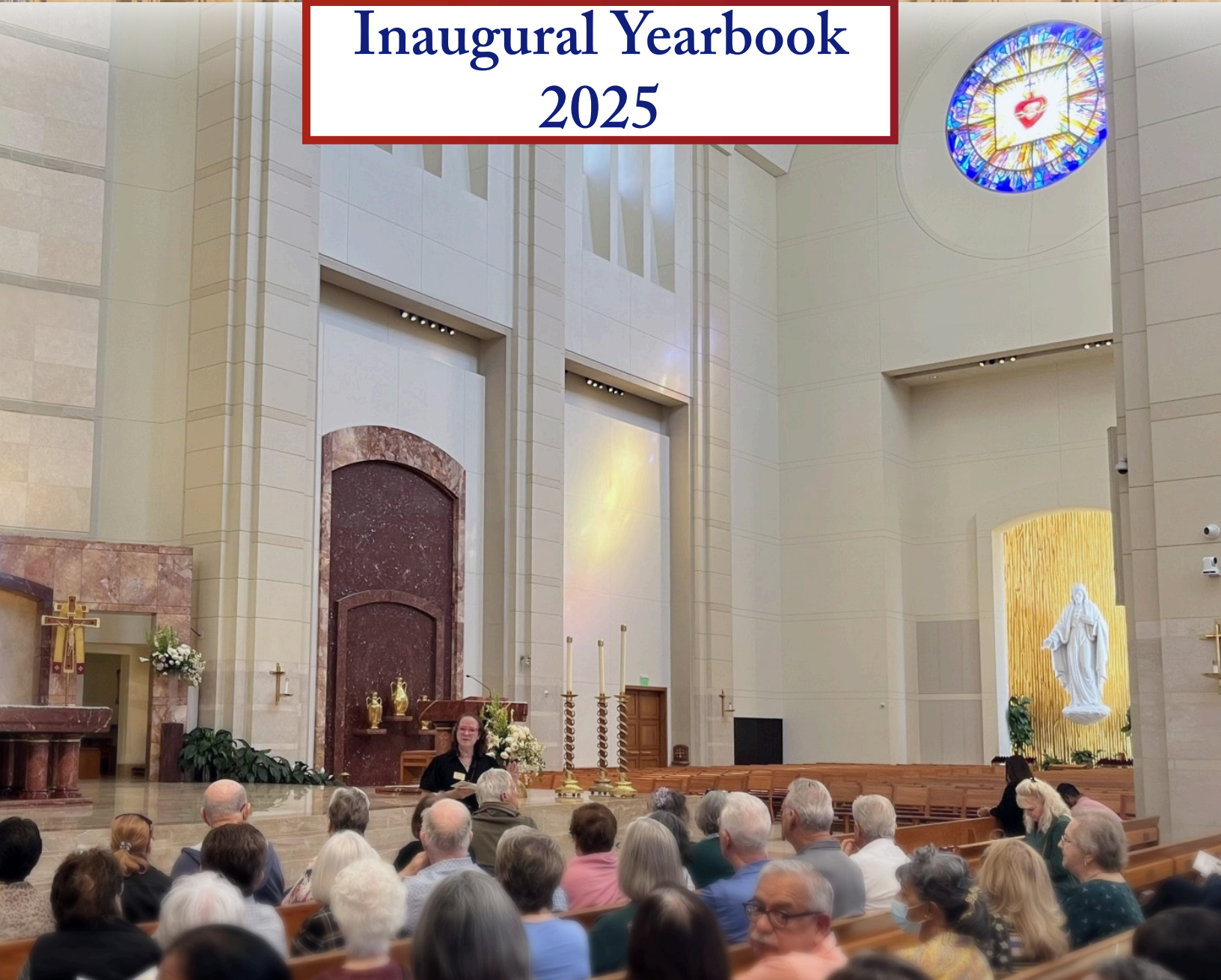

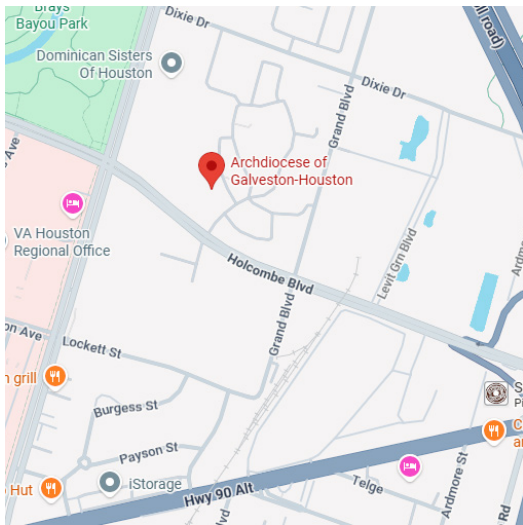

# A Letter by the Associate Director

As we begin the year 2026, we set out on a new journey filled with dreams, hopes, projects, and plans. At the same time, we carry in our hearts a gentle nostalgia for the year now passed: goals not fully reached, projects left unfinished, and, in a special way, the grateful remembrance of our loved ones who, during 2025, went ahead of us to the Father's house.

The year 2025 was a particularly meaningful time for the Church, marked by the Jubilee Year under the motto *Spes non confundit*—hope does not disappoint. It was a year of grace that invited us to spiritual renewal, to deepen mercy and forgiveness, and to strengthen our commitment to service, justice, and the building of a more humane and compassionate world, illuminated by the light of Christ.

In this spirit of hope, we look back with gratitude on the fruits of our ministry serving Hispanic older-adult communities. Throughout the year, formation, leadership development, and community presence were central to our mission. In March, our team participated for the first time as a Hispanic community in SAINTS University, and we were also represented at the Day of Prayer celebrated at St. Cyril of Alexandria Church. During Lent, we offered a series of virtual reflections entitled *The Journey of Hope*, rooted in the Word of God and enriched by spiritual conversation.

Listening attentively to the voices of the community remained a priority. In May, I had the joy of creating our first Spanish Leadership Committee, an important step in strengthening shared leadership and participation. Through a community survey on topics of greatest interest, we were able to thoughtfully shape and develop the 2026 Activities Calendar.

The fall months brought moments of grace and meaningful encounters. October proved to be especially fruitful, while November opened with a pilgrimage to the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Houston. There, we shared a guided tour and celebrated Holy Mass in commemoration of the Jubilee Year. We also participated in the national presentation of the telenovela *Memories of My Grandfather*, organized by the Alzheimer's Association in the East End area. The month concluded with virtual Advent reflections focused on migration and hospitality toward those most in need.

