Appunti del Parroco: a Message from the Pastor

St. Hyacinth

From the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecelia in Nashville:

The life of this thirteenth century “Apostle of the North,” known for his zeal for souls, makes him a great patron for our modern times, so much in need of young hearts fearlessly leaving all to proclaim the Gospel. Zeal such as that of St. Hyacinth is the driving force of the Order of Preachers.

If we consider the Greek etymology of the word “enthusiasm,” which means “to be full of God,” Hyacinth comes across as a figure unconditional in his enthusiasm for preaching the Good News. Born of noble parents in Poland around 1185, he was educated in Cracow. On a trip to Rome in 1218, he met St. Dominic, from whom both Hyacinth and his cousin, Ceslaus, received the habit of the Friars Preachers. A painting at the Dominican Church of Santa Sabina in Rome depicts this event with Ceslaus lying prostrate on the floor and Hyacinth being clothed by St. Dominic in the white robe of “the athletes of the faith.” Within a few months of his reception of the habit, Hyacinth embarked on his first mission, sent by St. Dominic to preach and establish the Order in Poland.

For the next 35 years, this great disciple of Dominic devoted himself to preaching the Gospel, encouraging his followers to nurture the practice of study, and opening new Dominican monasteries. He was tireless in his efforts, soon establishing Dominican Friaries in all the major cities in Poland. These houses became known as centers of theological thought and missionary activity. He extended his missionary activity through Russia, Lithuania, present day Czech Republic and Slovakia, Austria, Bohemia, Greece, Turkey and northern China. After crossing the Baltic Sea, he preached in Denmark, Sweden and Norway, and is also said to have visited Scotland.

After unceasing labors and vast journeys, Hyacinth spent his last few months of life in a monastery he had founded in Cracow. Although worn out and weakened by illness and fever, he kept watch in the service of God until his death by celebrating Mass on the Feast of the Assumption. He was anointed at the foot of the altar on Aug. 15, 1257, and died

the same day. Canonized over 300 years later, he was the seventh Dominican to be raised to sainthood.

One of the most famous stories about Hyacinth concerns his miraculous saving of a precious relic of the Blessed Virgin Mary from a burning church in Kiev, Ukraine, in 1240. According to the legend, Hyacinth was celebrating Mass when he heard the news of the

Mongol invasion and the burning of the church. He rushed to the scene and retrieved the ciborium containing the Eucharist and the statue of Mary, and fled to safety. As he crossed the river Dnieper, he was aided by an angel who gave him a strong gust of wind that carried him and his companions to the opposite shore. It is because of this story that most depictions of St. Hyacinth show him holding a monstrance or ciborium and a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

St. Hyacinth’s feast day is Aug. 17. He is the patron saint of Lithuania as well as the patron saint of those who are in danger of drowning and weight lifters.

Reflection: The harder thing

Have you ever wanted to throw in the towel? To just give up and seek an easier, less challenging life? If your answer is no, then, my friend, you are kidding yourself! We all long for ease in life. I do not know of many people that desire to live a life of hardship and stress. We want the easy life — the comfortable life. For many, the pursuit of comfort and a drama-free life is the priority. I would be dishonest if I did not admit that there are certainly occasions when I feel this way. It is also an honest thing to say that we often want a Christian life that is easy and comfortable. I used to think that if I followed the Lord, even just a little bit, that He would make my life comfortable and easy. I would often get upset and struggle in my relationship with Him when things were the opposite. Sometimes we can be quick to discount God’s goodness when life is not going the way we desire it to go, or when we have to struggle through. Our Blessed Lord told us that following Him would not be easy. He told us that we would be hated by

