Mass Moments

Dismissals

We may have three formal dismissals in every Mass. After the Collect, we may dismiss children for their own Liturgy of the Word. After the homily, we dismiss catechumens. At the conclusion of the service, we dismiss everyone else. We also have many informal dismissals. People leave to get to the bathroom, to take out a small child who's had enough already, or to beat the crowd to the parking lot.

We used to formalize all our dismissals. Records from the early Church show dismissals of catechumens and faithful as we have them today. But they also show dismissals of sinners preparing for reconciliation (the Penitents) and of those possessed by demons.

Dismissals brought order to the service and sent people forward with a mission. This is their real purpose. It's not a "get out of here" ritual, it's a "go forth" ritual. It's not so much about leaving; it's more about going someplace.

When we dismiss catechumens, we're sending them forth to talk about the Word of God they've just heard. When we dismiss the faithful, we send them forth to put the Mass into action, renewed by the Eucharist, proclaiming the Gospel wherever they go.

People who excuse themselves from the assembly because of children or Mother Nature use common sense. But those who leave Mass before the final Dismissal may cause annoyance. Leaving Mass early is like leaving home without saying goodbye.

Liturgical prayer is common prayer. Singing the songs, making the responses, observing common silences, and sharing the Sign of Peace all bind us in communion long before we share bread and cup. Communion is **communion** not just with God, but also with one another.

The final Dismissal sends us off together so we never have to proclaim the Gospel alone. We are dismissed together, and together we bring Christ to the world.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ and all people of goodwill,

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus is asked by a scholar of the law, “And who is my neighbor?” when faced with upholding the greatest commandment. Jesus replied with the parable of the Good Samaritan. Today, our nation is divided by partisanship and ideology, which blind us to the image of God in our neighbor, especially the unborn, the poor, and the stranger. These negative sentiments are only exacerbated by gossip, which can spread quickly across social media with no concern for the truth or those involved.

From the beginning, the human race was made in the image of God, which distinguishes us from all other created things. The arrival of Jesus Christ in human history confirms the dignity God has given to each of us, without exception. It is our belief in the dignity of human life that guides our consciences and rhetoric when engaging in politics or personal conversation. Each of us, therefore, must turn to God and ask for eyes to see the infinite dignity of every person.

Throughout our nation’s history, Catholic immigrants have come to our shores seeking freedom to worship and raise their families. Over 70 years ago, Pope Pius XII urged the Body of Christ to understand the Christian responsibility to care for migrants and refugees, writing, “Indeed, there never has been a period during which the Church has not been active in behalf of migrants, exiles and refugees.” Today, we witness newcomers to our dioceses who have escaped extreme violence and poverty and are seeking work to support themselves and their families. Some are Catholic, some are not, but all are welcome in our parishes, and all are individuals loved by God. What is our duty, as Catholics, to ensure all segments of our society, including our political leaders, view newcomers first as children of God while understanding the need to enforce reasonable limits to legal immigration? Do we ask ourselves how we would want to be received if forced to flee our homes?

Though national attention has turned to Springfield, we know that throughout Ohio our neighbors include Haitians and others fleeing inhumane conditions in their countries. Our Haitian brothers and sisters in Springfield have been granted ‘Temporary Protected Status,’ a humane federal program that protects foreign nationals from deportation to unsafe home countries. Like all people, these Haitians should be afforded the respect and dignity that are theirs by right and allowed the ability to contribute to the common good. The recent influx of so many migrants in a brief time has caused a strain on the city’s resources. We applaud all those community groups working hard to advance the flourishing of Springfield, given the need to integrate newcomers into the social fabric. If we remain true to our principles, we can have a dialogue about immigration without scapegoating groups of people for societal issues beyond their control.

The Letter of Saint James warns, “Consider how small a fire can set a huge forest ablaze. The tongue is also a fire... With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings

who are made in the likeness of God" (James 3:5-6, 9). As the residents of Springfield, Ohio struggle with violent threats and life disruptions fueled by unfettered social media posts, we exhort the Catholic faithful and all people of goodwill not to perpetuate ill will toward anyone involved based on unfounded gossip. Instead, we ask for prayers and support for all the people of Springfield as they integrate their new Haitian neighbors and build a better future together.

Pope Francis, like Pope Benedict XVI and Pope St. John Paul II before him, reminds us that we are all migrants on this earth headed toward the "true homeland," the Kingdom of Heaven. On September 29, the [World Day of Migrants and Refugees](#), we are asked by the Holy Father to reflect upon the need to open our eyes to those brothers and sisters who might live in the shadows of our parishes and communities. The Catholic Church continues to pray and work in places of violence and economic despair so that individuals and families do not have to flee their homeland. In the meantime, let us reject a mindset of judging who belongs to our community and put on the mind of Christ to understand that God walks with all his people, especially those in need.

