Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

This week we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord which, in Catholic cultures near and far, marks the end of the Christmas season. While liturgically we have already made our way through several weeks of Ordinary Time, the cultural season of Christmas concludes on February 2nd. The lighted evergreens will relinquish their noble position in our sanctuaries and the decorative ornaments adorning Christmas in the Rectory will be put away. Yet ...

"I will honour Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year. I will live in the Past, the Present, and the Future. The Spirits of all Three shall strive within me. I will not shut out the lessons that they teach". Perhaps you heard these words recently on a theatre stage or a family fireside reading. Maybe they strike you from long, long ago. They are the words of the transformed Ebenezer Scrooge in Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*.

Keeping the memory of Christmas is a worthy exercise indeed and, hearing again from Dickens, we recognize it is not merely a pastime activity but a living and enduring reality. SAINT BLAISE—BLESSING OF THE THROATS

Every year on Feb. 3, the Church celebrates the feast of St. Blaise. Since he is the patron saint of those who suffer from throat ailments (and the doctors who treat them), many parishes around the world offer the “blessing of throats” in his honor.

A bishop and eventual martyr, Blaise of Sebaste began his spiritual journey as a hermit. He was a physician and known to be a miracle worker. He practiced the medicine of his time and is included in the group of the “14 holy helpers” of the Catholic Church — called that because they are considered effective intercessors against certain ailments of the body and soul.

St. Blaise is the patron saint of the Republic of Paraguay and his devotion is widespread in Latin America, where he is not only beloved but also has given rise to countless popular traditions.

THE BISHOP WHO LIVED IN A CAVE

Blaise was named bishop of Sebaste, Armenia, and very popular among his contemporaries for performing numerous miraculous healings. He lived as a hermit even after being named bishop, converting the cave in which he lived — located in the forest of Mount Argeus — into his episcopal see.

Tradition has it that one day Bishop Blaise saved a child who had choked on a fish bone — hence the ancient custom of blessing the throats of his devotees on his feast day. That same fact also made him the patron saint of otorhinolaryngologists and those who suffer from throat ailments.

Other stories speak of Blaise's love for animals, whom he also cured. According to an ancient medieval tale, sick or injured animals came to his cave on Mount Argeus to be cured and in return, they did not harm him or bother him when he prayed.

SUMMONED TO MARTYRDOM

Blaise's life and ministry ended when Agricola, governor of Cappadocia, initiated one of the last persecutions against Christians. When a group of his hunters went to look for animals in the forest of Argeus for some "games," they found many of them grouped outside the cave of St. Blaise. The saint was praying at the time and was taken prisoner.

Placed in the presence of Agricola, he was told to renounce the Christian faith, but he flatly refused the proposal. He was immediately locked up in a dungeon, where he remained for some days preaching among the captives and those condemned to death. There, he also cured the sick and baptized those who wanted to become Christians.

According to the Acts of St. Blaise, the hermit bishop was condemned to die by drowning but, when he was thrown into the waters, he began to walk on them, as Jesus Christ Himself once did. He was then led to the scaffold, tortured, and finally beheaded. He died a martyr in 316 A.D., in the time of the Roman emperor Licinius. (catholicnewsagency.com)





CHRISTIANS WERE NOT ALWAYS CALLED “CHRISTIANS”

The word “Christian” is only used three times in the New Testament. Christians were not always “Christians.” That is, the members of the early Church didn’t refer to themselves as “Christians.” So where did this name come from?

When we look at the texts that make up the New Testament, we find early communities would rather call themselves “saints,” if anything. It should be noticed, though, that in the original Greek the word “saint” (hagios) has slightly different connotations than it might have for us nowadays in either English or any other language. The Greek hagios, in this particular context, simply means “consecrated to God.” The fact that the word always appears in the plural in the New Testament reveals the early church considered itself a community of people working and living together in the service of God.

Members of the early church were called “Christians” for the first time, according to the book of Acts (Cf. Acts 11:26), in Antioch. The other two moments in which the word appears in the New Testament are Acts 26:28 and 1 Peter 4:16. The first text (Acts 11:26, that is) doesn’t provide for much detail on how this name came to be. It simply states “the disciples were called Christians first at Antioch,” after Barnabas brought Paul to the city (where they taught the disciples for about a year) and nothing more. But if this was not a name Jesus’ disciples would call themselves, where did the name come from, then?

One thing is certain: the fact that a new term had to be coined to refer to Christians in Antioch reveals the mission had been quite successful. Whereas some scholars assume the name “Christian” was originally somehow derogatory, it seems it was rather a simple means to establish a distinction between these communities and other Jews, especially since the early Church, in a cosmopolitan city such as Antioch, was already including Gentiles. In fact, as John W. Martens explains in his article on the matter, these “Christians” represent “a particular Jewish position regarding the identity of the Messiah and the entry of Gentiles into the Jewish community, but this does not mean they no longer consider themselves or that others no longer consider them Jews.” In any case, in a cosmopolitan city such as Antioch, where people from different corners of the Roman Empire were already living together, the Church somehow helped redefine the notions of community by including Jews and Gentiles alike in a single, new grouping. 


