The United Methodist Women, who generously support our St. Ambrose Food Pantry, have invited our community to participate with them in collecting items to benefit the needy. Any of the items listed below can be brought to the office, including the Sunday office.

Pill Bottles Throughout the year, the United Methodist Women collect clean, empty prescription bottles as well as bottles from over the counter medicines. Please wash the bottle and remove all labels. Matthew 25: (not to be confused with our own Matthew 25 ministry) who accepts donations of empty plastic pill bottles for inclusion in shipments of medical supplies and for shredding and recycling. Their pill bottle program fulfills the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for our environment.

Acceptable collection items include:

Prescription and over-the-counter pill bottles

Large and small pill bottles
Pill Bottles with and without secure caps
(child resistant)

Pill bottles that are not appropriate to include with shipments of medical supplies are recycled for cash that goes towards Matthew 25: Ministries' programs.

Eye Glasses Lions Institute collects prescription eyeglasses and sunglasses that no longer fit your prescription. Donate glasses and change someone's life. Imagine if you could help a child read. An adult succeed in his job. A senior maintain her independence. And provide a community with more opportunities to grow and thrive.

Everyday, their recycled eyeglass programs do all of this and more. Throughout the year, Lions volunteers collect used eyeglasses and deliver them to regional Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers (LERCs). LERC volunteers clean, sort by prescription strength and package the glasses. Recycled glasses are distributed to people in need in low and middle income communities where they will have the greatest impact.

Cell Phones/Chargers Victims of domestic violence throughout Albany County can benefit from used cell phones and chargers to help ensure their safety and ability to communicate.

All of the above items can be brought to the office including the Sunday office. The Sunday office weather permitting can be found outside on Sunday mornings after Mass and in inclement weather in the parish center hallway. As a reminder you can get a Mass card, ask questions and gather information. If you are new to our parish- WELCOME and we invite you to stop by the Sunday office.
