

Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

The Gospel Acclamation today invites us to “Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight His paths” (Lk. 3:4). As we hear these words of the Prophet Isaiah in refrain on the lips of St. John the Baptist, they are timely for us as they are for those generations when first proclaimed. The Lord comes. Prepare His way.

What therefore does it mean to prepare? What does it mean that He comes?

St. Paul elucidates in our Second Reading: “Whatever was written previously was written for our instruction, that by endurance and by the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to think in harmony with one another in keeping with Christ Jesus” (Rm. 15: 4-6).

To prepare is to take instruction from those who have gone before us. It is to encounter God as those before us have shown us powerful and amazing encounters with His grace. Furthermore, it is to have hope. Hope that we can and will to enter into that union with the pure Spirit that is God.

God the Father has sent His Spirit into the world that we may have life and have it abundantly. Not merely for the passage of time and the vivification of passing things, but for an eternal share in His divine life and love. The Prophet Isaiah reminds us again “The spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him: a spirit of wisdom and of understanding, a spirit of counsel and of strength, a spirit of knowledge and of fear of the LORD, and his delight shall be the fear of the LORD” (Is 11:2-3).

Dear friends, you and I have been imbued with the spirit of the Lord and confirmed in His gifts. May these gifts of the Holy Spirit stir vibrantly within us and open our hearts to the wisdom and knowledge of God. May we embrace His will and walk in His ways, truly becoming His disciples. Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight His paths!

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

John the Baptist appeared, preaching in the desert of Judea and saying, “*Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!*” *Matthew 3:1–2*



John the Baptist is truly the greatest of the prophets. He had the unique role of being the immediate precursor to the Savior of the World. Many pious traditions state that John was sanctified within the womb of his mother at the moment of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, when our Blessed Mother who was pregnant with Jesus visited Elizabeth who was pregnant with John. Upon Mary’s greeting, John leaped in the womb for joy. Additionally, Jesus says that no one born of woman was greater than John. That’s an incredible statement and is reason enough for us to listen to the words of John.

Regarding the preaching of John, note first that John did his preaching in the desert of Judea. He did not sit on a royal throne or enjoy the honors of the Jewish leaders. Instead, he was poor, simple, prayerful, regularly engaged in penance, remained in the desert and invited many people to come to him. And when they came, he preached bold words to all.

Among those who came to John in the desert were the Pharisees and Sadducees. They did not come because they were sincere but because of their jealousy and envy. But when they came, John said to them, “You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance.” John then went on to preach that someone much mightier than he was coming after him and that he was not worthy to even untie His sandal straps. John explained that the one coming would become the source of salvation for many, but for others, they “...will burn with unquenchable fire.”

Though much more could be said about John the Baptist, it’s essential that we regularly consider his strong words of preaching and allow those words to shake us to the core. In what ways do you need to hear John’s message of repentance? In what ways are you like the Pharisees and Sadducees? In what ways are you self-centered, envious, jealous, prideful and the like? If you think you are much better than the Pharisees and Sadducees who were addressed with these harsh words by John, then you may actually be fooling yourself more than you realize. The humble soul will also see the sin in their soul and will always allow the powerful words spoken by John and by our Lord to lead them to deeper repentance.

Reflect, today, upon the unerring truth that you need to repent. You do. The only person who doesn’t need to daily repent is the one who lives perpetually in a state of perfect communion with the Most Holy Trinity. But these holy souls are rare. Don’t be offended by this truth but rejoice in it. Give thanks to God for the strong words of Saint John the Baptist, spoken to the Pharisees and Sadducees, and allow yourself to hear those words yourself, as if they were spoken just for you. Receive them with humility and rejoicing, and allow them to prepare you more fully to receive our Divine Lord more deeply into your soul this Advent season.

My powerful Lord, You sent Saint John the Baptist before You, so as to prepare many hearts to receive You and Your transforming truth. Please humble me, dear Lord, so that I will listen to the words spoken by John and will indeed continually repent of all of my sin with all my heart. Jesus, I trust in You.

WHAT IS THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION?

Even though many Catholics connect the gospel story of the Annunciation with the term Immaculate Conception, the doctrine refers to something different.

In the Gospel of Luke an angel visits a young woman in Nazareth named Mary and asks if she will bear the Messiah. Mary says yes. Then, presto! Mary becomes pregnant with Jesus. This is known as the Immaculate Conception, right?

Wrong. Even though many Catholics connect this story in Luke's gospel with the term Immaculate Conception, the doctrine itself refers to something different. It still refers to Mary, but it is not about how Mary became pregnant with Jesus. It is about how Mary's mother became pregnant with her—deemed immaculate due to the absence of transmitting original sin.

In the 19th century the church faced a theological conundrum. If St. Augustine and the subsequent millennia of tradition were correct that sexual intercourse transmitted original sin, then Mary while in the womb would be stained by Original Sin. If Mary was stained by Original Sin, then she could not have carried the sinless Son of God in her womb without exposing Him to Original Sin. And if Jesus was born with Original Sin, then He could not serve as the appropriate sacrifice on the cross to atone for a wounded world—as required by St. Anselm's atonement theory, which guided the logic of many 19th-century theologians. So, if Jesus was exposed to Original Sin, there would be no possibility of salvation for mankind.

Rather than revise the doctrine of Original Sin, Pope Pius IX and his theologians proposed another solution: the Immaculate Conception of Mary. By doing this, they protected the sinlessness of Jesus—and thus the possibility of salvation for mankind—and further elevated the most venerated and beloved of all the saints: Mary of Nazareth. Moreover, in a context in which many of the church's European leaders felt attacked by the Enlightenment and the intellectual tools of modern reason, they did not have to concede ground to the rational logic of Modernism that was later condemned in 1864 by Pius IX's *The Syllabus of Errors*.

Hence, Pope Pius IX declared the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception in his 1854 apostolic constitution *Ineffabilis Deus* (Ineffable God). Later, it was grandfathered into the First Vatican Council's declaration of papal infallibility in 1870. It is one of only two teachings to be declared *Ex Cathedra*, or infallibly, by a pope. The other is Mary's bodily assumption into heaven that was declared by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

Today, Catholics remember that Mary conceived Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. Mary's courageous assent to a strange pregnancy and her yes to God and God's plan are important to commemorate and venerate, but the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception does not refer to Mary's pregnancy with Jesus. It refers to the time when Mary herself was conceived by her parents and God intervened to stop the transmission of Original Sin.




