4TH SUNDAY OF EASTER

MAY 8, 2022

A week and a half ago I participated in a webinar called "Speaking of the Pharisees - A Virtual Interreligious Dialogue". I had been looking forward to it for a long time and it didn't disappoint. Jews and Christians from around the world came together to discuss the legacy of Christian preaching on the Pharisees. The Pharisees are mentioned around a 100 times in the New Testament, primarily in the Gospels but also in Acts of the Apostles and once in St. Paul's letters where he tells us that he was, in fact, a Pharisee (Phil 3:5).

Sadly, Pharisees are normally considered to be mere foils for Jesus. Stereotypically, they get it wrong where Jesus gets it right. Even today, the word "Pharisee" connotes either hypocrisy or an unmerciful scrupulosity to follow God's Law. In fact, when many people think "Pharisee" they normally think "the bad guys".

This webinar sought to shatter many of the stereotypes surrounding the Pharisees for a few reasons. One major reason is that throughout history, hostility towards the Pharisees has translated into hostility towards Jewish people on the part of Christians. The Pharisee movement eventually became the leading movement in Judaism after the destruction of the Jewish Temple and the expulsion of the Jews from Jerusalem. They gave way to a community that was led by rabbis and sought to observe the Torah within the context of the traditions that had accumulated around them.

The other reason is that the old stereotypes are complicated by the New Testament itself. Besides St. Paul, we are given sympathetic treatments of the Pharisees in Nicodemus (John 3:1 and who helps give Jesus an honorable burial in John 19:39) and Gamaliel (Acts 5:34). Amidst Jesus' denouncement of the scribes and Pharisees in Matthew 23, he does seem to speak favorably about their tithing practices (Matthew 23:23), even amidst condemnations. Jesus dines with Pharisees (Luke 7:36) and, even in their fierce disagreements, is recognized as a teacher among them (Matt 12:38) and, therefore, an equal. In Matthew 23:2-3, Jesus even says "The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat; therefore, do whatever they teach you and follow it but do not do as they do, for they do not practice what they teach." What's notable here is that Jesus affirms their role in Jewish

society and the validity of their teaching, even while there are great disagreements.

The webinar acknowledged a sad reality in our history, of a parting of ways that happened between the movement that became modern Judaism and the movement that became Christianity (it's good to remember that both traditions emerged from a common milieu and developed into what they're known as today). In fact, our first reading this Sunday talks about a definitive moment in that break. The early Christian evangelists (who were all Jewish) spread their message of the crucified and risen Lord to others of a common Judean heritage. The synagogue was the place of assembly in Judean towns or places where Jewish people resided outside of the land of Israel. It's where ideas were discussed and argued about. In the second reading. Paul and Barnabas win over many diaspora Jews living in Perga, which was a town in the region of Pamphylia in Asia Minor. But by the next week they are rejected and Paul and Barnabas realize that they needed to extend their mission to the Gentiles, to those not of Jewish-descent.

How do we remember this moment as Christians? On one hand, we Gentiles received God's call. If the mission of the apostles did not extend past the Jewish people, we would be hapless pagans. But on the other hand, many of us lost our relationship to those who Pope John Paul II called "our elder brothers in the faith of Abraham". The Jewish people did not always do favorably under the Roman Empire, but when Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire, many Jewish people experienced real suffering and persecution fueled by pervasive stereotypes.

In 1965, the Second Vatican Council produced a declaration on the relationship between the Church and non-Christian religions called *Nostra Aetate*. The document was born from a desire to heal the centuries-long rift that existed between Judaism and Christianity. It acknowledged our common bond as God's people and decried all forms of antisemitism. For me personally, my own faith has been enriched by Jewish teachers and writers who helped me understand the common heritage we all share. We should always seek dialogue and mutual understanding as to better live as God's children.


