FEAST

"Come to the feast."

MATTHEW 22:4BC

28TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

I keep a list in my head of parts of the Bible that I think every Christian should know and the first reading this Sunday from Isaiah is one of those readings. It's read only on this Sunday of our 3-year cycle but it's sometimes used for funerals. Let me explain why I think it's important.

Isaiah describes a scene where God serves a meal to his people. The location of the meal is his mountain, that is Jerusalem. The meal is the finest imaginable "a feast of rich food and choice wines, juice, rich food and pure, choice wines (Isa 25:6).

He is not a waiter, he is "YHWH of hosts" or Yahweh of the heavenly armies. But he serves his people who have experienced death and devastation by war.

Who is at this meal? "All peoples." Does anything else happen at this meal? Yes. "On this mountain he will destroy the veil that veils all peoples, that web that is woven over all nations" (25:7). One commentator notes that this is likely a veil that would be worn while in mourning. Moreover, "the LORD GOD will wipe away the tears from every face; the reproach of his people he will remove from the whole earth". Moreover, "he will destroy death forever" (25:8).

This imagery is taken up again in Revelation chapter 21 with the creation of the new heaven and new earth at the end of time. Our reading from Isaiah 25 is woven together with other Old Testament allusions that, together, describe God making his home among humanity so he may console them, destroying even death, mourning, crying, and pain.

For us, it's an image of heaven. What do we hope happens to us when we die? We hope that all of our pain and suffering is over and that on the other end of death is life eternal. Here, heaven is a great banquet that God has prepared for us. We sit and enjoy as God serves us, dwelling in peace and security. It's no wonder that this is used as a reading at funerals.

In our tradition, this imagery is also eucharistic. It's precisely this meal that we believe we celebrate when we are at Mass. We are fed a heavenly meal, prepared by God, and nourished by the very stuff of heaven. When we pray the Our Father, we are used to saying the line "give us this day our daily bread" (Mat 6:11). The word for "daily" is the Greek epiousion and that translation is debated. Another possible translation is this: "give us today our bread for tomorrow". In this sense, "tomorrow" can mean the end of time. In other words, feed us with that heavenly meal today...something that we believe happens when we receive communion.

In this passage is our hope as Christians, as

people who have to face suffering and the reality of death. If we could all look forward to a time when God really does make everything okay, I think we can face our lives more bravely. Look forward to a day where the God who made you consoles you with a dinner he prepared himself.

Our Gospel reading adds a few wrinkles to this that I think are worth considering. Jesus' parable describes the coming Kingdom as being a meal, only where those who are initially invited reject the invitation. The messengers are ignored, harmed, or killed as the prophets who were sent to Israel were. I think this passage can be uncomfortable because it imagines who might not be at the great feast of heaven. Jesus describes three kinds of people in this regard, those who want no part of it, those who are hostile to the message, and those who are unprepared. As listeners, we can wonder at why anyone wouldn't want this banquet. But we are like this. Even if we were to throw an amazing party, there will always be people who don't want to go.

I'd like to consider why someone might not want to be a part of God's banquet. Maybe the party was explained to them poorly, that what was described to them did little justice to what would actually happen once they got there.

Maybe some of the people who were going to be there had been bad to them or had otherwise excluded them, even though the invited person has as much a right to be there as they have.

Maybe they don't like who else is included, the "bad and good alike" described by Matthew (22:10). Maybe they'd prefer if some people were left out.

Maybe no one had introduced them to the host, who relies on his messengers to get the word out. Maybe if someone introduced them, they would go.

Maybe they have anxiety because crowds aren't their thing but would perhaps feel more comfortable if they knew a friend was there.

That leaves the one person that the king ejected because he wasn't wearing a wedding garment, with the ominous warning "many are invited, but few are chosen" (22:11-14). It might seem arbitrary, but Pope St. Gregory the Great speculated that such a person is someone who tries to enter into the banquet without baptism, without faith, or without love. It's a stark reminder that merely showing up isn't enough, that actions aren't enough. To come to the banquet means coming with a transformed heart so that it might be a true Eucharist where all are bound together by love.



This song was recorded by Vince Gill (among many others), and lyrics were written in 1955 by Jill Jackson-Miller (1913-1995), with the music written by her husband Sy Miller (1908-1971). She was apparently suicidal before she wrote the song, and before God's peace broke through to her.

"When I attempted suicide (in 1944) and I didn't succeed," she said, "I knew for the first-time unconditional love—which God is. You are totally loved, totally accepted, just the way you are. In that moment, I was not allowed to die, and something happened to me, which is very difficult to explain. I had an eternal moment of truth, in which I knew I was loved, and I knew I was here for a purpose."

Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me. Let There Be Peace on Earth, the peace that was meant to be.


With God as our Father, brothers all are we.
