

Jesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the Kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." - Matthew 19:14

THE PREPARATION OF THE GIFTS: THE COLLECTION'S SACRIFICIAL NATURE

Is there any liturgical significance to placing one's offering in the basket? Like nearly all liturgical elements, the Preparation of the Gifts or offertory is rich in significance. The liturgy's "sacramental principle" has inward and otherwise undetectable realities made manifest through sensible signs and symbols. As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) directs, "Even though the faithful no longer bring from their own possessions the bread and wine intended for the liturgy as was once the case, nevertheless the rite of carrying up the offerings still keeps its spiritual efficacy and significance" (73).

The question is, first, what does the Preparation of the Gifts mean, and, second, what is the most suitable way to signify, symbolize, or sacramentalize this unseen reality?

While there is certainly a practical reason for the details of the preparatory rites—bread and wine, vessels and cloths need to be arranged—there is also a spiritual, yet no less real, meaning to the preparation of the altar and gifts.

The gifts that are brought forward—bread, wine, and even monetary offerings—represent the heart of those offering the gifts. The GIRM describes the oblation, the offering of the Eucharistic Sacrifice, in these insightful terms: "in this very memorial, the Church, in particular that gathered here and now, offers the unblemished sacrificial Victim in the Holy Spirit to the Father. The Church's intention, indeed, is that the faithful not only offer this unblemished sacrificial Victim but also learn to offer their very selves, and so day by day to be brought, through the mediation of Christ, into unity with God and with each other, so that God may at last be all in all" (GIRM 79).

The Book of Daniel's story of the three young men in the fiery furnace illustrates well the heart's movement at this point in the Mass. Having been thrown by King Nebuchadnezzar in the whitehot flames, Azariah offers this prayer: "For we are reduced, O Lord, beyond any other nation, brought low everywhere in the world this day because of our sins. We have in our day no prince, prophet, or leader, no burnt offering, sacrifice, oblation, or incense, no place to offer first fruits, to find favor with you. But with contrite heart and humble spirit let us be received; as though it were burnt offerings of rams and bulls, or tens of thousands of fat lambs, so let our sacrifice be in your presence today and find favor before you; for those who trust in you cannot be put to shame. And now we follow you with our whole heart" (3:37-41).

In other words, the only gifts the three young men had to offer to God was their hearts! God hears their prayer, sending His angel to drive out the furnace's flames, "as though a dew-laden breeze were blowing through it. The fire in no way touched them or caused them pain or harm" (Daniel 3:50).

The Preparation of the Gifts signifies our own offering hearts. The priest himself will even pray the words of Azariah after their preparation: "With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by You, O Lord, and may our sacrifice in Your sight this day be pleasing to You, Lord God." He will then command us to pray that his sacrifice and ours "may be acceptable to God the almighty Father."

If the preparation of ourselves to offer our hearts to God is at the "heart" of the Preparation of the Altar and Gifts, then what is the spiritual sacrifice we are called to offer along with the bread, wine, and money? There are at least three ways in which our spiritual sacrifices may be offered at the altar.

- I. The Sacrifice of Bodily Suffering: In Colossians I:24, St. Paul says, "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the suffering of Christ...." What is missing from the suffering of Christ? ...nothing but our participation! When we celebrate the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, we make present the sufferings of Christ on the cross on the altar. When we place our sufferings offered for the good of the world, our suffering is united to Christ's suffering and thus participates in the redemption of the world.
- 2. The Sacrifice of Little Crosses: "Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." (Matthew 16:24-26) Every day we face trials and tribulations. Whether it be a long day of work to support your family, spending time helping the poor, running the kids to soccer practice, volunteering at church, etc., each of these small crosses provide an opportunity for a sacrificial offering. Sometimes we carry these crosses well; other times, not so much. Either way, we place them upon the altar where the sacrifice of Jesus perfects them in God's sight.
- 3. The Sacrifice of Sinfulness: The thought of placing our sinfulness anywhere near the altar, on the surface, seems like the last place we should put them. However, placing our sinfulness at the foot of the altar is the most vulnerable place to put them, before our God. Sin always includes an element of pride and by placing our pride (sin) at the foot of Jesus when He is most vulnerable as a human, dying on the cross, we humble ourselves to the source of our healing.