As we look toward 2026, the Holy Father calls us to live our faith with boldness and to walk as true pilgrims of hope—a firm hope that does not disappoint and that urges us forward in trust that God always works for our good. Forgiveness and reconciliation invite us to leave behind offenses and misunderstandings, embracing a peace that transforms our personal, family, and community lives. Service and justice call us to walk alongside the most vulnerable, to care for our common home and to build a more compassionate and united world.

En mayo, tuve la alegría de crear nuestro primer Comité de Liderazgo Hispano, un paso importante para fortalecer el liderazgo compartido y la participación. A través de una encuesta comunitaria sobre los temas de mayor interés, pudimos diseñar y desarrollar cuidadosamente el Calendario de Actividades 2026. Los meses de otoño trajeron momentos de gracia y encuentros significativos. Octubre resultó ser especialmente fructífero, participamos en la presentación nacional de la telenovela *Memorias de mi Abuelo*, organizada por la Asociación de Alzheimer en el área de East End. El mes concluyó con reflexiones virtuales de Adviento centradas en la migración y la hospitalidad hacia los más necesitados. This year, Sr. Maureen O'Connell, Secretariat for Social Concerns and Kris Kerlin, Director of the Office of Aging Ministry attended to represent the concerns of those we serve.





# Service Projects and Continued Learning



Working in ministry enables us to give to others through service projects, outreach and to engage in ongoing formation ourselves. This year we were gifted a large number of donated items from Prince of Peace during Lent that we gave to our seniors throughout the year. We've made several visits to our seniors who live at St. Dominic Village and we distributed warm fuzzy socks to the seniors in the nursing home for Thanksgiving.



We also attend numerous conferences and fairs to make people aware of our ministry, enhance our relationships with community partners and deepen our knowledge of topics related to seniors.





# Servant Leadership Training

February 17th



When we began our ministry to seniors who speak Spanish, they told us that they needed assistance with forming leaders; many people were hesitant to step into leadership roles. With the knowledge and expertise of our colleague, Adrian Herrera in the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis, who authored a book on Servant Leadership, we were able to provide training to our spanish speaking seniors. From that training, our Spanish Leadership team emerged.







