# *The Pastor Jots It Down*

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. John Bosco and St. Rosalie Parishes,

## *Happy Second Sunday of Advent!*

Today, we can ask ourselves “How has the first week of Advent impacted our lives?” If we answer that it has been business as usual and just like every other week in our lives, then we have missed the message and invitation of the Church.

Holy Mother Church knows our tendency to procrastinate, and so she reminds us this Sunday more boldly to Prepare the Way of the Lord. We see on the front cover of the bulletin the words, **Prepare the Way** beneath a nativity scene. We are reminded of God’s love in sending His only son, to become like us and offer His life in sacrifice so that we can be worthy of entering into heaven.

In our first reading today, we heard: The Lord is patient with you, not wishing that any should perish but rather that all should come to repentance.

In our Gospel today, we hear of John the Baptist who was sent by God to prepare the way for the Lord, for his cousin, Jesus. John prepared the way by preaching, inviting the people to repent, to turn away from their sins and be baptized.

In the opening verses of Mark’s Gospel after John was arrested, Jesus began His public ministry, proclaiming the good news of God and saying: “The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God has come near, repent and believe in the good news.” (Mark 1:15)

Jesus summarized His mission to call people to change their ways and to repent – the same message we heard in the first reading; the same message proclaimed by John as he prepared the way for Jesus.

Because of original sin, this is the perennial message of Jesus and of the Church. We are called to turn away from our sins, to repent, and to make efforts to live a more gospel way of life.

Jesus gave us the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Penance, Confession) as a remedy for our sins and as means to help us live a more gospel way of life.

Regular reception of the sacrament of Reconciliation, along with daily prayer and faithful weekly celebration of the Eucharist, are musts for every Catholic if we sincerely desire to grow in our love for God and be examples of what it means to follow Jesus.

I encourage all our parishioners to prepare the way for the coming of Jesus through a good Advent confession. The first step in changing our ways is to admit the areas in confession where we need to change. Then rely upon the power of the sacrament coupled with our good will to help us live Jesus and God’s ways in our daily lives.

Confessions are heard every Wednesday evening from 7 – 8 pm during Adoration at both churches. Then on Saturdays at St. Rosalie from 3:15-4:45 pm and at St. John Bosco from 4:30-5:15pm.

You may also make an appointment for Confession with a priest of your choice; and as always, when the priest is in church, you can ask him for the sacrament.

# 5 Ways to Prepare the Way of the Lord

## *1. Empathetic listening and accompanying*

Jesus came to set captives free, to set hearts free. We can do that for people in our lives when we accompany and listen to people – spending time with them.

## *2. Rejoice in the good. Build people up.*

Who needs building up? Who is doing good things, needs someone to help them see joy, even if it's not explicitly Catholic? Who needs your influence to use the good in their life to connect better to God?

## *3. Pray without ceasing*

When we ourselves are people of constant conversion, this becomes visible and attractive to the others around us.

## *4. Testify to the light*

Speak and name grace in our lives and in others. Point to virtuous living... even if not explicitly Christian. Help people recognize the good by naming it.

## *5. Be the voice and let Christ be the Word.*

John the Baptist was the voice. Jesus was and IS the Word – Christ within.

# Spiritual Exercise

1. Find a quiet, solitary place and spend some quiet time in prayer this week, creating silence amidst the busyness of the season. Ask the Lord to help you make space for him and to be patient with that space and quiet in this special time of waiting before Christmas.
2. In your prayer, consider the people in your life who need help in preparing for Christ's birth, or for His presence at all in their lives. Maybe it's already obvious who needs particular help. If not, ask the Lord and Our Lady to reveal to you the individuals and interactions where you can be the best witness and listener... who needs your time, patience and gentleness... who needs help to celebrate the good in their lives?
3. Ask Jesus and Mary to give you holy boldness in your life, that you could be more like John the Baptist – the voice for God's Word. Where are you too timid? Where do you miss opportunities to speak Christ's liberating Word into the world and into the hearts and minds of those you meet in daily life? Resolve to listen to Him and be open to how you might do a better job at this, using your own unique gifts.

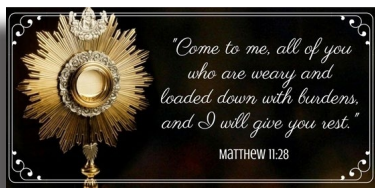
