

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD with Kathy O'Connor PALM SUNDAY

Reading I: Isaiah 50:4-7: The reading from Isaiah for this Palm Sunday is taken from a part of the book known as the third song of the Servant of the Lord. The second song focused on the servant's mission, while the third song focuses on the servant himself. The first stanza emphasizes the servant's compliance to the word of God; the servant is not depicted as a self-taught teacher with original ideas, but as an obedient disciple. The second (verses 5-6) speaks of the suffering that the servant's compliance has brought him; without the servant ever uttering a word of complaint. The third (verses 7-8) shows how determined the servant is: if he suffers in silence, it is not out of cowardice, but because God helps him and makes him stronger than his persecutors. The evangelists saw the words of this song as finding fulfilment in Jesus, especially what the song has to say about the suffering and silent fortitude of the servant. The description of the servant's suffering was the part that impressed the early Christians the most. It was the part of the song that was recalled when they meditated on the passion of Jesus.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24 (2a): The responsorial psalm for this Palm Sunday is Psalm 22, a psalm of David, which is a prayer of entreaty by a good man, suffering and beset by enemies, yet he hopes for and proclaims his deliverance by God. The good man in the psalm suffers all the more, because the people who see him in his suffering, claim that God does not love him. Recall that during His passion, Jesus endured the jeers of the crowd. Even so, the psalmist claims that God has looked after him from birth and has supported him thus far. The man's wounds are such that all his bones are visible, and his enemies take him for dead, dividing his garments, as was the case with Jesus. The psalm appears to reflect utter desolation. However, in verses 23-24, the psalmist proclaims his confidence, that God will respond to him and vows to praise him even in his suffering.

Reading II: Philippians 2:6-11: The first reading, responsorial psalm and this passage from St. Paul prepares us to hear of the passion of Christ. We are first reminded by St. Paul of Jesus' divinity. Jesus was God and could not stop being God; therefore, He had a right to be treated as God and to appear in all His glory. However, He did not insist on this dignity of His as if it were a treasure which He possessed and which was legally His: it was not something He clung to or boasted about. He took the form of a servant which reflects the prophecy of Isaiah. He chose to be like men, in all things but sin. By becoming man in the way He did, He was able to bear our sorrows and to be stricken. Christ did not shed His divine nature; He simply shed its glory. Verses 6-8 recall the contrast between Adam and Jesus. Satan tempted Adam, a mere man, to "be like God" (Gen 3:5). Jesus, on the other hand, who enjoyed divine glory for all eternity, chooses the way of humility and empties Himself, the complete opposite of Adam. Christ's obedience makes up for the disobedience of the first man; it puts mankind in a position to more than recover the natural and supernatural gifts with which God endowed human nature at the creation. Christ's humility and obedience unto death reveals His love for us. This immense act of humility on the part of the Son led to the exaltation of the human nature He assumed. The Christ proclaimed here, as having been raised on high, is the man-God who was born and died for our sake, attaining the glory of His exultation after undergoing the humiliation of the cross. In this Christ sets us an example: we cannot attain the glory of heaven, unless we understand the supernatural value of difficulties, ill-health, and suffering: there are manifestations of Christ's cross present in our ordinary lives.

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Gospel: The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark: We read the passion every Palm Sunday, and it has become familiar to us. Perhaps we can illuminate some parts of the passage. The disciples have heard Jesus warn that He would be handed over, but He has not told them who would hand Him over. Now He tells them that one of them will betray Him. Not only that, but it will be someone who is sharing a meal with Him. In the time of Jesus, meals were an expression of intimacy. To be betrayed by someone with whom one had shared a meal heightened the betrayal. The disciples are distressed and begin to seek His reassurance by asking, "Surely it is not I?" Jesus does not give them reassurance but narrows the focus, saying it will be one who dips with me into the dish. Many times during the Last Supper, Jesus would give Judas opportunities to rethink his betrayal of the Lord. He treats Judas as a friend, even washing his feet, as He does the other disciples. Still, we know Judas will betray Him. Jesus institutes the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper. He offers the bread saying, "take it; this is my body". Jesus is saying that the bread they are eating is His body, His person, His self. The meaning of this is something that the disciples need to ponder. We need to ponder it as well. Then He offers the cup saying, "This is my blood of the covenant which will be shed for many." Jews at that time had a great abhorrence for drinking blood. The Hebrew notion of blood was that it was the life of a human or an animal and was never to be consumed. When an animal was sacrificed, its blood was offered to God as an intrinsic part of offering the life of the animal. Yet, here Jesus is, telling the disciples to drink His blood. His words and actions during the Last Supper anticipate and interpret His death. As He begins His passion and death, He asks three disciples to watch with Him while He prays. They fall asleep. Peter will deny Jesus and weep bitterly because of his denial. The disciples are terrified and literally run for their lives. Only John will stand at the foot of the cross with Mary. Pilate knows that the chief priests have handed Jesus over out of envy, but he caves into political pressure. He hands Jesus over to be crucified. Jesus, the suffering servant of God, is obedient unto death, and by His death, we are redeemed.

Reflection: How to ponder the depth of Jesus' love for us? Is it humanly possible to even understand such love? Perhaps this Holy Week, we might reflect on the following points: 1) how is my understanding of Jesus shaped by what He did and said at the Last Supper?, 2) what lesson is there for me in the disciples repeatedly falling asleep?, 3) do I follow Jesus only at a safe distance?,4) what lessons do I find in Peter's denials, and 5) what does the image of the crucified Jesus mean for me. Perhaps we can attend Mass on Holy Thursday and enter into a deeper appreciation of the meaning of the Last Supper for Jesus, the disciples, and ourselves.