St. Joseph's Altar is a celebration of the Feast Day of St. Joseph on March 19th, patron saint of the poor, and many other saints. Since not all parishes create an altar to celebrate the feast day, the Office of Aging Ministry was welcomed by Prince of Peace parish to give an open invitation to anyone in the Archdiocese who wanted to attend. An altar of breads, produce and representations of the saints was created and people in the parish dressed as saints. The blessing of the Altar and a rosary happened on the evening of Friday, March 21. The celebration began with a Mass, followed by feeding of the saints, a meal shared by all who were acting as saints. Lunch was served for anyone who attended. Donations were used to support Mercy Ministries, a church ministry that serves the poor and those in need, as well as the Mission of Yahweh, serving homeless women and children since 1961, and many more people.





Our annual Day of Prayer was celebrated on March 24. This day, all of the communities that offer services through the Office of Aging Ministry, our northern, central and southwest communities and our newly formed Spanish community came together to pray together and celebrate the love of God who is truly our Living Hope. This year the Day of Prayer included a special commissioning ceremony for the newly elected officers and leaders of our ministries.





# Installation of the new Archbishop Vasquez

March 25th



Archbishop Joe S. Vasquez who had been the Archbishop of the Diocese of Austin since 2010, returned to the Archdiocese of Galveston Houston to be installed as Archbishop on March 25, 2025. Our team at the Office of Aging Ministry were honored to attend his mass of installation. Archbishop Vasquez was first in the Archdiocese of Galveston Houston as the auxiliary bishop from January 2002 until March 2010.

Currently, he serves as a consultant to the United States Conference of Bishops (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities and is lead bishop Region X for the Fifth National Encounter for Hispanic/Latino ministry (V Encuentro)

Our Office of Aging Ministry team was blessed to attend mass at St. Thomas Seminary on December 19 where Archbishop Vasquez presided and we shared some time and a photo at the Chancery Christmas party.

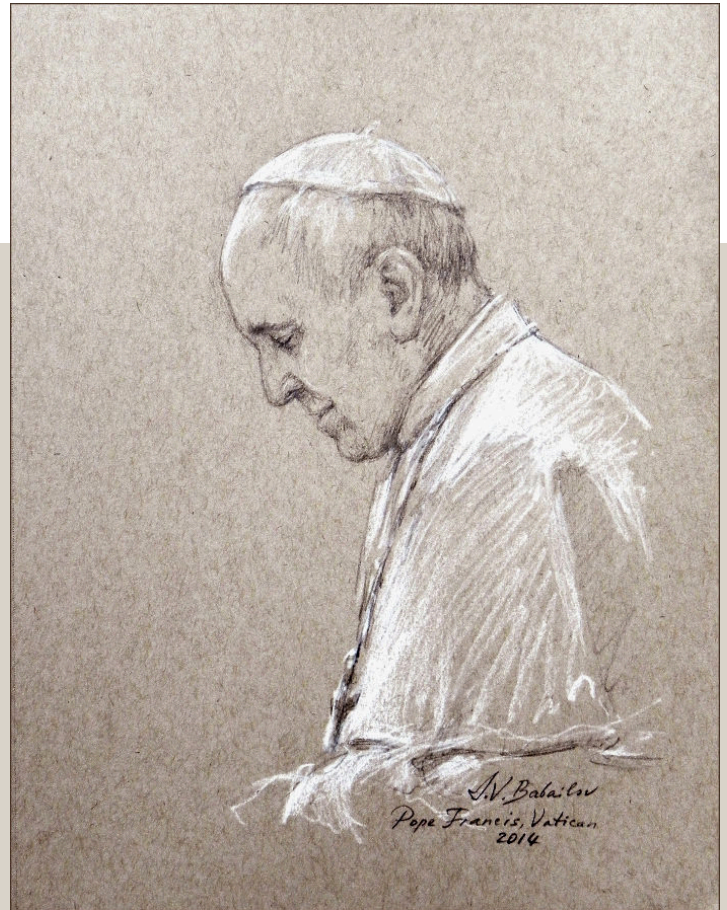


Our beloved Pope Francis went home to God on April 21, 2025 after 88 years of life here on earth.

