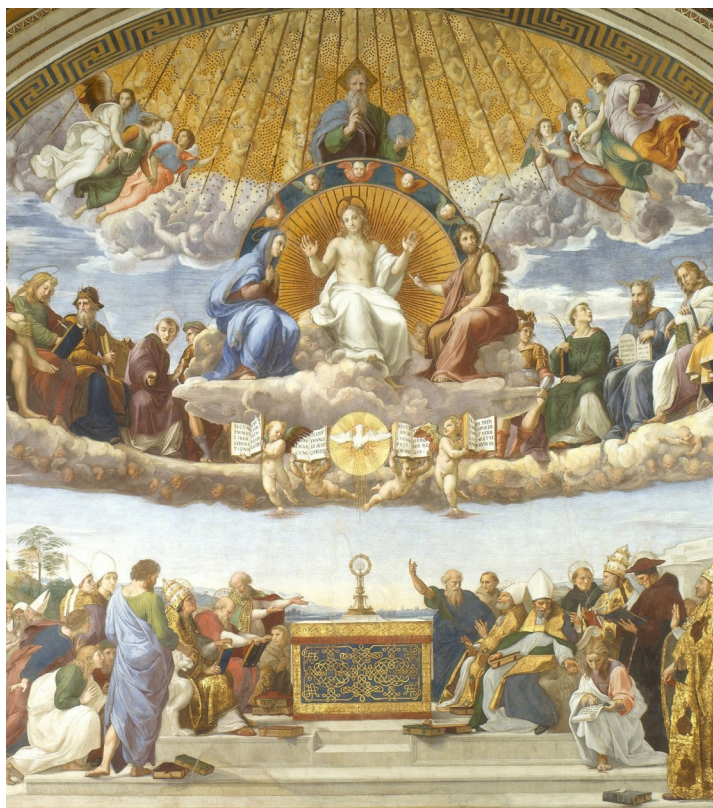

Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

Our First Reading today ends with the line “Abram went as the LORD directed him” (Gen. 12:4). God had promised that Abram would become the father of many descendants, as numerous as the stars of the sky, and that He would make of him “a great nation”. In trust of God and His promise, Abram boldly went forth. That trust shaped him. That hope in God’s promise defined him. Abram would be known by a new name, Abraham. We are his descendants, heirs to a Promised Land, heirs to the Kingdom of Heaven.

This line “Abram went as the LORD directed him” resonates with me this week as I hear in it the title of a book now being read and discussed in our parish book club, The Literary Ladies. *He Leadeth Me* is a collection of spiritual insights offered by Fr. Walter Cizek, SJ from his experience as a prisoner in the gulags and the bitter cold camps of Soviet Siberia. Having entered the Soviet Union as a Catholic missionary he “died” in 1947, being sent away for hard labor in the vastness of the communist beast and forgotten for almost two decades, captured and convicted as a purported American spy.

As Fr. Walter Cizek espoused God’s promise and went as the Lord directed, he very much lived the first line of our Second Reading today: “Bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God” (2 Tim 1:8). Between his two accountings, *With God in Russia* and *He Leadeth Me*, Fr. Cizek offers a life story of perseverance, prayer, and penitence worthy of your reflection this Lent.

Though he could have been hardened by his experiences, Fr. Cizek was clear in the tenderness of God’s mercy. God alone is our hope and our peace. God alone is our life’s desire.

Continuing our Lenten efforts, may we too be directed and led in God alone.

RITE OF ELECTION 2026

Congratulations to our Catechumens as they begin final preparations for their reception of the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

On Sunday, February 22d, they participated in the "Rite of Election" at Saint Michael's Cathedral with catechumens from around Western Massachusetts.

We will observe the "First Scrutiny" after the homily at the 9:30 am Mass Sunday, March 8th.

WHAT ARE "THE SCRUTINIES"?

The celebration of the Scrutinies on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of Lent is the major feature of the Period of Purification and Enlightenment, the final phase of the journey for those seeking to become Catholic.

Scrutinies are primarily spiritual preparation of the Elect for the celebration of the sacraments of initiation.

They are "meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the Elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good" (OCIA, 141). They deepen the awareness of the reality of "the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every person longs to be delivered" (OCIA, 143) and increase their reliance on the forgiveness and mercy of God.

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT: MEANING AND HISTORY

The Second Sunday of Lent marks a deep step in our Lenten journey. It calls the faithful to a renewed commitment to introspection, repentance, and transformation. This day is a time to reflect on our lives and to reorient our hearts toward God, drawing inspiration from the ancient teachings of the Church Fathers.

Spiritual Renewal: It is an invitation to deepen prayer, fasting, and acts of charity, fostering spiritual renewal and growth in faith.

Historical Roots: Originating in the early church, this Sunday served as a reminder of the call to conversion and the importance of self-discipline in the Christian life.

Call to Repentance: The liturgy on this day emphasizes the importance of repentance, encouraging believers to examine their inner selves amid the journey toward Easter. This sacred day not only revives our commitment to personal holiness but also strengthens the communal bond of the Church, guiding us steadily toward the hope and joy of Christ's Resurrection.

A TIME FOR DEEP REPENTANCE

The Second Sunday of Lent invites the faithful into a sincere period of reflection and conversion, marking a step deeper into the season of penance. This day reminds us that:

Call to conversion: It is a time when the Church encourages us to examine our hearts and renew our commitment to living a holy life.

