

29TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Our Gospel reading this Sunday is fairly well known, remembered for Jesus' clever reply to "repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" when asked if the people should pay taxes or not (Matt 22:21). Our takeaway might be to acknowledge that God should get his due. We might see a tacit acceptance of the reality of paying taxes. But I think there's more going on in this short exchange that's worth exploring.

First, this scene occurs in the "end game" of Jesus' life and ministry and we're following the trajectory to his crucifixion. We'll notice that Jesus' exchanges with the various Jewish groups claiming to speak for the tradition will be more intense. Jesus is making people angry as his opponents lay out traps for him. The Pharisees will figure into the next three Sunday readings, who plot "how they might entrap Jesus in speech" (22:15). It's interesting that they pose this question along with the Herodians. people who supported the reign of the Herods, themselves being puppet rulers for the Romans and who had a vested interest in the people paying taxes. The Pharisees at once may collaborate with the status quo while still desiring that a messianic king in the line of David would rule as God had promised. All this to say that these aren't likeminded parties conspiring against Jesus.

Knowing that this exchange is the fruit of a previous plot, we can judge their words to Jesus as flattery and at times ironic, saying "Teacher, we know that you are a truthful man and that you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. And you are not concerned with anyone's opinion, for you do not regard a person's status" (21:16). Though the Pharisees are considered masters, they are pretending to be students to better humiliate Jesus with their impossible question, a common practice that would increase the status of the questioner. Notice that these same words could just as easily come from one of Jesus' disciples. This shows us a dangerous position we might even find ourselves in. Our words can confess the truth about Jesus in our prayers while our intentions might be far from him.

Jesus asked whether it was lawful or not to pay the census tax. His questioners know the answer but they know that either of the answers that they envision Jesus giving would cause him derision by one side or the other. If he says they should not pay taxes he would be seen as those revolutionaries who claimed the same before him, and Rome would deal with him accordingly. But if he agrees that they should pay taxes he would be seen as a collaborator with the Empire, opposing what most people felt regarding the matter.

Instead of giving a straight answer, Jesus tells them to show him a coin. It's worth considering what was on that coin, a silver denarius. We see from the examination of the coin that it has the image of the emperor, in this case Tiberius Caesar. Because it had an image of the emperor, it was something of a taboo because Jewish sensibilities avoided producing images of the emperor. Locally minted coins did not have such images on them. The inscription on the coin would have said "TIBERIUS" CAESAR, SON OF THE DIVINE AUGUSTUS". In other words, it's the image of the son of a "god", as the previous Caesar had been declared a god (and as Julius Caesar had been before him). The opposite of the coin would've depicted Augustus' wife Livia as the goddess Roma. Merely by asking his questioners to produce the coin, he has shamed them. Why would they as the devout among the people be seen carrying an idolatrous coin?

It's here that Jesus' response to give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God can be fully appreciated. The mere reality of that coin reveals what is wrong with the world. Emperors carry on as gods while the pious collaborate with their establishment, just as they conspire against the one God sends as his Messiah to usher in the reign of God. Each of us can become guilty of this. We can accept the status quo without considering how it wrongly frames the boundaries between what it considers to be God's domain and its own. Moreover, the status guo will often encroach on to what had been previously seen as God's domain. Once, not long ago, our society marked out our holy days, for example. Stores were closed and sports avoided the times of worship. This has obviously changed.

But notice the subtlety of it all. It was society that told us what belonged to God and what belonged to itself. And society constantly changes its mind, shifting with the breeze. And yet, what is God's domain? Is it certain hours of certain days (which almost no ones respects anymore)? Is it certain practices in accordance with certain laws? Is it only parts of our life rather than the rest?

Or is rather God the Lord of it all? In reality, the coin that the Pharisees and Herodians produced was God's coin, minted from silver issued from the earth he created. So was the domain claimed by Rome and all rulers who laid such a claim both before and after them. It's easy to forget this. As God's Messiah and as true Son of God, Jesus is the Lord of coins, lands, Pharisees, Herodians, Caesars and all things. If he is Lord than all domains are part of his Kingdom. What's at stake here is not paying lip service to God but an entire way of life. In his Kingdom there is true peace and all are provided for. It's a better way, far better than what those who pass themselves off as gods and kings can imagine.


Magnificat.

MUSIC IN THE CHURCH BY BILL HAYES

Prayer of St. Francis

Sebastian Temple (1928–1997) wrote the music for this prayer and is one of the most influential folk Mass composers from the era immediately following the Second Vatican Council. He grew up in South Africa and later (1951) moved to London, where he worked for the BBC on news broadcasts relating to South Africa. After moving to America in 1958, he converted to Catholicism and joined the Franciscan Third Order. Based in Los Angeles, he began composing music, both secular and religious, including music for the folk Mass.


He is best remembered for "The Prayer of St. Francis" (Make Me a Channel of Your Peace), one of the most popular songs for worship ever written. The song was part of his first collection of liturgical music, Happy the Man, songs about St. Francis of Assisi. "The Prayer of St. Francis" was sung by the Westminster Abbey Boys Choir at the funeral of Princess Diana in 1997 (it was one of her favorite songs). It is an anthem of the Royal British Legion and is usually sung every November at the Service of Remembrance at Royal Albert Hall, London. It was sung by Sinéad O'Connor, who died earlier this year, on the Princess Diana tribute album.

1.Make me a channel of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me bring your love. Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord, and where there's doubt, true faith in you.

2. Make me a channel of your peace. Where there's despair in life, let me bring hope. Where there is darkness, only light, and where there's sadness, ever joy.

Oh, Master, grant that I may never seek, so much to be consoled as to console. To be understood as to understand. To be loved as to love with all my soul.

3. Make me a channel of your peace. It is in pardoning that we are pardoned, in giving of ourselves that we receive, and in dying that we're born to eternal life.
