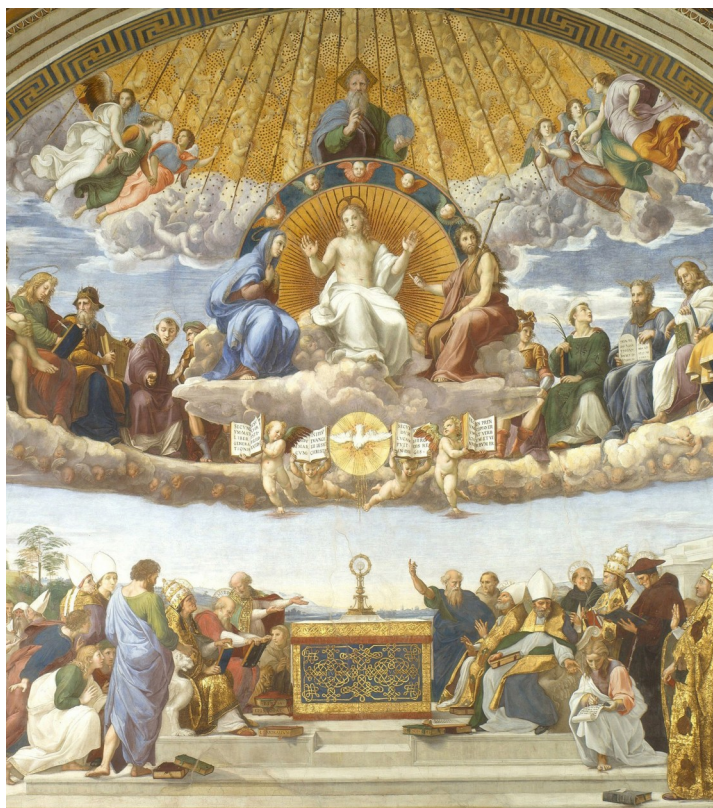

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Soon our diocese will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Your support for this collection provides aid to vulnerable people affected by war, natural disasters, and exploitation.

Human trafficking is the exploitation of a person through forced labor, domestic servitude, or commercial sex. It affects women, children, and men of all ages everywhere in the world, including in the United States. Although some victims of human trafficking are also smuggled across national borders, human trafficking involves anyone who is compelled by force, fraud, or coercion to provide work or service, regardless of nationality or citizenship or geographic location.

Poverty, isolation from the support of family and friends, and cultural or language barriers are among the factors that place people at risk of trafficking. Native Americans are particularly vulnerable to trafficking and violence, as many live in poverty away from reservations or tribal lands. Meanwhile, many reservations cover vast rural territories and have few law enforcement resources to aid victims of trafficking and bring perpetrators to justice. In light of these challenges, successful antitrafficking efforts must involve communities that can recognize the signs of trafficking and provide direct assistance to victims. School teachers, parish staff and clergy, and health care providers at community clinics—with training to recognize the signs of human trafficking in their own communities—can be effective in combatting the exploitation of those they serve.

With funds received through The Catholic Relief Services Collection, the office of Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops launched a pilot program to combat human trafficking among indigenous Hawaiians in the Diocese of Honolulu and on the St. Regis Mohawk Reservation in the Diocese of Ogdensburg, New York. Working with local partners, MRS staff assessed the challenges facing those communities, trained local leaders to recognize the signs of human trafficking, and helped leaders establish networks to respond to the needs of victims.

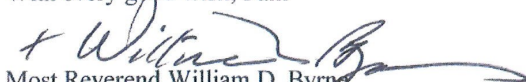

MEANING AND HISTORY OF FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

The First Sunday of Lent marks the beginning of a sacred period of reflection, repentance, and renewal. It is a time when the faithful are encouraged to look inward, seek conversion, and prepare their hearts for the solemn mysteries of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection.

Spiritual Renewal: A call to re-examine our lives and deepen our relationship with God.

Repentance: An invitation to turn away from sin and embrace the forgiveness and mercy of our heavenly Father.

Preparation: The day sets the tone for the Lenten journey, leading toward Holy Week and the joy of Easter.

This tradition dates back to the early centuries of the Church. Early Christians observed a period of fasting and prayer to prepare for the profound mystery of Christ's Resurrection. Today, the First Sunday of Lent continues to inspire believers to renew their commitment to the Gospel and the timeless teachings of the Church Fathers.

LITURGICAL SYMBOLISM AND PATRONAGES

This Sunday is rich with liturgical symbolism that connects the Church's tradition with the call to conversion. The readings and hymns often highlight themes of sacrifice and resurrection, reminding us of Christ's journey from death to life. Some parishes honor particular patronages on this day, such as the guardianship of Saint Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary, who intercede for the faithful in their journey of penance and spiritual renewal.

Scriptural Readings: The liturgy typically includes passages that prepare hearts for the Passion of our Lord.

Symbolic Actions: Rituals and prayers emphasize the need to mend one's ways and renew one's commitment to God.