Reflection on God's mercy: The readings and prayers emphasize that through repentance, God's infinite mercy is revealed to every soul.

Growth in virtue: The faithful are inspired to reject old habits and adopt new practices that lead them closer to the teachings of Christ.

MIRACULOUS PATRONAGES AND DIVINE INTERVENTIONS

Throughout the centuries, numerous miracles and acts of divine providence have been associated with the Lenten season, especially on this second Sunday. The Church has long recognized that:

Intercession of saints: Many devout Catholics invoke the patronage of saints known for their penance and dedication, finding strength and miracles in their intercession.

Healing miracles: Historical accounts recount moments of healing and conversion that occurred as communities prayed fervently during Lent.

Symbols of hope: These miraculous events serve as powerful reminders that God's grace can transform lives even in times of personal struggle.

RICH LITURGICAL TRADITIONS AND SYMBOLISM

The liturgy on the Second Sunday of Lent is crafted with profound symbolism, drawing on the traditions passed down through the Church Fathers. Its key elements include:

Scriptural readings: The Gospel and epistle readings highlight themes of sacrifice, redemption, and the call to faithful discipleship.

Ritual symbols: The use of ashes, simple vestments, and subdued colors during Mass reflect the spirit of mourning for sin and the hope of spiritual renewal.

Communal prayer: The faithful gather not only to receive the Eucharist but also to share in prayers that unite their personal struggles with the universal mission of the Church.

Tithing-What, Why, Where?

Tithing is such an important gift to the Church. Yet, it can sometimes be a sensitive topic. After all, it can be uncomfortable, and maybe even confusing, when you feel like you have to give a portion of your hard-earned money on a regular basis. This is why I am so glad that my dad taught me to tithe as soon as I had my first job at the age of fourteen. His tithing lesson instilled in me that all I have is gift.



What is Tithing? The word tithe comes from an Old English word meaning “a tenth part.” In the very first book of the Bible, we read the words from Jacob:

This stone that I have set up as a sacred pillar will be the house of God. Of everything you give me, I will return a tenth part to you without fail.

We also read in Leviticus 27:30,32 that:

All tithes of the land, whether in grain from the fields or in fruit from the trees, belong to the Lord; they are sacred to the Lord...The tithes of the herd and the flock, every tenth animal that passes under the herdsman's rod, shall be sacred to the Lord.

Traditionally, we give 10 percent of our income to the Church, because there is not a specific percentage of our wealth we are mandated to give. **The Catechism of the Catholic Church states in paragraph 2449** that the Church talks about tithing as a matter of the Old Covenant. So it is not binding us in the New Covenant. However, we are still called to live by love. If it is not a matter of putting food on the table, then 10% is a good percentage to tithe.

What is important is that we give what we are able and give from our heart. It reminds us that all we have is given to us from God. At the end of our life, one day we will be called to answer to how we spent our time, talent, and treasure.

Why Do We Tithe? Tithing is a recognition that 100% of what we have is God's. If you have the means to tithe, then seriously pray and consider tithing. If however, you are in the red, and all of your funds are going towards school or paying off loans, start by putting \$2.00 in the collection basket at Mass every Sunday.

It's not entirely about how much we give, but that we make the sacrifice of giving. Remember the widow in Luke 21:1-4?

When He looked up He saw some wealthy people putting their offerings into the treasury and He noticed a poor widow putting in two small coins. He said, 'I tell you truly, this poor widow put in more than all the rest; for those

others have all made offerings from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has offered her whole livelihood.'

What does tithing look like for you and me? Is God calling you to give up a cup of coffee each week in order to put your “two small coins” into the collection basket? If it is, remember, Jesus saw her as giving “more than all the rest” because she gave all she had.

We tithe because it is what we are taught in Scripture.

Where Should Our Tithe Money Go?

First, start with your parish. The Catechism says in paragraph 2179, “A parish is a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a particular church...It is the place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. The parish initiates the Christian people into the ordinary expression of the liturgical life...it teaches Christ's saving doctrine; it practices the charity of the Lord in good works and brotherly love.”

Our parish gives so much to us. Just start with the Source and Summit of the Church, the Eucharist. I can't think of a better place to tithe than to the very place which provides us with the grace to continue living our baptismal call each day. To live the Good News and share it with others. Finally, if every parishioner tithed to its parish, there is a good chance that parishes would not be suffering financially as severely as they are now.

Other Efforts.

However, that is not to say that all of your tithe needs to go to your parish. If you would like to give a portion of your tithe to other things, consider the things you believe in and that are authentically doing God's work. Look at the organizations that have made a meaningful impact on your spiritual life. Maybe a pregnancy resource center, a non-profit which offers outdoor Catholic Youth Expeditions for high schoolers and young adults. If you are an art-lover, consider commissioning a work of art or an item in need such as hymnals, choir robes or new altar server robes for your parish.

Most importantly, just ask the Holy Spirit where He is leading you to give. He will point you in the right direction. (BlessedIsShe.net)

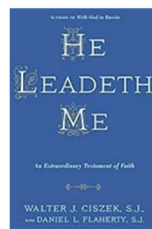
