Defense seeks time in baby-slaying case

Murder suspect waives speedy-trial right

DAYTON - A woman whom authorities suspect of killing her infant daughter by putting her in a microwave oven waived her right to a speedy trial Tuesday after her attorney said he would need more time to prepare a thorough defense.

Under constitutional guide lines, China Arnold, 26, could have gone to trial by the end of

"It's in her best interests to waive her speedy-trial rights to make sure her defense can be thorough and complete," defense attorney Jon Paul Rion told Montgomery County Common Pleas Judge Jack Davis.

Rion said the case is complex, and he is still gathering details about it. He added that experts needed to be contacted and their testimony scheduled.

Davis did not set a trial date. Arnold showed no emotion

Arnold has pleaded not guilty to a charge of aggravated murder and is being held in jail on \$1 million

bond. Prosecutors have said they will seek the death penalty. Arnold's baby, Paris Talley, died Aug. 30, 2005.

The coroner concluded that the injuries could have been caused only by the baby being cooked in a microwave oven, according to Montgomery County Prosecutor Mathias Heck Jr. Investigators have said evidence that includes highheat internal injuries and the absence of external burn marks on the baby were consistent with a microwave.
