

## FOR ALL PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS

Parish, school communities asked to observe a day of solidarity, prayer and reparation on March 13

Auxiliary Bishop Myron J. Cotta, in a message to the faithful of the Diocese of Sacramento issued March 6, asks parish and school communities to join in a special day of solidarity, prayer and reparation on Friday, March 13, for Christians around the world, especially in the Middle East, who are being persecuted and martyred for their faith in Jesus Christ. "As today's media captures and directs our attention to the persecutions and unbelievable atrocities inflicted upon our Christian brothers and sisters, it is urgent that we take to heart the call to prayer for an end to this horror," Bishop Cotta said.

Bishop Cotta will preside at a Mass offered for all persecuted Christians on Friday, March 13 at 12:10 p.m in the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament, located at 1017 11th St. in Sacramento.

"During this Lent, all parishes throughout the diocese are asked and challenged, as a sign of solidarity, to do our part by offering penance through prayer, fasting and almsgiving for those being persecuted and martyred for their faith in Jesus Christ. Visits to the Blessed Sacrament, adoration and praying the rosary for this intention are encouraged," he noted. "Through the intercession of the <a href="Immaculate Heart of Mary">Immaculate Heart of Mary</a>, let us pray for peace and <a href="reparation">reparation</a>, asking the Lord for his gift of grace and mercy during this most disturbing time facing the world."

In a report released March 6, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) officials who recently traveled to the Middle East say the Syrian refugee crisis -- now totaling nearly 4 million refugees — has reached a "tipping point," in which countries in the region are no longer able to handle the flow of refugees across their borders.

"Without more international support, we will find Syrians fleeing extremists being turned away and forced back to danger," said Anastasia Brown, interim executive director for USCCB's Migration and Refugee Services (MRS). "The global community, led by Europe and the United States, needs to increase its support in order to prevent a humanitarian crisis."

Entitled "Refuge and Hope in the Time of ISIS: The Urgent need for Protection, Humanitarian Support, and Durable Solutions in Turkey, Bulgaria, and Greece," the report looks at the plight of Syrians in the three countries, a growing trek for Syrians attempting to reach Europe.

The report highlights the gaps Syrians face as they attempt to find protection, with many traveling through Greece and Bulgaria on their way to Europe. According to the United Nations, many more are taking dangerous sea journeys in boats to reach the continent.

Of special note is the impact the crisis is having on children, who number as many as 2 million—half the total of Syrian refugees. Among those are unaccompanied children who, according to the delegation, have a special claim on protection.
