbox car or a new boardgame our mother would present under the Christmas tree, unwrapping a new gift and discovering a new game was a time for childhood jubilation.

While my first action after the flutter of paper and the unraveling of ribbon would often be straight for the manual, my brother would arrange the pieces or plug in the controllers. With quick intuition, he would examine each component and figure out their working, while I could too often fall into the weeds with the pages of disclaimers and troubleshooting. After a moment or two, we would switch positions and he'd read up on the game play while I would study the board or open a lingering package. Yet, despite our somewhat varied approaches, we reveled in the gift and soon were mastering the game.

So it is with faith.

St. Paul exhorts us "to stir into flame the gift of God that you have"! Recognize that you and I have a gift from God and it is up to us to engage it! "For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control" (2 Tim. 1:6). As we read Sacred Scripture and break open the manual that is the Holy Bible, we then put into practice that which we have received. The promise of God's Word and the vitality of new life.

The apostles ask our Lord in the Gospel to "Increase our faith" as though it remains under His control, like a hand on a spigot. Rather, He challenges us "If you have the faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea', and it would obey you".

Faith is a gift and it is our responsibility to cultivate and care for it. Like a seed that can grow, taking root deeply within and spreading wide its reach, so too can our faith lead us to amazing things. You and I have the power of holy works and the promise of eternal life. Each and every one of us have received great gifts of faith, hope, and love to be engaged and to be shared.

In the end, it's in our hands. Read the manual, examine the pieces of your life, and put that faith into action!



### A NOTE ABOUT RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION UNDER BOTH "SPECIES"

If you participated in my Mass of Thanksgiving on June 22, the Feast of Corpus Christi, you noticed that Holy Communion was offered under both "species" (that is, both the consecrated host and the consecrated wine). Allow me to explain some of the history and theology about why this practice is praiseworthy, but not always necessary.



At the same time, the USCCB points out that this practice was discontinued in the life of the Church over 1,000 years ago. It did not return until the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council in the 1960s. Reception under both species may have been your experience for much of your life, but it is still a recent development.

In the 15<sup>th</sup> century, the Church experienced considerable debate over this practice, in what is known as the "Utraquism" controversy. The word comes from the Latin word, *utraque*, meaning "both." Adherents to Utraquism claimed one could not be saved unless one received communion under both species. Like most heresies, it began in a well-intentioned place and then ran off track. Utraquists literally interpreted one verse from the Gospel of John and ran with it: "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you" (6:53).





## **OUR FAITH.**

The Church responded to this challenge with official teaching from the Council of Trent in the 16th century. It is worth quoting in full:

"immediately after the consecration the true body of our Lord and His true blood exist along with His soul and divinity under the form of bread and wine. The body is present under the form of bread and the blood under the form of wine, by virtue of the words [of Christ]. The same body, however, is under the form of wine and the blood under the form of bread, and the soul under either form, by virtue of the natural link and concomitance by which the parts of Christ the Lord, who has now risen from the dead and will die no more, are mutually united."

The technical word for teaching is "concomitance." Jesus' Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity are always united; His Godhead and humanity always exist together and can never be separated. For this reason, the Catechism of the Catholic Church states: "Since Christ is sacramentally present under each of the species, communion under the species of bread alone makes it possible to receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace" (1390).

One simple way to understand this is by our devotion here to the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. During Benediction, the priest or deacon says the following prayer:

Lord Jesus Christ, You gave us the Eucharist as the memorial of Your suffering and death. May our worship of this sacrament of Your Body and Blood, help us to experience the salvation won for us and the peace of the kingdom, where You live with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

Note, however, that we are only adoring Jesus under one species: that of His Body; we do not have a chalice of the Precious Blood on the altar with the monstrance. It is the same idea when we receive communion: we receive Jesus totally, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

In conclusion, the reception of Holy Communion under both species is commendable, but not necessary. The full graces of communion are totally available in either species (with the increase in gluten intolerance, some Catholics now only receive the Precious Blood). There are also practical realities to consider when offering both species, such as enough priests, deacons, or Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, the prevention of spills, the purifying of more sacred vessels, not to mention the new normal of a post-COVID world.