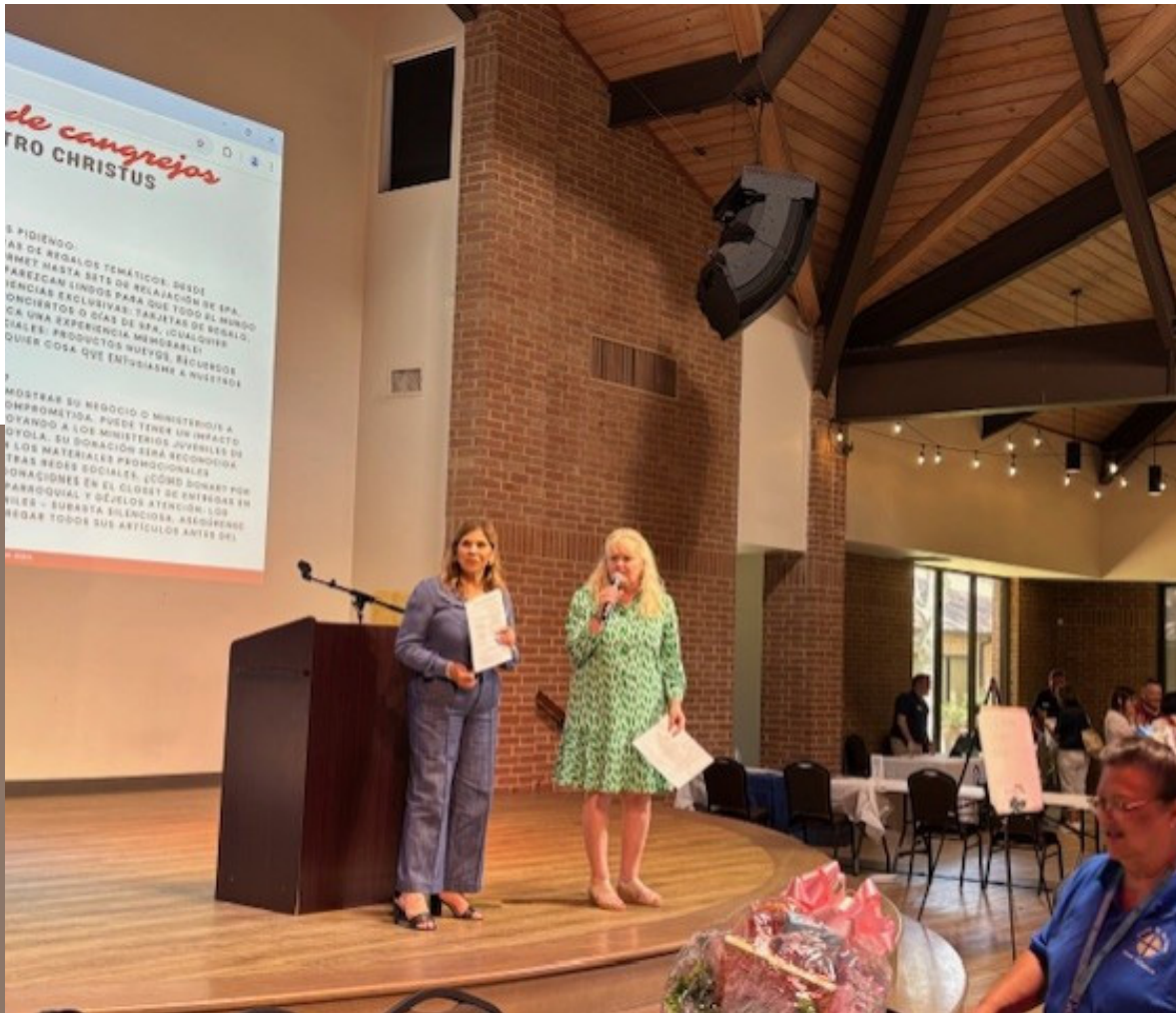
As the chosen successor to Pope Francis, Pope Leo XIV was named the first American Pope on May 8, 2025. Of both American and Peruvian citizenship, he has been a missionary to the poor of Latin America, a priest, then bishop, then cardinal and now a Pope with an ongoing mission to the marginalized.

For the 5th World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, Pope Leo XIV said, "Looking at the elderly in the spirit of this Jubilee, we are called to help them experience liberation, especially from loneliness and abandonment. . . . Especially as we grow older, let us press forward with confidence in the Lord."

