

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD with Dr. Kathy O'Connor PH.D 24th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reading 1: Isaiah 50:5-9a: Our passage from Isaiah for this weekend comes from the part of the book called the third song of the Servant to the Lord. The verses immediately preceding our passage for Mass emphasizes the servant's docility to the word of God: the servant is depicted as an obedient disciple. Verses 5-6 in our passage speaks of the suffering that the servant's docility has brought him. Throughout his suffering the servant does not utter a word of complaint. St. Jerome saw the servant's docility as a reference to Christ whose "self- discipline and wisdom enabled Him to communicate to us the knowledge of the Father". Verses 7-8 show how determined the servant is: if he suffers in silence it is not out of cowardice but because God helps him and makes him stronger than his persecutors. The final verse is like the verdict of a trial: when all is said and done, the servant will stand tall and all his enemies will be struck down. The evangelists saw the words of this song as finding fulfillment in Jesus, especially what the song has to say about the suffering and silent fortitude of the servant.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 116:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9 (9): The theme of God's help to the suffering servant is echoed in our responsorial psalm. Psalm 116 is the only psalm that begins with the words "I love the Lord". The psalmist loves the Lord, not so much because of some specific favor or blessing that he has received, but because he is sure that God listens to him and takes care of him. Close to death (verse 3) the psalmist appealed to the God of the covenant and God answered his appeal; He saved him (verses 4-6). The psalmist expresses how safe he feels, and he resolves to stay close to the Lord. It is a way of saying not just that he has been freed from his illness but that he lives his life in God's company.

Reading II: James 2:14-18: Our second reading comes from St. James' teaching on faith and good works. This teaching aligns perfectly with the teaching of Jesus recorded in Matthew's gospel: "not everyone who says to me 'Lord, Lord' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven" (Mt 7:21). In the Christian life, therefore, there needs to be complete consistency between the faith we profess and the deeds we do. Actions and works measure the genuineness of the Christian life; they show whether our faith and charity are real. Faith therefore must influence the way a Christian lives his/her life. St. James tells us that when one's works are not in accordance with one's beliefs, then one's faith is dead.

Gospel: Mark 8:27-35: Our Gospel passage this weekend finds Jesus and His disciples traveling north from Bethsaida toward Caesarea Philippi, passing through a mixed Jewish-Gentile region. Mark does not tell us why Jesus would take His disciples on a journey through a largely Gentile region. Perhaps it was to have some time with them away from the crowds that surrounded Him in Galilee. Jesus knew that His disciples did not yet have an adequate understanding of Him and of what He was about. He needed to continue their education and perhaps, some time in a predominately Gentile area, would give Him the opportunity to teach them. Jesus asks His disciples who the general public thinks He is. The disciples tell Him that there are varying opinions as to who He is: John the Baptist, Elijah, or one of the prophets. Jesus then asks His disciples "Who do you say that I am?" This is the central question of Mark's Gospel: who is Jesus? Mark wants his readers to be among the "you" whom Jesus asks, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter says to Jesus, "You are the Messiah". It was an interesting reply because there were different expectations at the time of Jesus of who the Messiah would be and what he would do. Continued on the next page....

The most common expectation was that the Messiah would be a descendant of David, a warrior king who would defeat the enemies of Israel and restore rule to the house of David. So, Peter's profession of Jesus as the Messiah was a very different view than was commonly held. Jesus had never indicated that He was going to overthrow Roman rule and reestablish the dynasty of David. Rather Jesus had devoted himself to teaching, healing, and exorcising, none of which was associated with the popular view of the Messiah. Jesus neither endorsed nor reject Peter's identification of Him as the Messiah. Instead He warns them not to tell anyone about Him. To do so could have been dangerous as the Romans would not be happy with a Messiah who would overthrow them. At the time Mark wrote his Gospel, the Greek word for Messiah had become the common way of identifying Jesus. But when Peter made his profession, the word Messiah had not yet been purged of its political and military connotations so, it would not have been appropriate. Thus, Jesus asks them to not to tell anyone. Instead, He tells the disciples that He would suffer greatly. This was contrary to the understanding that people of Jesus' time had of the Messiah. They were not expecting a suffering Messiah! Yet Jesus would suffer. Not only would He suffer but it was necessary for Him to suffer because it was the Father's will for Him (a reflection back to the suffering servant in Isaiah). He not only tells them He will suffer but that He will be killed. It was inconceivable that the Messiah promised by God would suffer and be killed! But He tells them that He will be raised after three days. Peter is appalled that such a thing should befall Jesus and tells Him so. Jesus rebukes him for thinking as a human instead of thinking as God does. Peter could not see the divine aspects of what Jesus was saying. Jesus also tells the disciples that to be His followers they must also share His destiny. They must take up their crosses and follow Him.

Reflection: "You are thinking not as God does but has human beings do". God's ways differ from our ways, but we need to learn to follow Him and not our own will. Jesus never sugarcoats His call to discipleship: selfdenial and losing our self- centered ways permits us to be faithful to Him. Discipleship is the path to His Kingdom where we will find true life: life in communion with God. Some people reject God because He hasn't eliminated suffering (though the same critics rarely consider how much suffering God does indeed prevent: suffering we don't know about because it never happens). A lot of suffering results from our own free, but misdirected, choices. To eliminate suffering, God would have to eliminate our freedom and He will not do this. God is not intrusive. He does not force Himself on us, rather, He wants us to want to follow Him, even if following Him is not always easy. Think back to the suffering servant from Isaiah and Jesus' obedience even unto death. Jesus never said it would be easy; He just said it would be worth it. Perhaps this week, we might reflect on the following: 1) Who do I say Jesus is; 2) if I had been among Jesus' disciples that day and heard Him speak of His suffering, dying, and rising, how would I have reacted; 3) to what degree is my thinking in line with God's thinking? How can I tell; 4) how firm is my desire to follow Jesus? How absolute is my commitment to Him? Lord, I am beginning to understand the reason you send us crosses: we need to exercise our faith and trust so that those virtues will grow. You never let me bear my crosses alone. You are always beside me carrying the cross with me. Teach me to help my neighbors bear their burdens. You told us that there is more joy in giving than receiving. Teach me to be a giver, to love others: a true Christian.....

In 2015, Pope Francis published his Encyclical Letter Laudato Si'. The Letter is named from the song of praise for creation by Saint Francis of Assisi. In this song, St. Francis

proclaims God's goodness through all of creation. In this encyclical Pope Francis lays out a biblical way of viewing creation. At the core, Pope Francis is saying, "This is what it means to be human." He proclaims that we are not lord of all that we see, but, rather, we are Stewards of God's Creation.

HNOJ is forming a **Laudato Si Circle** which is a group that meets regularly to pray and reflect on how to live out being stewards of God's creation. We will meet on-line at this moment once a month for one hour - the day and time will be determined by what suits best those joining.