Certain occasions, however—like a Mass of Thanksgiving for Ordination to the Priesthood, or even the Solemnity of Corpus Christi itself—are especially opportune times to offer the faithful communion under both species. In fact, one could even say it is "right and just."

But one thing is always clear: to quote Carlo Acutis, the Church's newest saint, the Eucharist—received under any species—is still our "highway to heaven!"

### OCTOBER: THE MONTH OF THE HOLY ROSARY

The Catholic Church dedicates the month of October to the Holy Rosary, a prayer that has served as a beacon of hope, a source of comfort, and a mighty weapon for believers throughout history. This devotion is not only deeply rooted in Marian apparitions but also commemorates significant victories and reflects the powerful intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Let us explore the origins and significance of this timeless prayer.

THE ROSARY: A GIFT FROM THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY According to an account by a fifteenth-century Dominican, Alan de la Roch, the Rosary was given to St. Dominic by the Blessed Virgin Mary in 1206. St. Dominic, known for his valiant fight against the Albigensian heresy, had been tirelessly praying and doing severe penances because of his lack of success. During one of his moments of despair, Mary appeared to him, praised his efforts, and handed him the Rosary, explaining its uses and promising its efficacy in battling heresy. From that day, the Rosary became St. Dominic's powerful spiritual tool, a prayer that has been embraced by the faithful for generations.

**THE FEAST OF OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY** The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary was established by Pope St. Pius V in 1571. This celebration commemorated the naval victory of the Christian fleet over the Muslim Turks at the Battle of Lepanto. This victory was attributed to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, whose help was invoked by praying the Rosary. This significant event demonstrated the power of the Rosary and solidified it as a powerful tool for spiritual and temporal victories.

#### LEO XIII AND THE INSTITUTION OF OCTOBER AS THE MONTH OF THE ROSARY

Pope Leo XIII, who deeply appreciated the value of the Rosary, officially dedicated the month of October to the Holy Rosary through an encyclical published on September 1, 1883. In his message, he admonished the faithful to dedicate this month to the Queen of the Holy Rosary, seeking her intercession for the Church's needs. For nineteen years, he continued to publish encyclicals emphasizing the importance of the Rosary in protecting and comforting the Church.

Pope Leo XIII also decreed that every year during October, including the first and second days of November, five decades of the Rosary and the Litany of Loreto were to be recited in churches dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Additionally, he added a prayer in honor of St. Joseph to encourage the faithful to seek intercession for the Church's needs and obtain abundant graces.

**INDULGENCES ASSOCIATED WITH THE ROSARY** In recognition of the power and efficacy of the Rosary, the Church has also attached various indulgences to its recitation. For example, a plenary indulgence can be obtained on the feast of the Holy Rosary for those who recite it daily throughout the octave. These indulgences reflect the immense spiritual benefits associated with the Rosary, encouraging Catholics to adopt this beautiful practice in their daily lives.

THE STRUCTURE AND MYSTERIES OF THE ROSARY The structure of the Rosary as we know it today includes 20 mysteries that meditate upon the principal events in the lives of Jesus and Mary. The Rosary consists of four sets of mysteries: Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious, and Luminous. The 150 Hail Marys (now expanded to 200) correspond to the number of Psalms in the Bible. This simple yet profound prayer became particularly popular during times when many people were illiterate and could not read the Psalms. The repetition of the Hail Mary was a means of participating in the sacred rhythms of prayer.

The first part of the Hail Mary comes from the Gospel of St. Luke, while the second part was added by Church tradition. The mysteries allow the faithful to meditate upon key moments in the lives of Christ and the Blessed Virgin. Pope Paul VI beautifully remarked that a Rosary without meditation on these mysteries is like a body without life, emphasizing the importance of contemplating these holy moments while praying.

THE POWER OF THE HOLY ROSARY TODAY The Rosary remains a powerful prayer that continues to draw people closer to God and strengthen their spiritual lives. Whether praying for peace, for family, or for the Church, the Rosary is a symbol of hope and a channel of grace. As we dedicate October to the Holy Rosary, let us take time to reflect on its origins, its spiritual power, and the devotion of countless saints who have prayed it before us.

"The Rosary is a matter of love." This sentiment encapsulates the very essence of the devotion: an enduring expression of our love for Mary and our desire to grow closer to her Son, Jesus Christ.


