THE SACRAMENT OF THE SICK:

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

First Reading: Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41

The high priest chastised Peter and the other apostles for continuing to preach when they had been ordered to stop. Peter replied he would rather obey God than men, considering God's power even over death. They are again warned to stop speaking of Jesus, and then freed.

Second Reading: Revelation 5:11-14

John had a vision of many angels and all the living creatures of the world gathered around a throne. The angels cried out that the slain Lamb was worthy of receiving power, glory and praise. Then every creature on earth called out praise to God and the Lamb, and the elders fell down and worshipped.

Gospel: John 21:1-19

Jesus appeared to the disciples for the third time since His resurrection while they were fishing. They hadn't caught anything, and then Jesus advised them to cast their net from the other side of the boat. When they did this, they caught a great number of fish. Jesus then asked Peter three times, "Do you love me?" When Peter said he did, Jesus asked him to tend and feed his sheep.

Consider & Reflect

"When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread, Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish you just caught.' So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore, full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them: 'Come, have breakfast.' And not one of the disciples dared to ask him, 'who are you', because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish... This was the third time..."

As He fed the multitude, as He invited the disciples today, so we too are invited to the meal He has prepared for us. The descriptive chapter of John's gospel can help us meditate and live the gospel scene. We are at the seashore, perhaps with a gentle breeze and lapping waves. The aroma of frying fish on the barbecue and charcoal fire fills the air. Jesus asks Simon Peter to share some of his catch. Using familiar words, like those at the Eucharist, He took the bread and fish, said a blessing and gave it to them. What a breakfast!

Jesus continues to invite us to His meal, the Eucharist. He knows our hunger and need. He provides what will allow us to grow in our spiritual lives, yet we unfortunately rush or don't consider what a great gift and privilege to meet Him, not on the lake shore, but in our parish church. Like the disciples we do not ask who are you, for we know who is both our host and guest.

The Holy See

Jubilee of Musical Bands May 10 - 11, 2025

The hearing and making of sound are part of the human experience. Music has an important, natural role for humanity, and sacred music adds a sacramental quality to this.

Pope Francis had a great love and appreciation for music and the work of musicians. In an audience in November 24, 2018, he said to an international gathering of choirs: *"Your music and your song are a true instrument of evangelization insofar as you witness to the profoundness of the Word of God that touches the hearts of people, and allows a celebration of the sacraments, especially of the Holy Eucharist, which makes one sense the beauty of Paradise."*

Artists, the more conscious they are of their "gift," are led all the more to see themselves with eyes able to contemplate and give thanks, and to raise to God a hymn of praise. This is the only way for them to come to a full understanding of themselves, their vocation and their mission.

The Church needs musicians. How many sacred works have been composed through the centuries by people deeply imbued with the sense of the mystery! The faith of countless believers has been nourished by melodies flowing from the hearts of other believers, either introduced into the liturgy or used as an aid to dignified worship. In song, faith is experienced as vibrant joy, love, and confident expectation of the saving intervention of God.

St. Cecilia (c.200-c.235, feast day November 22) is the patron of music and musicians. It is recounted that while the musicians played at her wedding, Cecilia sang in her heart to the Lord.

KNIGHT'S KORNER #18

People make assumptions that all lives are "well lived". This is not true. We fool ourselves. When we go to a funeral, we hear all the eulogies about a life "well lived" even though we all know different. When we are young and often well into our teens, we hear the phrase about "mis-spent" youth. That refers to a period in a person's life where they may have been unproductive, lazy, and uncaring.

But you don't have to do something egregious to "miss live" your life. You can do it in very ordinary ways. It usually happens so subtly the people around you wouldn't even notice because they likely are misleading their lives in exactly the same ways. All it takes is consistently being mediocre, lazy, procrastinating, consumed by material possessions and being self-centered. The heartbreaking part in "miss living" your life is that you will never get to see or experience the life that God envisioned for you. You miss out on the life that God wanted to give you. We go through life as if a "well lived" life was guaranteed. It's not. But you can change. I have "mis-lived" my life, but I am trying to change.

A well lived life is built the same way a "*miss lived*" life is built - one choice at a time. Every choice either builds or erodes character. Make your next choice the one that belongs in a "*well lived life*". People can ruin their lives; lives that are filled with regret and tragedy. Most people see that only at the end of their lives.

Nobody can avoid their appointment with death. When death approaches, the person you have become meets the person you could've been. It is a humbling encounter. Don't wait for it. Meet the person you are capable of becoming one day at a time. Use your thoughts, words, choices, and actions to close the gap between who you are today and who you're capable of being. Envision the person God created you to become and build toward that vision of your future self, one choice at a time. The choice to listen to the voice of God is such a choice. God will use the needs, talents and desires He created you with, to fill your life with passion and purpose. Deciding to listen to God is the most important choice you can make.
