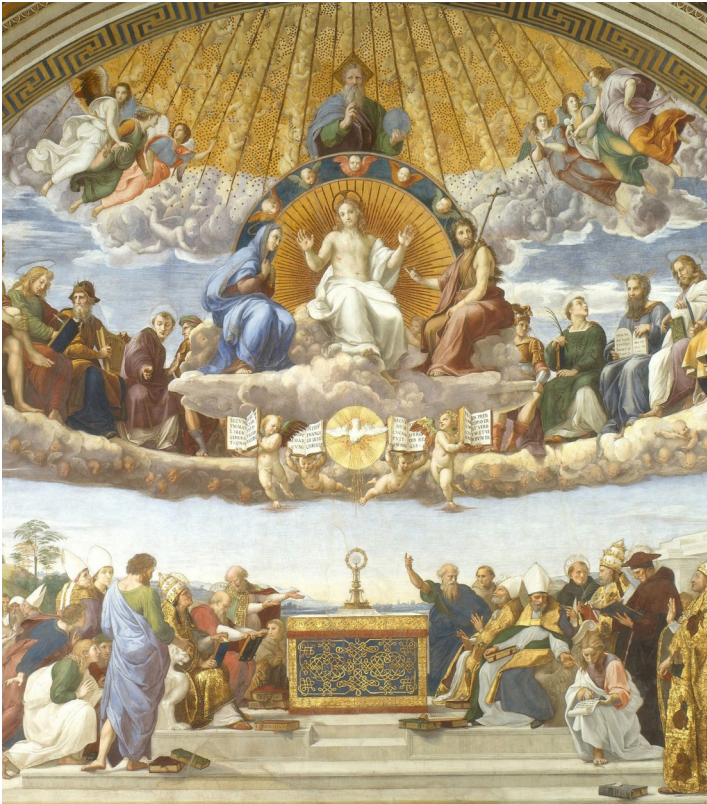

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,
Happy Gaudete Sunday!

Gaudere means “to rejoice” in the language of the Church and its liturgy, so today we raise our voices in joy! Marking this weekend the Third Sunday of Advent, the joy of our hope becomes palpable, yes in our words and our ornamentation at Holy Mass, but most especially in the readings of Sacred Scripture.

REFLECT

The Advent season is a time in which the Church invites us to prepare our hearts and minds for the second coming of Christ and the memorial of Jesus' birth at Christmas. During this season of preparation, we can ponder the preparations Mary and Joseph were making to welcome the Infant Jesus. The Holy Family found themselves on a journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem when they took refuge in a humble manger and welcomed the Son of God. The Newborn King did not arrive in a palace of riches, but in poverty and simplicity among the livestock.

Today, mothers in our communities find themselves in similar circumstances, unexpectedly pregnant and facing many challenges. Like the Holy Family, they are in great need and in search of a place of refuge to bring their child into the world. They may find themselves alone, scared, and overwhelmed, not knowing where to turn for help and dependent on the kindness and service of others.

The story of the first Christmas should remind us of our call to care for mothers and their children when they are in their hour of need. In assisting a mother to prepare for the birth of her child, we share in a profound way in preparing for the coming of Christ. In such an act of loving support and encouragement, we recall those who came to aid of the Holy Family and ultimately beheld the Son of God. In helping mothers to welcome their children we can help them to encounter the joy, hope, and peace offered through the advent of the Infant Jesus, seeing in their child, the face of God himself.

- On December 8, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Offer Pope Francis' Prayer for the Immaculate Conception for this month's intention.
- Contact your local pregnancy resource center or diocesan/parish pregnancy support ministry. Ask about ways you can help, such as volunteering or donating baby items.
- Offer some other sacrifice or prayer that you feel called to do for this month's intention.

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

“Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.” Matthew 11:11



Imagine having these words, spoken by our Lord, being spoken about you. But, in fact, they are! You are among the “least in the kingdom of heaven” when you share in the grace of Christ and remain a member of His glorious Kingdom. And for that reason, your true greatness must be understood and rejoiced in.

At the time that John lived, the gates of Heaven had not yet been opened to fallen humanity. Jesus had not yet died, risen and ascended into Heaven so as to then pour forth the Holy Spirit upon the Church, inviting us to share in His glorious Kingdom. But today, we are blessed to be invited not only to Heaven when we die in a state of grace, we are also invited to share in the glories of the Kingdom of Heaven here and now, as we journey through life.

