

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Do you know when you were baptized? If you don't, I challenge you to find out!

Catholic churches keep careful records of the sacraments you receive. Of the various sacrament registry books, arguably the most important is the baptismal registry. You may have been Confirmed, made your First Communion, or been married at a different church, but all of that information is sent back to the parish where you were baptized and that information is placed in the baptismal registry. It's humbling to go through the records here at St. Ambrose as they tell a story of a parishioner's walk with God. No matter where they may have ended up in their lives, these parts of a person's life find their way back to the parish of Baptism. If you'd like to find out when you were baptized, simply contact the parish where you were baptized and ask. If the church no longer exists, you can contact the diocese and find out where the records ended up. Know that somewhere your name is written down and you are remembered as a Catholic Christian. That also includes those we know and love. whether they practice anymore or not. They always matter and they are always remembered.

We are in the habit of remembering our birthdays. It's a time where parents remember the circumstances of their child's birth and where we treat someone as a gift to this world. In the Gospels, Jesus talks about two births (John 3:3). There is our first birth, our natural birth. But Jesus also introduces the idea that we can also be "born from above" (sometimes translated "born again"). In this second birth, a person becomes a new creation. Things have followed a natural course up to the point of this second birth but now things are different. This change is so dramatic that it can only be characterized as a second birth.

What does this second birth look like? For us, that second birth is enshrined in the moment we are baptized. We can talk about the effects of Baptism: it cleanses us of original sin (and, if we're baptized when we're older, any sins we may have committed), it gives us sanctifying grace (that is God alive within us, accomplishing His good work in us), and it makes us members of God's family the Church. We believe that it leaves an indelible mark on our souls. Baptism makes us different, whether we realize it or not.

very dramatic. We are used to seeing babies baptized but in the Baptism of adults we see the whole drama of a person's salvation unfold. Imagine the scene in an early Christian community when a person of ill-repute would come to the waters of Baptism. Their past misdeeds might be known to all. As they are brought to be baptized, they are carrying the weight of their former life. They have gone through a period of preparation where they learned the Christian way of life and have amended to live differently. Baptism in the early Church (and in some churches today) was often done by immersing someone into a pool of water. The imagery would have been stark. As they entered the water, they put to death the old self and its sinfulness. As they arise they become a new creation. This moment was considered so holy and unalterable that it really was expected that the person would not sin seriously ever again. In fact, many (like the Emperor Constantine) delayed their Baptism until their death bed, almost as a kind of insurance policy! The current practice of the Sacrament of Reconciliation came from the Church seeking to apply Jesus' mercy to people once they had

That drama is not readily apparent to those of us baptized as infants. The reality is that all of us are trying to live up to the reality of our Baptism. In Baptism, we were made saints. I'm sure most of us don't consider ourselves saints! I think of St. Paul, who would call his audience "saints" (Romans 1:7)...and then persuade them to turn away from sin. In the Church, we are all saints trying to live up to the name. In the life of the Church we formalize the moments where we turn away from sin (in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, in the penitential rite at the beginning of Mass), but day in and day out we should always be working (with God's help!) to become that person who shined so brightly as they emerged from the waters of Baptism. When we see someone being baptized, part of us should want to recover that same state within us, cleansed from sin, filled with God's help, and enmeshed in Jesus' Body, the Church.

I challenge you to celebrate your Baptism, to recover what it means, and to live up to its promise. You were made into a new creation and all of us are in need of being renewed.