In his first address to the world, he began: "Peace be with you! Dearest brothers and sisters, this is the first greeting of the risen Christ, the good shepherd who gave His life for the flock of God. I too would like this greeting of peace to enter your hearts, to reach your families to people, wherever they are; to the peoples, and all the whole earth: Peace be with you."







The Office of Aging Ministry held a Senior Resource Fair for people over age 50 and the people who love them on the north side of Houston in April. Providing essential resources is important given that there are half a million people over fifty in the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston and our mission is to identify and meet the needs of seniors. Over 50 exhibitors from the community, our Catholic family and our parishes covering services related to health, aging in place and senior living, end-of-life and funeral planning, caregiving, grandparents, veterans, retreats, and education were present. Resources were available in both English and Spanish. We also had 12 brief presentations by exhibitors given throughout the day so participants could more fully understand the resources offered.

# Wedding Anniversary

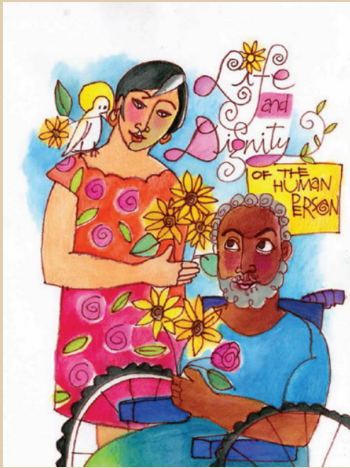

In September, Sr. Maureen O'Connell, retired Secretariat Director of Social Concerns shared her wisdom about Catholic Social Justice teaching and how it applies to current events with the Central Senate.



*From the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops*

The Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. Modern Catholic social teaching has been articulated through a tradition of [papal, conciliar, and episcopal documents](#). The depth and richness of this tradition can be understood best through a direct reading of these documents. In these brief reflections, we highlight several of the key themes that are at the heart of our Catholic social tradition.



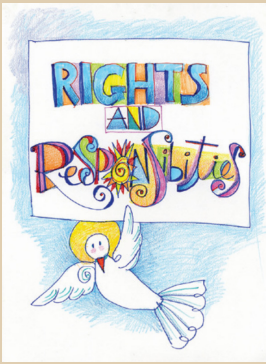
*Life and Dignity of the Human Person*

The Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. This belief is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. In our society, human life is under direct attack from [abortion](#) and [euthanasia](#). The value of human life is being threatened by [cloning](#), [embryonic stem cell research](#), and the use of the [death penalty](#). The intentional targeting of civilians in [war](#) or terrorist attacks is always wrong. Catholic teaching also calls on us to work to avoid war. Nations must protect the right to life by finding increasingly effective ways to prevent conflicts and [resolve them by peaceful means](#). We believe that every person is precious, that people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the [life and dignity](#) of the human person.



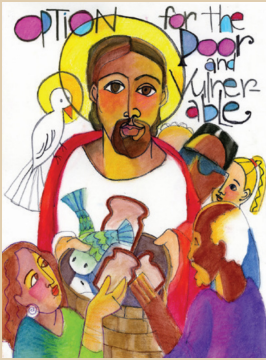
*Call to Family, Community, and Participation*

The person is not only sacred but also social. [How we organize our society](#) -- in economics and politics, in law and policy -- directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. [Marriage and the family](#) are the central social institutions that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. We believe people have a right and a duty to [participate in society](#), seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.



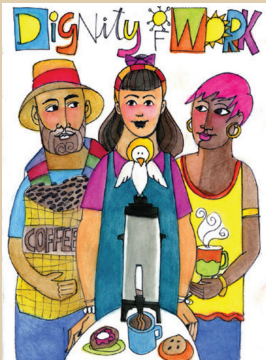
### Rights and Responsibilities

The Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental [right to life](#) and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities--to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.



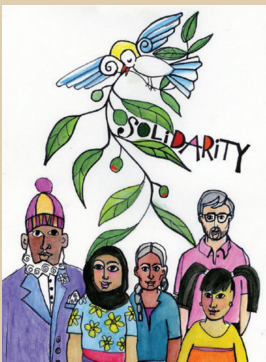
### Option for the Poor and Vulnerable

A basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.



### The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers

The [economy must serve people](#), not the other way around. Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected--the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.



