This weekend our 3rd Grade Students in the School and Parish Religious Education Program will celebrate their First Holy Communion. This is a very special day for them as they will receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist for the very first time. This day brings even more excitement since they should have received First Communion over five months ago. Today is an opportunity for each of us to recall our own First Communion. Please pray for the god-parents', grandparents and aunts and uncles that are not permitted to attend this year. Above all pray for our First Communicants to have a deep love and joy for Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD with Dr. Kathy O'Connor
27th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reading I: Isaiah 5:1-7: The passage from Isaiah this weekend is a passage known as the song of the vineyard. *The Song of the Vineyard* is a traditional song of the wine harvest of that time in Israel. Isaiah reinterprets the song in order to describe God's relationship with the nations of Israel and Judah. It is full of symbolism and carries an important message. It is a simple story that does not take long to tell. To begin with, the author keeps us in suspense as to what he is getting at but then reveals that the vineyard is the house of Israel. In verses 3-6 God is speaking. Despite all the care God has taken of it, it failed to yield the expected fruit; giving instead wild grapes. The question "...why did it bring forth wild grapes?" is an indication that Israel needs to admit its fault. In verses 5-6, there are a series of woes that God describes which will befall the vineyard. Scripture scholars believe that the Church, as the heir of ancient Israel, is prefigured in the story of the vineyard. Vatican II commented on this in *Lumen Gentium* interpreting that "*the Church is a piece of land to be cultivated, the field of God.*"

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 80:9, 12, 13-14, 15-16, 19-20: Psalm 80 is an appeal to God, the shepherd of Israel, to restore His desolate people, possibly reflecting the passage from Isaiah in the first reading. This extended allegory of Israel as a vine planted by the Lord and tended with great care used by Isaiah to denounce the people for their unfruitfulness and ingratitude. Here, the psalmist reminds God that the love and care lavished on Israel in the past are desperately needed again. The psalmist regards Israel as the instrument through which the power of God manifests itself and the people chosen by Him. Corresponding to God's intervention of His renewed care will be the fidelity of the people (verse 18).

Reading II: Philippians 4:6-9: St. Paul is writing to the Philippian Christians while he himself is in prison and the Philippian community is experiencing persecution. Yet, the apostle writes that there is no need for us to feel ill at ease because God, our Father, is near to us and He listens to our prayers. God is always ready to instruct us and to give whatever we need to overcome difficulties that arise. All that He asks is that we trustingly tell Him our situation, speaking to Him with the simplicity of a child. Paul also exhorts the Philippians to ponder and seek noble human aspirations: goodness of heart, sincerity, strength, justice, purity, and courtesy. When we seek and contemplate these virtues they help us reach God. St. Josemaria Escriva wrote of these virtues "*...your Daily encounter with Christ takes place where your fellow men, your yearnings, your work, and your affections are. It is in the midst of the most material things of the earth that we must sanctify ourselves, serving God and all mankind*".

Gospel: Matthew 21:33-43: Jesus is continuing His teaching in parables directed to the chief priests and elders. The parable in today's passage actually completes the parable of the two sons from last week. Our parable this week is the parable of the wicked tenants and it echoes the passage from Isaiah in the first reading. Jesus Himself is one of the parable's characters. Jesus' audience would be very familiar with Judaism, knowing its traditions, imagery, and prophecies. Thus, they would be familiar with Isaiah's Song of the Vineyard in the first reading. Jesus compares Israel to a choice vineyard which belongs to the householder who is God. The tenants to whom God has given the care of His people are the priests, scribes, and elders. The owner used to send his servants from time to time to collect the fruit; this was the mission of the prophets.

The two groups of servants who are killed by the tenants watching over the vineyards refers to the way God's prophets were mistreated by the kings and priests of Israel. Finally the owner sends his son thinking that the tenants would respect him. However, the malicious purpose of the tenants in murdering the son and heir to keep the inheritance for themselves is the madness of the leaders in expecting to become undisputed leaders of Israel by putting Christ to death. At the end of the parable Jesus prophesies the punishment God will inflict on the evildoers: He will put them to death and rent the vineyard to others. The stone is Jesus, but the architects of Israel who build up and rule the people have chosen not to use it in the building. Because of their unfaithfulness the Kingdom of God will be turned over to another people, the Gentiles, who *will* give God the fruit He expects His vineyard to yield. In the verses following our reading for Mass, the chief priests and scribes realized Jesus was speaking about them. Instead of repenting, they waited for a time that they could arrest Him. They simply dug in their heels so to speak.

Reflection: This parable is a small synopsis of the whole history of God's attempt to bring men back into friendship with Him through a loving call to repentance. Jesus sums up salvation history, past, present, and future. How patient God has been! But even such patience could not transform men's hearts. So God sent His Son Jesus Christ. The vineyard is the world given to men by God for them to cultivate and care for. The tenants are the leaders of God's chosen people. The owner is God Himself. The servants are the prophets and the son is Jesus. Sin is the tenants "wretchedness" by which they rebel against the owner out of selfishness and greed. Can we see ourselves in this parable? The parable does apply to us today! We are each given a vineyard: our own life. We are each given all the means necessary to live that life in accordance with God's plan for us. Just like the tenants in the parable, we too have been introduced to the owner's son Jesus Christ: through baptism, confirmation, the Eucharist, and other sacraments. Are our own vineyards producing the kind of fruit God wants us to produce? Perhaps this week we might reflect on the following: **1)** what is the particular message of Jesus' parable for me; **2)** what responsibilities in His vineyard has God entrusted to me; **3)** what does it tell me about God that He would send His Son knowing how those He sends are treated; **4)** what fruit am I bearing for God? *Lord, thank you for never giving up on me. Thank you for being so patient with me. Teach me to be truly humble, to place all my confidence in you, and to learn the secret of lasting joy. Make me a channel of your peace...*


HOLY SPIRIT PRAYER GROUP