When we place our money in the basket, literally or through automated means, and we process forward with the bread and the wine, we symbolize a deeper reality of offering our very selves. Our sacrifice united and perfected by the sacrifice of Jesus, offered to the Father, is beautiful in His sight. The result, the most amazing gift the Father can give us, is the healing, strengthening Body and Blood of His Son.

OUR LADY OF LOURDES FEAST DAY: FEBRUARY 11TH

In Lourdes, France, a young peasant girl by the name of Bernadette Soubirous saw the Blessed Virgin Mary a total of 18 times at the Grotto of Massabielle.

On February 11, 1858, the Mother of God first appeared to Bernadette in the town of Lourdes in the Pyrenees Mountains in France. Accompanied by her sister and a friend,

Bernadette went to the grotto of Massabielle on the banks of the river looking for driftwood to sell in order to buy bread for her family. Removing her socks to cross the little stream, she heard a great gust of wind in the stillness and she looked up toward the grotto:

"I saw a lady dressed in white, she wore a white dress, an equally white veil, a blue belt and a yellow rose on each foot."

The beautiful lady smiled at Bernadette and asked her to say her Rosary. Bernadette said her prayers and when she was finished, she looked up and the lady had vanished.

Bernadette felt drawn to the grotto and returned there on the next Sunday. Again, Bernadette saw the beautiful lady. The beautiful lady asked Bernadette to come there every day for fifteen days. She said that she wanted Bernadette to tell the priests to build a chapel there.

On March 25, 1858, the Lady revealed that she was the Immaculate Conception, confirming the dogma that Pope Pius IX defined in his encyclical *Ineffabilis Deus* in 1854. The purpose of her appearing to Bernadette was to warn her to pray and make sacrifices for sinners. One of the things that Mary asked of Bernadette was to dig in the soil beside the grotto. Once Bernadette did as requested, a spring of water gushed forth. This miraculous water saw many miracles of body and soul that still continue to this day.

At the age of 22, Bernadette became a nun and devoted her life to the Blessed Mother, and heeded her request to continue to pray for the conversion of sinners and to live a life in service to God. She died on April 16, 1879, at the age of 36. To this day, Lourdes remains one of the most frequented Christian shrines in the world.







SAINTS CYRIL AND METHODIUS

Saints of the Day: February 14 Patron Saint of Slavic People

After a brilliant course of studies, Cyril (called Constantine until he became a monk shortly before his death) refused the governorship of a district such as his brother had accepted among the Slavic-speaking population. Cyril withdrew to a monastery where his brother Methodius had become a monk after some years in a governmental post. Cyril and Methodius undertook the missionary task.

Cyril's first work was to invent an alphabet, still used in some Eastern liturgies. His followers probably formed the Cyrillic alphabet. Together they translated the Gospels, the psalter, Paul's letters and the liturgical books into Slavonic, and composed a Slavonic liturgy, highly irregular then.

The bishop refused to consecrate Slavic bishops and priests, and Cyril was forced to appeal to Rome. On the visit to Rome, he and Methodius had the joy of seeing their new liturgy approved by Pope Adrian II. Cyril, long an invalid, died in Rome 50 days after taking the monastic habit.

Methodius continued mission work for 16 more years. He was papal legate for all the Slavic peoples, consecrated a bishop and then given an ancient see. When much of their former territory was removed from their jurisdiction, the Bavarian bishops retaliated with a violent storm of accusation against Methodius. As a result, Emperor Louis the German exiled Methodius for three years. Pope John VIII secured his release.

Because the Frankish clergy, still smarting, continued their accusations, Methodius had to go to Rome to defend himself against charges of heresy and uphold his use of the Slavonic liturgy. He was again vindicated. In a feverish period of activity, Methodius translated the whole Bible into Slavonic in eight months. He died on Tuesday of Holy Week, surrounded by his disciples, in his cathedral church.
