# COMPASSION

"A Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight."

LUKE 10:33

15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Why do we have rules in matters of faith? What happens if we break the rules?

Today's Gospel reading is the famous parable of the "Good Samaritan" that Jesus tells. The contours of the story are familiar: a man is beaten and robbed by bandits and left for dead. Two people pass him by but a third person, a Samaritan, tends to his wounds and brings him to an inn, promising the innkeeper that he'll pay him back anything owed for taking care of the man.

When we peel back the layers of the story a little, we see that the two people who passed the man by are a priest and a Levite. We naturally think of our own conceptions of priests and figure that a holy person should know better and that they have missed the point of what God wants.

I want to peel back a few other layers to this story because this story has a number of dimensions that can be lost on us as we are further removed from Jesus' native culture. I think that once we look at these dimensions we can better understand how we are supposed to apply this to our lives.

One key to unlocking this passage is the nature of the Law of Moses (the Torah) that all of Israel was required to follow. A great many of the laws had to do with ritual purity and impurity. In short, someone who wanted to approach God at his holy Temple in Jerusalem had to be ritually pure. Someone could contract impurity any number of ways. Certain bodily fluids or having leprosy made someone impure and until those things we cleared up and necessary purifications were made (sitting in water for prescribed amount of time), you were not fit to approach God in his Temple. This meant that you could not give the required offerings to God, which included offerings that made satisfaction for or expiated sin. To be in a state of impurity was to be cut off from fully participating in worship. You could still pray personally but not do some of the bigger things. Even if you weren't going to Jerusalem to make these offerings (normally during the three great pilgrimage festivals: Passover, Pentecost, and Tabernacles), you were expected to remain in a state of purity. Different Jewish groups at the time of Jesus had very strong opinions about remaining in impurity. One group, the Essenes, considered their communal meals to be a place where one had to be ritually pure to participate.

It's important to note that impurity could not be entirely avoided. It wasn't a sin and it probably didn't come with accompanying feelings of guilt, but something still needed to be corrected. For our purposes here, it's helpful to know that touching a corpse was a great source of impurity. For the Pharisees, even standing on a grave or falling under

the shadow of a corpse could lead to impurity. Touching a corpse could not always be avoided and the accompanying purifications would handle that but it's important to note that priests in particular were barred from touching a corpse unless it was a direct family relative. At this time in history, Levites (the tribe of Israel from which the priests came) often lived as the priests did.

This tells us why they avoided the man, passing by on the other side. He may have been dead and even his shadow might cause them to be impure. If they were impure they could not minister in the Temple and, in effect, to touch the man would be to be barred from God.

Jesus here is forcing his listeners to rethink what is most essential in their religious practices. Can their practices prevent one from the essential commandments listed earlier in the Gospel to love God and love neighbor?

We should not be quick to judge the priest and the Levite because they were doing only what they were taught was right. The problem, according to Jesus, is that God weighs these priorities differently. While honoring the rules or laws of faith, we must not neglect the imperative for mercy and hospitality.

Jesus' point that it was a Samaritan who was merciful would've been offensive to his listeners. To them, the Samaritans were an impure group of people. They were hated because of their mixed breed and corrupted worship. They had their own notions of impurity. But by telling us that it was a Samaritan who showed mercy, Jesus forced his listeners to rethink their religious system and its priorities as well as rethink the status of those who were considered hated outcasts. It really is brilliant.


There's another point. In the Gospels, Jesus tells us that by ministering to the poor and marginalized we are really ministering to him. Looking at Jesus' parable in this way we can say that the Samaritan, in ministering to the man who may be dead or dying, encountered God in a way that was not possible even in the Temple. This encounter with God is dynamic and intimate. This ability to meet God in the suffering of others or in our own suffering is one of our faith's greatest gifts.

Lastly, I just want to think about this: do you feel that your Catholic faith keeps you from showing mercy to certain kinds of people? If so, think of this story. Our faith is right and true and we should never compromise our convictions. But that does not mean that we withhold love, mercy, or friendship. To do so would be to fail to meet our Lord.