Patron Intercession: Special mention is made of saints known for their humility and service, serving as models for those beginning Lent.

TRADITIONS OF MIRACLES AND SPIRITUAL CONVERSION

Throughout history, the First Sunday of Lent has been associated with miraculous turnarounds in the lives of the faithful. Many have testified to profound spiritual experiences on this day, where hardships seemed to dissolve in the warm embrace of God's love. Stories passed down through generations recount healings, reconciliations, and moments of divine grace that have sparked lasting conversions. These narratives inspire a deep trust in God's power to transform lives, even in moments of deep despair.

Divine Interventions:

Numerous accounts describe unexpected blessings and healings that have reaffirmed faith during Lent.

Testimonies of Renewal:

Converts often share how the spirit of Lent, beginning on this first Sunday, led them to a complete reawakening of faith.

Hope in Adversity:

These miracles encourage believers to look beyond earthly struggles, trusting in the promise of eternal salvation.

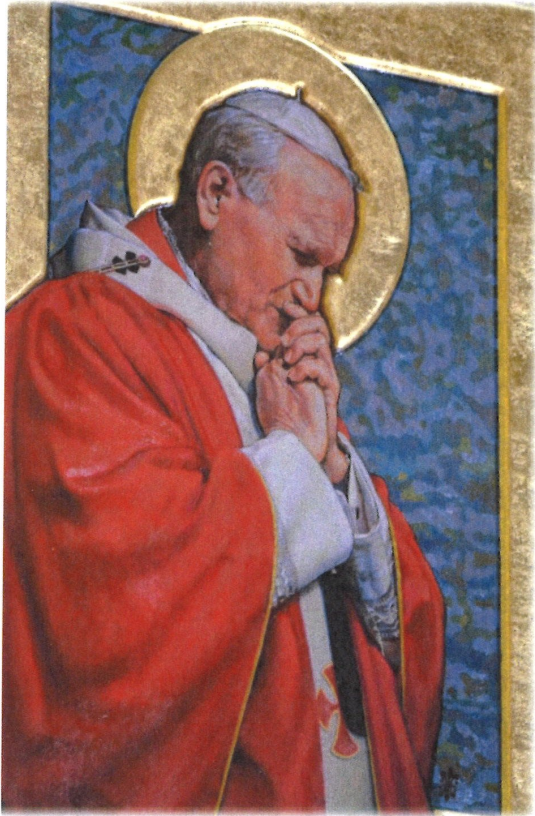

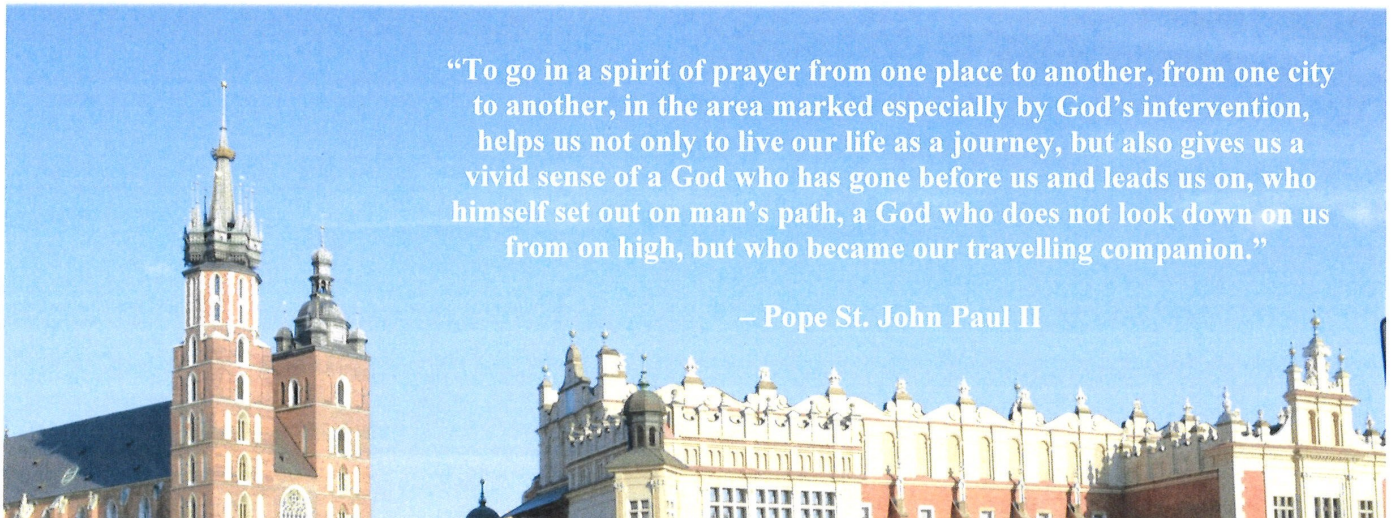

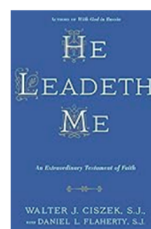
