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Here are some important updates for us during the celebration of Mass from Father Haft.

A few weeks ago, a visiting priest gave a homily that resulted in applause. It is never appropriate to applause for a homily, just as it would never be appropriate to boo as the result of a homily. The reason being is that we are in the context of prayer. Prayer requires silence. The time of silence after the homily is meant for us to reflect on the Word of God proclaimed.

During the distribution of the Body of Christ it is important that all of us maintain our reverence for the Holy Eucharist. This has declined since the pandemic hit because we are also dealing with the masks now. All distributors of the Body of Christ including myself are always wearing masks. So, that we can maintain reverence for the Holy Eucharist please lower your mask just before extending both hands to receive the Holy Eucharist. After consuming the Body of Christ, then re-position your mask.

If you are unable to receive the Eucharist with both hands for whatever reason please remain seated on the end of a pew and an usher will direct a Communion Distributor to you so that you can receive the Eucharist reverently with both hands.

Some of the faithful still desire very deeply to receive the Holy Eucharist on the tongue. We are not permitted to deny anyone the Eucharist if they present themselves with the proper posture and disposition. Therefore, please wait until the end of the Communion Line in the center aisle and come to the priest only. The priest will always distribute in the center aisle.





BREAKING OPEN THE WORD with Dr. Kathy O'Connor 28th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reading I: Isaiah 25:6-10a: This passage from Isaiah is a poem celebrating the time of redemption that will follow the apocalypse and the joyous banquet that God will host. The banquet will be held on the mountain which is envisioned here as the seat of God's dominion and the place where heaven and earth meet. "Death" in verse 8 refers to the definitive destruction of Israel: God gives an assurance that it will never happen. St. Paul quotes this verse when he rejoices that the resurrection of Christ marks the definitive victory over death (1 Cor 15:54-55). These words prefigure the Eucharistic banquet instituted by Jesus in Jerusalem in which He provides divine nourishment: His own body and blood. Quotes from the second part of verse 8 are cited in Revelation 7:17 to describe how every tear will be wiped away in the eschatological (after Christ returns again at the end of time) kingdom.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4,5,6,(c-d): The responsorial psalm for Mass this weekend is a psalm of David and is a psalm of contentment and life. The psalmist is looking forward to the Lord's table (verse 5) reflecting the words from the reading from Isaiah. In the Old Testament the shepherd was used as a metaphor for the king and for God, as protector and judge of His people. What makes this psalm special is the very personal note, "The Lord is my shepherd" (verse 1) and the fact that by spelling out the actions of a shepherd it describes God's relationship with someone who seeks righteousness, holiness (verses 2-3); in the case of this psalm, the anointed king himself (King David). The sense of security that the Lord gives, even in the midst of affliction, allows the speaker to address Him directly and proclaim the protection that God gives ("thy rod") and God's authority (thy staff"). The psalmist thanks Him for His benefits (verse 5) and goes on to tell God how confident he feels that he will go on enjoying the benefits of the Covenant (goodness and mercy) and he will continue to visit the temple for a long time to come. In the light of Jesus' description of Himself as the good shepherd, all who believe in Him and in His work of redemption can adopt the psalmist's words and feelings.

Reading II: Philippians 4:12-14, 19-20: The verses immediately preceding our verses for today express St. Paul's gratitude to the Philippians for the material aid they have given him. His general policy was not to accept material aid from the various church communities so that there would be no doubt about the purity of his intentions in teaching the Gospel. This meant that he was also practicing the virtue of poverty, being content with what he had. But he had great confidence in the Philippians and so from them alone he accepted help. In verse 12 Paul is discussing the difficulties he has often experienced. He has learned to live both in humble situations and in times of flourishing. He often encountered persecution and distress to preach the Gospel. Through it all, he perseveres because God sends him His strength. Paul is telling the Philippians and is telling us that the difficulties which can arise in life are not an insuperable obstacle, for we can always count on God's support. So, we need to let ourselves be supported: we need to go to the Lord whenever we feel tempted or discouraged.

Gospel: Matthew 22: 1-14: Our Gospel this weekend tells us the parable of the wedding feast. It warns us of failing to heed the Gospel's call to repentance. The setting is a wedding feast prepared by a king for his son. According to custom, invitations to a feast went out in two stages: one to request the attendance of the guests in advance, and another to gather them together when the festivities were about to being. This appears to be the story of God sending the prophets to prepare for the messiah, and later sending the apostles to notify His people that the messianic celebration is ready. Strangely, the people who accepted the first invitation decline the second.

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Some people ignored the call and went about their business while others mistreated the messengers and had some of them killed. Since the first guests invited were unworthy of the kingdom, the king send other servants to gather whomever is found on the roads and streets to fill the banquet hall. Perhaps in the parable these gathered guests represents the apostles and the Gentile mission. The guests are assembled but there is a man who is not properly dressed; he has refused the proffered wedding garment. The king is affronted and orders attendants to throw him outside of the kingdom, a place of great discomfort; a place of wailing and grinding of teeth. How are we to interpret the inappropriate attire? Those gathered in the street were both good and bad. The good being the righteous and the bad being those that do not repent and change. So perhaps the wedding garment is the righteousness that comes with repentance. Repentance and change are not easy. As Jesus said, many are invited but few are chosen.

Reflection: God always invites us but He does not coerce. He will never force us into friendship nor into heaven. This parable and the ones immediately preceding address the mysterious topic of human freedom. In the parable we see how foolish those men were who preferred their own business to the king's feast. They loved their work and profit so much that they declined the much better thing. If they had only been willing to admit their indebtedness to the king, whose rule made the peace and prosperity they were enjoying possible in the first place, they would have easily adjusted their own plans to honor him. In that case, they could have enjoyed both the good things and the better things. In the parable the mistake is obvious, but in our own lives we often fall into the same trap: God's plans seem to interrupt our own, and we forget that ours have no meaning except inside His. If we keep putting our own wants and desires ahead of God's will, believing in Him without putting our faith into action, we may end up excluded from the banquet. That is the mystery of human free will. God created us with the ability to choose--- even to choose not to follow Him; to refuse His invitation. He does not coerce because He wants our relationship with Him to be a choice. He wants us to accept His invitation because we want to; not because we are forced to. Let's ask our Lord to help us not be like the ungrateful invitees; preferring our own comfortable routines and goals to His great and adventurous plans for us. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us that "the world offers you comfort, but you are not made for comfort; you are made for greatness and good." It will be difficult, but as St. Paul pointed out, we can do all things through Jesus Christ who strengthens us. Perhaps this week we might reflect on the following: 1) what are implications for me of God gathering the unworthy to Himself; 2) has the routine of my life made me indifferent to God's invitation; "Many are invited but few are chosen" what does this saying of Jesus mean for me? Lord, why don't I look forward to heaven as much as I look forward to my favorite pastimes? You spoke so often of heaven, and you suffered so much to open heaven's gates to those who believe in you: why is it so far from my mind? Stir up my gratitude like David's in the psalm. Stir up the virtue of hope in my heart. I never want to be like the ungrateful invitees, preferring my own comfortable routine and little dreams to your great and adventurous plans. Thy will be done, Lord, thy Kingdom come in my heart....