### Solidarity

We are [one human family](#) whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. We are our brothers and sisters keepers, wherever they may be. Loving our neighbor has [global dimensions](#) in a shrinking world. At the core of the virtue of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace. Pope Paul VI taught that if you want peace, work for justice.<sup>1</sup> The Gospel calls us to be peacemakers. Our love for all our sisters and brothers demands that we promote peace in a world surrounded by violence and conflict.



### Care for God's Creation

We show our respect for the Creator by our [stewardship of creation](#). Care for the earth is not just an Earth Day slogan, it is a requirement of our faith. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored.



# Grandparents Day Celebration



Our Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV said, in his message for the Fifth World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly 2025, “How often our grandparents have been for us examples of faith and devotion, civic virtue and social commitment, memory and perseverance amid trials! The precious legacy that they have handed down to us with hope and love will always be a source of gratitude and a summons to perseverance.”

In the Office of Aging Ministry of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston, we celebrate grandparents and the elderly all year long to ensure that ALL older adults, are seen and heard, valued and loved.

# West Side Senior Resource Fair

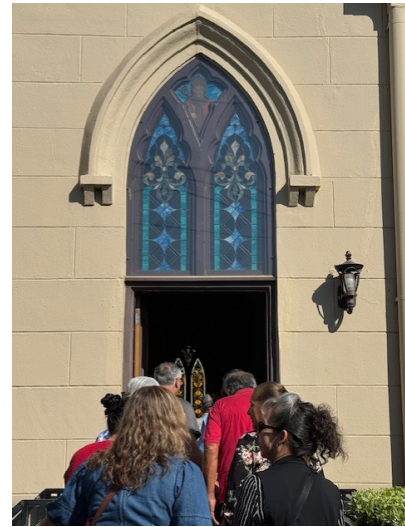

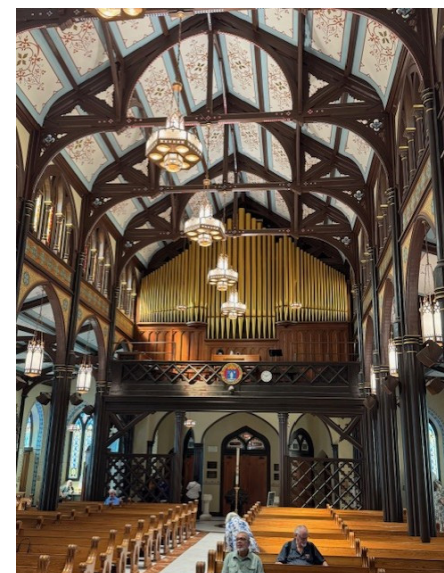
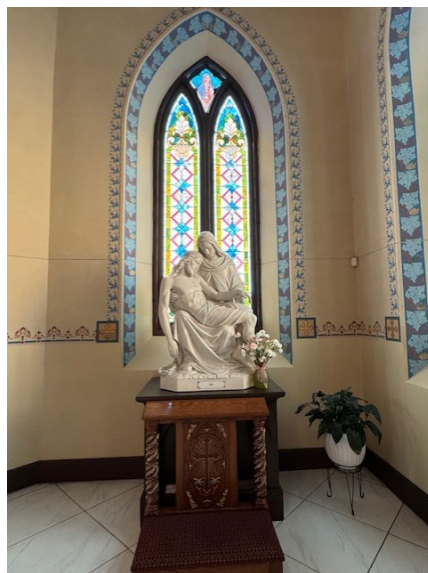
## St. Mary's Basilica Galveston

# Southwest Senior Senate Recognition



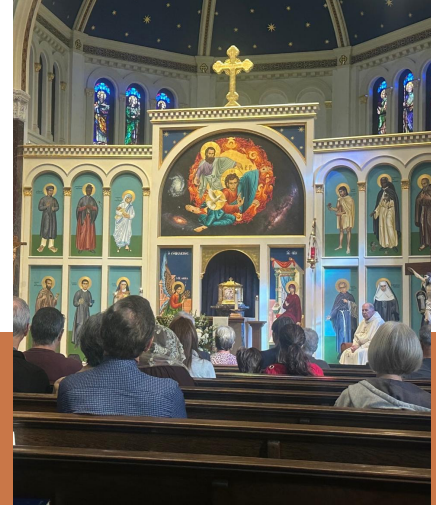
