

Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

“It was the best of times, it was the worst of times”. From *A Tale of Two Cities* and its celebrated opening line, see how Charles Dickens captures the reality of the moment. In a quick turn of phrase, he highlights the tension of good and evil, light and dark, hope and despair in the midst of history and society. It is, at the same time, the best and worst of times.

I thought of this quote as I pondered our Sunday Readings these past few days. As we anticipate celebrating Holy Mass each week, I pray you take the time at home to read the passages which will be proclaimed each coming Sunday. Hearing them together in prayer and contemplation then at Mass becomes all the more fruitful.

Dickens’ words resonated as I considered our own situation in the context of Sacred Scripture proclaimed this weekend. As true were the words for Charles Dickens at the time of the French Revolution, so true are those words for the Prophet Isaiah millenia before, and so true are those words for us in our own times.

Isaiah exclaims that “Anguish has taken wing” and darkness is dispelled. The yoke that burdened the People of God has been smashed and they “who walked in darkness have seen a great light”. In the midst of turmoil, Isaiah sees hope.

We are a people who have known great darkness too. We mourn the loss of loved ones. We endure the anxieties of family life, economic situations, personal struggles, health challenges, and more. We worry about the education our children receive or the media our teenagers consume. We see violence between civilians and law enforcement. We hear desperation in the voices of the weak and the poor.

Where is there hope? Where is there light in the midst of this darkness? What can save us in troubled times? Politicians and pundits will point fingers and proffer opinions; authors and scribes will compare our moments to history and engrave some tone for future readers; the world will convulse and spasm in its rhythmic angst as good and evil seem to rage against one another; and too many will fall for all the upheaval, but the faithful Christian will have one thing to say:

“The LORD is my light and my salvation”.

Our Responsorial psalm today is no mere refrain or sung-along flourish. It is a *declaration*, not a plea.

An awareness, not a platitude! A *choice*, not a trope!

As faithful men and women of Christ we set our hearts on Him. Let us see Him beyond all the chaos and hear His voice in the midst of all the noise. I choose Christ and walk by His light! I choose Christ and find my salvation. In the best of times and in the worst of times, one truth remains: I find light and salvation in the Lord. The LORD is my light and my salvation.

Most Holy Trinity, I adore You!

My God, I love you in the Most Blessed Sacrament!

TOM RICARDI & BIRDS OF PREY

Tom Ricardi from Massachusetts Bird of Prey Rehab Facility visited our Beacon of Light Catholic Preschool earlier in January. He brought a Barred Owl, Kestrel, Black Vulture, Red-tailed Hawk, and Golden Eagle to share with our Preschoolers, parishioners, and visitors.

They have been learning about how different animals survive the winter in New England and created pinecone and bagel birdfeeders for their Winter Fundraiser.

SAINT TIMOTHY & SAINT TITUS—FEAST DAY JAN 26

On Jan. 26, the Roman Catholic Church celebrates the liturgical memorial of Saints Timothy and Titus, close companions of the Apostle Paul and bishops of the Catholic Church in its earliest days.

Both men received letters from St. Paul, which are included in the New Testament.

Pope Benedict XVI discussed these early bishops during a general audience on Dec. 13, 2006, noting “their readiness to take on various offices” in “far from easy” circumstances. Both saints, the Pope said, “teach us to serve the Gospel with generosity, realizing that this also entails a service to the Church herself.”

The son of a Jewish mother and a non-Jewish father, Timothy came from Lystra in present-day Turkey. His mother, Eunice, and his grandmother, Lois, are known to have joined the Church, and Timothy himself is described as a student of Sacred Scripture from his youth.

After St. Paul’s visit to Timothy’s home region of Lycaonia, around the year 51, the young man joined the apostle and accompanied him in his travels. After religious strife forced Paul to leave the city of Berea, Timothy remained to help the local church. Paul later sent him to Thessalonica to help the Church during a period of persecution.

The two met up again in Corinth, and Timothy eventually journeyed to Macedonia on Paul’s behalf. Problems in the Corinthian Church brought Timothy back for a time, after which he joined Paul and accompanied the apostle in subsequent travels.

Like Paul, Timothy endured a period of imprisonment in the course of his missionary work. His release is mentioned in the New Testament Epistle to the Hebrews.

Around the year 64, Timothy became the first bishop of the Church of Ephesus. During that same year, he received the first of two surviving letters from St. Paul. The second, written the next year, urges Timothy to visit St. Paul in Rome, where he was imprisoned before his martyrdom.

Ancient sources state that St. Timothy followed his mentor in dying as a martyr for the faith. In the year 93, during his leadership of the Church in Ephesus, he took a stand against the worship of idols and was consequently killed by a mob. The pagan festival he was protesting was held Jan. 22, and this date was preserved as St. Timothy’s memorial in the Christian East.

In contrast with Timothy’s partial Jewish descent and early Biblical studies, St. Titus – who was born into a pagan family – is said to have studied Greek philosophy and poetry in his early years. But he pursued a life of virtue, and purportedly had a prophetic dream that caused him to begin reading the Hebrew Scriptures.

According to tradition, Titus journeyed to Jerusalem and witnessed the preaching of Christ during the Lord’s ministry on earth. Only later, however – after the conversion of St. Paul and the beginning of his ministry – did Titus receive baptism from the apostle, who called the pagan convert his “true child in our common faith.”