One clear message that our Lord is speaking in the line above is that those who are now enjoying the fullness of Heaven, seeing God face-to-face, are great indeed. But another clear message from our Lord is that this greatness can begin to be lived now, as we journey through life.

Too often we take up our identity in many meaningless things. We seek “greatness” through our personal and selfish achievements, our abilities, looks, financial status, and the like. But none of these things makes us truly great. Greatness is found solely in being a member of the Body of Christ, the Church, and thus being a member of God’s Kingdom.

Today we are given the shining example of Saint John the Baptist. And as we ponder his life, we must also ponder his preaching. The central messages of his preaching were twofold. First, he called everyone to repentance for their sins. This message must ring true in our lives today just as it did in the days of John’s preaching. But his second primary message was to point us to Christ. Jesus was the exclusive purpose of St. John’s life, and his preaching concluded by pointing his followers to our Lord.

Reflect, today, upon the fact that Saint John the Baptist continues to send forth his message today to you. As we approach the glorious Christmas season, prepare yourself more fully by taking time to examine the sin with which you struggle. Acknowledge it with humility and honesty. From there, turn your eyes to Jesus, the source of mercy and forgiveness, and hear Him inviting you to the greatness to which you are called. As you put your eyes on Him, allow Him to draw you more fully into His Kingdom now, today, so that you, as a least one of the Kingdom of Heaven, will understand and live out the greatness of a son or daughter of God.

My glorious King, You sent to us Saint John the Baptist to preach repentance and to call us to Yourself. Open my mind and heart, dear Lord, to the message John spoke and help me to more fully heed his words so as to share in the greatness of life to which I am called. Jesus, I trust in You.

A HISTORY OF THE NATIVITY

“The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of sacred Scripture.” – Pope Francis’ Apostolic Letter, *Admirabile Signum*, “On the meaning and importance of the Nativity scene”, 2019

As Catholics, nativity scenes, or creches, fill us with wonder and move us deeply. Why? Perhaps because, in the words of Pope Francis, “they show God’s tender love: the Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness.”

It is a time-honored tradition in our households to carefully unwrap all the figures each year and then thoughtfully arrange them. Many families wait to put the infant Jesus in the manger until Christmas, or at least until after the Vigil Mass on Christmas Eve. Although setting up the creche is something we do every year during Advent, we eagerly await the time when we can see the faces of the Holy Family and the Magi again on our figurines, and arrange the animals just right around the infant Jesus to pay him homage.

THE ROLE OF ST. FRANCIS

Although this is a tradition that dates back centuries, you may not have realized that St. Francis of Assisi played a big role in helping to spread the popularity of nativity scenes throughout Europe. According to Tradition and the writings of St. Bonaventure, in the year 1223, St. Francis wanted to celebrate Christmas in a new way in the town of Greccio (near Assisi), such that people could picture themselves in that scene on the first Christmas night.

On Dec. 25 of that year, St. Bonaventure wrote: “St. Francis prepared a manger, and brought hay, and an ox and an ass to the place appointed. The brethren were summoned, the people ran together, the forest resounded with their voices, and that venerable night was made glorious by many and brilliant lights and sonorous psalms of praise.” At Greccio there were no statues; the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present.



THE EARLIEST NATIVITY SCENES

Although living re-enactments became popular after that 13th-century Christmas night, carved or painted nativity scenes had been around since the early days of Christianity. The earliest nativity scene is a fresco in a catacomb of St. Valentine in Rome, dated from the fourth century, which included Jesus, Mary, Joseph, the Magi and a star. The first-known nativity scene with carved figurines dates from the 13th century and can be found in the Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore in Rome.

TRADITIONS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

France: French creche scenes often include *santons*, or “little saints,” which are hand-painted terracotta figurines that represent villagers.



Poland: Polish nativity scenes, called *Szopka*, are very colorful and focus on distinctive architecture such as baroque domes and Gothic spires.

Korea: A Korean nativity scene may include Jesus being welcomed by a magpie bird singing in a tree. Clothing for all the figures is traditional Korean.

Germany/Austria: Creche scenes in Germany/Austria are known for hand-cut rounded wooden figures.