Estimados hermanos y hermanas en Cristo y todas las personas de buena voluntad,

En el Evangelio de Lucas, un maestro de la ley le pregunta a Jesús: “¿Y quién es mi prójimo?” cuando se enfrenta a la obligación de cumplir el más grande de los mandamientos. Jesús respondió con la parábola del Buen Samaritano. Hoy en día, nuestra nación está dividida por el partidismo y la ideología, que nos ciegan a la imagen de Dios en nuestro prójimo, especialmente en los no nacidos, los pobres y los forasteros. Estos sentimientos negativos sólo se ven exacerbados por los chismes, que pueden propagarse rápidamente por las redes sociales sin tener en cuenta la verdad ni a los involucrados.

Desde el principio, la raza humana fue creada a imagen de Dios, lo que nos distingue de todas las demás cosas creadas. La llegada de Jesucristo a la historia de la humanidad confirma la dignidad que Dios ha dado a cada uno de nosotros, sin excepción. Es nuestra creencia en la dignidad de la vida humana lo que guía nuestras conciencias y nuestra retórica cuando participamos en la política o en conversaciones personales. Cada uno de nosotros, por tanto, debe dirigirse a Dios y pedirle ojos para ver la dignidad infinita de cada persona.

A lo largo de la historia de nuestra nación, los inmigrantes católicos han llegado a nuestras costas buscando libertad para practicar su culto y criar a sus familias. Hace más de 70 años, el Papa Pío XII instó al Cuerpo de Cristo a comprender la responsabilidad cristiana de cuidar a los migrantes y refugiados, escribiendo: “No hubo, pues, ninguna época en que la Iglesia descuidara a los emigrantes, desterrados y prófugos”. Hoy somos testigos de cómo llegan a nuestras diócesis personas que han escapado de la violencia y la pobreza extrema y buscan trabajo para mantenerse a sí mismos y a sus familias. Algunos son católicos, otros no, pero todos son bienvenidos en nuestras parroquias y todos son individuos amados por Dios. ¿Cuál es nuestro deber, como católicos, de garantizar que todos los segmentos de nuestra sociedad, incluidos nuestros líderes políticos, vean a los recién llegados primero como hijos de Dios y, al mismo tiempo, comprendan la necesidad de imponer límites razonables a la inmigración legal? ¿Nos preguntamos cómo nos gustaría ser recibidos si nos viéramos obligados a huir de nuestros hogares?

Aunque la atención nacional se ha centrado en Springfield, sabemos que en todo Ohio nuestros vecinos incluyen haitianos y otras personas que huyen condiciones inhumanas en sus países. A nuestros hermanos y hermanas haitianos en Springfield se les ha concedido el “Estatus de Protección Temporal”, un programa federal humanitario que protege a los ciudadanos extranjeros de la deportación a países de origen inseguros. Como todas las personas, a estos haitianos se les debe brindar el respeto y la dignidad que les corresponden por derecho y se les debe permitir la posibilidad de contribuir al bien común. La reciente afluencia de tantos inmigrantes en tan poco tiempo ha provocado una presión en los recursos de la ciudad. Aplaudimos a todos aquellos grupos comunitarios que trabajan arduamente para promover el florecimiento de Springfield, dada la necesidad de integrar a los recién llegados al tejido social. Si nos mantenemos fieles a nuestros principios, podemos dialogar sobre la inmigración sin convertir a grupos de personas en chivos expiatorios de problemas sociales que escapan a su control.

La carta de Santiago advierte: “Miren cómo una pequeña llama basta para incendiar un gran bosque. También la lengua es un fuego... Con ella bendecimos al Señor, nuestro Padre, y con ella maldecimos a los hombres, hechos a imagen de Dios” (Santiago 3, 5-6. 9). Mientras los residentes de Springfield, Ohio, se enfrentan a amenazas violentas y perturbaciones de la vida alimentadas por publicaciones desenfrenadas en las redes sociales, exhortamos a los fieles católicos y a todas las personas de buena voluntad a no perpetuar la mala voluntad hacia nadie involucrado basándose en chismes infundados. En cambio, pedimos oraciones y apoyo para todos los habitantes de Springfield mientras integran a sus nuevos vecinos haitianos y construyen juntos un futuro mejor.

El Papa Francisco, como el Papa Benedicto XVI y el Papa San Juan Pablo II antes que él, nos recuerda que todos somos migrantes en esta tierra en camino hacia la “verdadera patria”, el Reino de los Cielos. El 29 de septiembre, la [Jornada Mundial del Migrante y del Refugiado](#) el Santo Padre nos pide que reflexionemos sobre la necesidad de abrir los ojos a aquellos hermanos y hermanas que podrían vivir en las sombras de nuestras parroquias y comunidades. La Iglesia católica continúa orando y trabajando en lugares de violencia y desesperación económica para que las personas y las familias no tengan que huir de su tierra natal. Mientras tanto, rechazamos una mentalidad de juzgar quiénes pertenecen a nuestra comunidad y vistámonos la mente de Cristo para entender que Dios camina con todo su pueblo, especialmente con los necesitados.
