

A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The opening of our churches has been a needed spiritual feeding for many of the faithful. Especially for Catholics, the reception of Holy Communion has been longed for and finally satisfied. Although most of us have had the opportunity to make spiritual Communions, the actual reception of the consecrated Host is most desired. For Catholics, Holy Communion is a tangible and absolute encounter with the Lord.

It is true; God is transcendent and therefore is everywhere. It is in today's Gospel, known as the Bread of Life Discourse, that we hear the unfolding of God's specific involvement with us. A great multitude of people gathered in order to listen to the teaching of Jesus. In time, they became naturally hungry for food. Miraculously Jesus multiplies a few fish and loaves of bread to feed everyone.

Five thousand people are overwhelmed by Jesus satisfying their hunger and recall the great miracle where Moses fed their ancestors in the desert with manna from heaven. Jesus reminded them that in each case the provided physical food sustained the people in their biological life, but it is powerless to provide eternal life. But for those who consume Him, they will live forever. Jesus is supernatural food for supernatural life. This mystery reflects the incarnation, where God took flesh

and dwelt among us in actual matter.

In our Gospel, some argued with Jesus that it is impossible to take seriously what Jesus said: "He who feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood has life eternal and I will raise him up on the last day." And many of them left Him. Even today, some argue that Jesus' words here and at the Last Supper are to be taken symbolically or metaphorically. Jesus doesn't back down with some explanation but solemnly assures His listeners that His follower must eat His Body and drink His Blood to have eternal life.

A careful study shows that whenever Jesus used metaphors, His listeners seem to have been aware of it. For example when Jesus said "I am the vine and you are the branches (John 15) or "I am the sheep gate (John 10). Whenever there was confusion, Jesus clarified it with an explanation. It is clear from Chapter 6 of St. John's Gospel that Jesus' audience understood Him literally in their response by staying with or departing from Him.

From the beginning, the Church believed that the Eucharistic elements of bread and wine become the glorified body and blood of Jesus. St. Paul gives us the earliest writing of the New Testament and in his first letter to the Corinthians he asks: "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" In the same letter, Paul warns the nascent church in Corinth not to eat and drink unworthily: "Therefore whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord" (1 Corinthians 11).

Today's feast of Corpus Christi celebrates the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. We believe that in the sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist are contained truly, really and substantially the body and blood together with the soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, and consequently the whole Christ. As Catholics, may we recognize the true presence of God, totally, in the Eucharist. May this specific encounter be the spiritual food that sustains us in the many difficulties of our day as it promises us eternal Life in Him.






* Statement from Bishop Malooly on the Killing of George Floyd and Aftermath

May 30, 2020 — (Wilmington, Delaware) — The Most Reverend W. Francis Malooly, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington has issued the following statement on the killing of George Floyd in Minnesota and the resulting demonstrations and violence that has erupted across the United States.

"I express my sincere condolences to the family of Mr. Floyd. I pray for the repose of Mr. Floyd's soul, and that God will send comfort and consolation to his family. While I support those who seek justice through peaceful demonstrations, we must keep in mind what Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. taught us about non-violence. It is easy to lash out in anger when confronted by injustice, but the easy thing to do is often not the right thing to do. Please join me this Pentecost weekend in prayer that the Holy Spirit will guide us to lasting, peaceful solutions to the problems we face as a society. Racism, brutality, murder, violence, bigotry, and disenfranchisement are not Gospel values and must be condemned in the strongest terms. Let us proceed as brothers and sisters, beloved children of God."

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question:

Why do Catholics pray to Mary and the saints?

Answer:

One of the statements of faith we make when we pray the Nicene Creed and the Apostles Creed is that we believe in "the communion of saints." The Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us that this communion (another word for community) includes all the faithful on earth, the souls in Purgatory, and the blessed women, men, and children who are in heaven. This teaching is grounded in our belief that, through Baptism, we are united with Christ and to one another with bonds that are stronger even than death.

And so from the time of the early Church, Christians have turned to other believers for prayers and assistance, including those who have gone before us, confident that God hears the prayers of all of His children. While we ask the saints (and one another) for prayers and support, we remember that the saints join us in prayer. But it is God who blesses and sanctifies us.

When we think of Mary and the saints in heaven, we have to remember that we can turn to them for intercession and assistance because they were faulted, limited human beings, just like us. This means that they are able to understand our struggles, doubts, fears, joys, and hopes. But as we learn their stories, we can also begin to recognize that they stand out in the history of the Church because they persevered in their commitment to follow Christ. Whether they were ordained, vowed religious, martyrs, husbands, wives, or even children, they show us that holiness is possible. We cannot only follow their example but also benefit from their prayerful support.


Our devotion to the saints and gratitude for their witness, prayers, and protection should also be an inspiration for us, especially when we become aware of the needs of others or when others ask us to pray for them. This total giving of self to loved ones cannot be trumped by flowery words or material gifts that are fleeting. This is the ultimate in love. This is the love Jesus had for us on the way to his Passion, at the institution of the Holy Eucharist. This is the love he has for us daily in the celebration of the Mass on altars in every church, in every city, in every nation on earth. No one can give more. No one can ask for more. This is the true heart of Christian stewardship.

If you take the time to gaze upon your God in the simplest of forms and begin to reflect on what has actually taken place with bread and wine becoming the presence of the Divine, then you can begin to understand true humility, sacrifice, and love. And when you have the privilege to take that Real Presence into your body at the meal where you are an honored guest, you become one with the One who is the embodiment of stewardship.

Then, you must ask yourself, "How can I even begin to reflect the love that I have encountered at this feast?" The answer is you can begin with the simple actions of the day: where will you go, whom will you meet, and in what work will you partake? Jesus Christ has shown that the greatest gift ever given can be disguised in this world in a piece of bread. By joining your body to his, he can now transform human hearts, not by grand acts, but by everyday acts, by everyday people, practicing Everyday Stewardship.