St. Paul was not only Titus’ spiritual father, but also depended on his convert as an assistant and interpreter. Titus accompanied Paul to the Apostolic Council of Jerusalem during the year 51, and was later sent to the Corinthian Church on two occasions. After the end of Paul’s first imprisonment in Rome, the apostle ordained Titus as the Bishop of Crete.

Paul sent his only surviving letter to Titus around the year 64, giving instructions in pastoral ministry to his disciple as he prepared to meet up with him in the Greek city of Nicopolis. Titus evangelized the region of Dalmatia in modern Croatia before returning to Crete.

Titus is credited with leading the Church of Crete well into his 90s, overturning paganism and promoting the faith through his prayers and preaching. Unlike St. Timothy, St. Titus was not martyred, but died peacefully in old age.



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COLLEGE STUDENTS, YOUNG ADULTS GO 'TO THE HEIGHTS' AT SEEK 2026

SPRINGFIELD — More than 70 college students and young adults from the Diocese of Springfield attended the annual SEEK conference, Jan. 1-5, in Columbus, Ohio. SEEK is run by FOCUS missionaries, or Fellowship of Catholic University Students. The local groups joined more than 16,000 other young people in Columbus. SEEK conferences were also held in Fort Worth and Denver.

A group of 35 left from the Newman Catholic Center at UMass in Amherst. Western Mass College Catholics had 37 leaving from the Springfield area. Four seminarians also attended, in addition to priests from the Diocese of Springfield.

The conference had a theme of "To the Heights," inspired by newly canonized St. Pier Giorgio Frassati.

"As St. Pier Giorgio reminds us, we are called to the heights — to live lives of holiness, joy, and mission. SEEK is a time for renewal, for community, and for reigniting our passion to share Christ with the world," said FOCUS founder Curtis Martin in an interview with Catholic News Agency.

The conference included talks by renowned Catholic speakers including Matt Fradd, a former atheist originally from Australia; podcaster Father Mike Schmitz and chaplain at the University of Minnesota Duluth; Sister Mary Grace of the Sisters of Life; and EWTN's Dr. Edward Sri.

"I think we started off the conference talking about what it means to be Catholic in a way, what it means to be a woman. They had men's and women's talks. By the end, they were teaching us how to set the world on fire," said Lindsay Allard, a student at UMass.

In addition to talks and praise and worship

music, SEEK held social events, such as speed dating. But Mass and Eucharistic Adoration were the highlight for many.

"The music coming in when the priests were processing in and out with the Agnus Dei and Salve Regina, I was just amazed and started tearing up a lot," said UMass junior Matthew Jamrozek.

"To go to SEEK and see 16,000 people running around from one place to another, to see the number of conferences that were organized and the number of confessions heard, it is amazing. God is alive. God is at work and it has never stopped," he said.

This was a record breaking year for attendance with close to 27,000 people at the three conferences. More than 16,000 attended Columbus.

"Last year we brought 10 kids to Salt Lake City. This year had a 400 percent increase in the number of kids," said Joe Austin, the director of the Office of Missionary Discipleship, which oversees youth, college, young adult and family ministry.

"A lot of those kids went last year. In fact, they registered for this year's conference at last year's conference. A lot of them were talking about registering for SEEK 2027. So we have a high retention rate of kids that come back every single year."

Austin said his group included graduates of the youth ambassador program, Young and Catholic and Western Mass College Catholics.

"I came out of that with three main takeaways – the first one that God is real, Jesus is King and sainthood is possible. For the first one with God is real, they wrestle with believing if God is real, a real supreme being with control over their life. Just across the board, the kids had encounters with God," Austin said. "The second point that Jesus is King, you see 17,000 kids in this arena and you see the cross processing in and you can see the cross rising above the crowd, that's just the thought that came to me that Jesus is king."

Father David Aufiero, the pastor of St. Patrick Parish in South Hadley and chaplain at Pope Francis Preparatory School in Springfield, also attended. Father Aufiero is also the director of recruiting for the Vocations Office.

"On the night of Adoration and confession, we prayed as priests inside dinner, we prayed intentionally for all the participants. And one of the things the chaplain for FOCUS said was that the college students maybe are going to forget the speakers in a year, but they're always going to remember Adoration and confession," said Father Aufiero.

Jack Day, a junior at Thomas Aquinas College in Northfield, attended with the Western Mass College Catholics group. "I guess I always knew that in my generation that church is having a revival right now. I guess I didn't understand the scale of it until I was able to see just how many people were really into their faith, thousands of people just like me," Day said.



On Sunday January 11th our Religious Education program had a family catechism class on the Scapular. The Brown Scapular consists of two pieces of brown wool joined by straps, one hanging in front and the other in the back worn by Catholics as a sign of devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary that originated with the Carmelite Order in the 13th century. The Brown Scapular is considered a powerful sacramental, symbolizing a commitment to live a holy life and a promise of spiritual protection from Mary. 39 students and family members were enrolled!

Following the enrollment everyone prayed 10 Hail Mary prayers to add to our 250,000 Hail Mary prayers for Blessings for our Country. Our Religious Education students and families are now at 2,373!