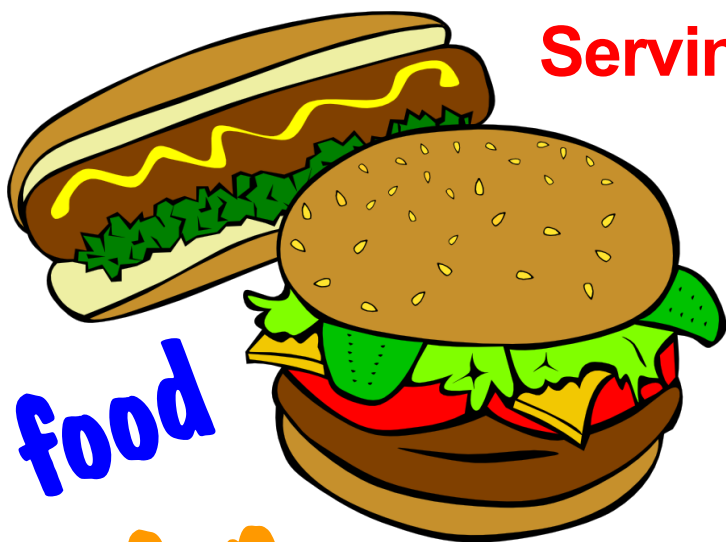

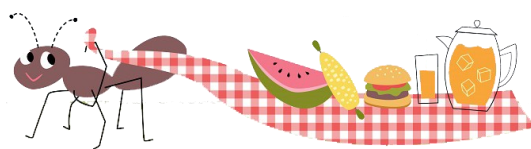

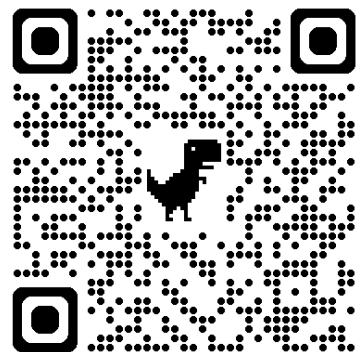

the world if we are faithful to Him. He told us that even our families and friends would despise us.

“This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you. You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide; so that whatever you ask the Father in my name, he may give it to you. This I command you, to love one another.

“If the world hates you, know that it has hated me before it hated you. If you were of the world, the world would love its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you” (Jn 15:12-19 RSVCE).

Brother will deliver up brother to death, and the father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; and you will be hated by all for my name’s sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved (Matt 10:21-22 RSVCE).

Although it is hard to get our minds around most of the time, the call remains the same. Jesus invites us to follow Him. He does this with a warning, but also with an encouragement of not counting the cost. What we will gain from laying our lives down is far greater than what we “lose” in the process. Discipleship is not a cheap thing. It comes at a cost, but it also comes with a great promise. If we press into our relationship with Jesus, He will give us the graces necessary to persevere in the many hard moments that accompany this life. If we choose to take the path that leads to righteousness and holiness, while it will certainly not be easy or comfortable, it will lead us to heaven. If, on the other hand we chose to pursue a comfortable and easy life — both in the world and in our faith, where will that lead us?

And behold, one came up to him, saying, “Teacher, what good deed must I do, to have eternal life?” And he said to him, “Why do you ask me about what is good? One there is who is good. If you would enter life, keep the commandments.” He said to him, “Which?” And Jesus said, “You shall not kill, You shall not commit adultery, You shall not steal, You shall not bear false witness, Honor your father and mother, and, You shall love your

neighbor as yourself.” The young man said to him, “All these I have observed; what do I still lack?” Jesus said to him, “If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me.” When the young man heard this he went away sorrowful; for he had great possessions. And Jesus said to his disciples, “Truly, I say to you, it will be hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.” When the disciples heard this they were greatly astonished, saying, “Who then can be saved?” But Jesus looked at them and said to them, “With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible.” Then Peter said in reply, “Lo, we have left everything and followed you. What then shall we have?” Jesus said to them, “Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of man shall sit on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And every one who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for my name’s sake, will receive a hundredfold, and inherit eternal life. But many that are first will be last, and the last first. (Matt 19:16-30 RSVCE).

We have to decide every day how we will live. I see only two options:

- Option One — I will strive to surrender my heart to Him every day and follow Him without counting the cost and aim for eternal life.
- Option Two — I will choose the easy path of least resistance and maybe gain the world and aim for comfort and pleasure, and lose my soul.

May our good God change our hearts that we may desire His way over our ours. St. Hyacinth, pray for us!

O holy St. Hyacinth, we ask you to intercede for us and win God’s blessings for us. We come together as family to bring praise and worship to the Father. May we live lives that are holy. Bless us with your devotion to Mary the Mother of God and with an ardent faith in Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Win for us the graces to continue to live according to gospel values and the teachings of the church. Intercede for us and protect us as we place ourselves under your patronage and care. Amen.

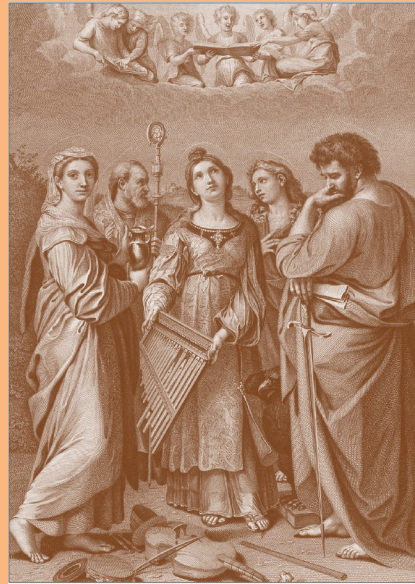