Czech Republic: Traditional Czech creches are made of paper and yet are very detailed. (gidiocese.org)

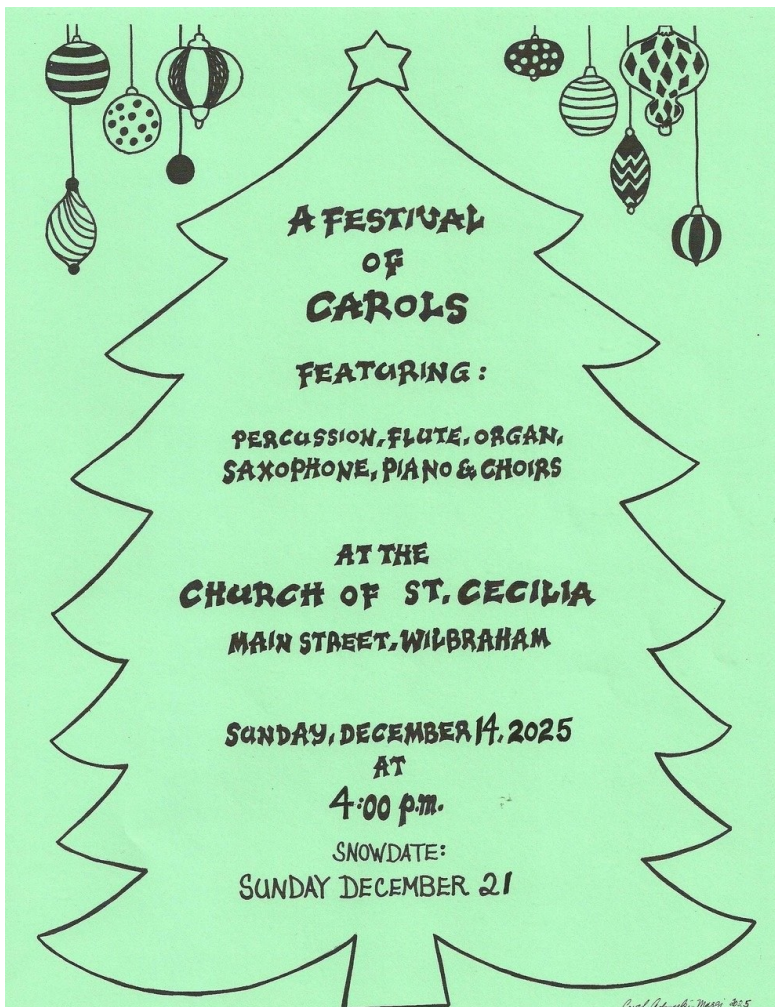

GAUDETE SUNDAY.

Gaudete Sunday (pronounced gow-DET-eh) is a special day in the Christian calendar. It is the third Sunday of Advent, which is the time leading up to Christmas. Many Christian churches celebrate it, including the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion, and Lutheran Churches. This Sunday can happen between December 11th and December 17th.

WHAT DOES "GAUDETE" MEAN?

The name "Gaudete" comes from a Latin word that means "Rejoice!" or "Be joyful!" This word is the very first word of a special song, called an Introit, sung during the church service on this day.

The song begins with these words: "Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete." This means: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice!" These words come from the Bible, specifically from the Book of Philippians (Chapter 4, verses 4-6). They remind everyone to be happy because Christmas and the coming of Jesus are very near.

WHY IS GAUDETE SUNDAY SPECIAL?

Advent used to be a time of fasting, similar to Lent, which is a period of serious reflection before Easter. It was a time for preparing for Christmas. Over time, Advent became shorter, lasting four weeks.

Gaudete Sunday is like a happy break in the middle of Advent. It's similar to Laetare Sunday during Lent. It reminds people that even though Advent is a time of preparation, there's also great joy because Jesus is coming. The church services on this day focus on happiness and gladness, showing that the promised good news is very close.

WHAT IS THE THEME OF GAUDETE SUNDAY?

Advent is about thinking of Jesus coming in three ways:

- ♦ His **first coming** as a baby at Christmas.
- ♦ His presence in our lives **today**.
- ♦ His **future coming** at the end of time.

On Gaudete Sunday, the main idea is to "rejoice in the Lord." It's about Christian joy. The readings often talk about John the Baptist, who prepared the way for Jesus.

Pope Francis, the leader of the Catholic Church, once said that Gaudete Sunday is about being thankful for all the good things in life. He encouraged people not to worry about what they haven't done for Christmas yet, but to focus on joy.

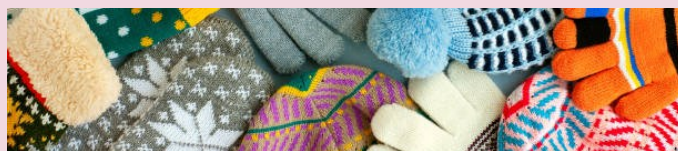
