

Election of Godparents: One Godparent is required. Two Godparents—one male, one female may be appointed. Godparents must be practicing Catholics, 16 years of age or older, fully initiated into the Church (Baptized and Confirmed) at least 6 months before baptism.

A non-Catholic may stand as a Christian Witness. Former Catholics are ineligible. Godparents must obtain a *Certificate of Eligibility* from their pastor; Christian Witnesses must provide a copy of their baptismal record. These documents and baptismal stipend must be received by the parish office one week before the day of Baptism.



Deacon Claude's Reflection for the Third Sunday of Easter

Today's first reading from Acts of the Apostles places a strong emphasis on the Apostles' teaching. So, let's consider this a moment... God has created us with a brain that gives us the power to learn. Teaching and learning is a continual cycle that helps stimulate our minds; helps us grow in understanding and appreciation of our world; and helps us to support our families.

In this same reading, we also hear about a clash that arises from the perception of others about the teaching; what is being taught; and who is doing the teaching.

Notice how teaching what Jesus taught flustered the religious leaders: "We gave you strict orders, did we not, to stop teaching in that name? Yet you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and want to bring this man's blood upon us."

To the Jewish leaders, the Apostles' teaching was a threat to their beliefs, culture, economy, and way of life. By killing Jesus, they had hoped to kill off Jesus' teaching. Two different perspectives about the same teaching. To one group, a false teaching arising from a false messiah. To the Apostles and followers though, the truth presented by Jesus, the Way, Truth, and Life.

2,000 years later, we are part of a similar clash. Our culture asks challenging questions:

- Does the Catholic Church present the true teachings of Jesus in His name?
- Why do so many of these teachings clash with the
- Do the successors to Peter and the Apostles have the credibility to teach?

Just like we should never stop learning each day of our lives, so that we grow and improve, the same can be said for our spiritual lives and for our relationship with Jesus. These need to be taught, nurtured, and grow.

However, as Catholics we tend to put on the brakes once we have received the sacrament of Confirmation. The primary reasons seem to be:

- We incorrectly believe there is nothing else to learn.
- We have more important things to do with our time.
- The Church is irrelevant, out of date and does not speak to our times and the culture in which we live.
- Probably the capper or exclamation point, the Church has lost its credibility to teach. How can we believe our leaders, some of whom have contributed directly or indirectly to the many scandals making headlines?

So, what are we to do? What does this mean for us? First, and we must pray. Pray for ourselves; what does God want to teach us? What does He want for our lives? Pray that God will help us grow in holiness.

Pray, too, for the Church, the guardian of Jesus' teaching, which is under fire from within and without and is undergoing a significant trial. However, as in the Church's past, God uses trial as periods of cleansing. Take heart too that Jesus said the Church and its teaching will last until the end of time.

I'm reminded of a story about Napoleon. As his armies were conquering Europe, Napoleon is reported to have said to Church officials, "I will destroy your Church." Cardinal Consalvi, of the papal court, responded, "If in 1,800 years we clergy have failed to destroy the Church, do you really think that you'll be able to do it?"

So then pray also for bishops, priests, deacons and religious. God knows we are not perfect, and in many ways, we are flawed. Pray that by God's grace we may indeed be living and holy examples. That we may teach as Jesus taught.

Secondly, we must give the Church a chance to teach. Today, very many Catholics receive religious education from the secular media. We should go beyond this. If we are followers of Jesus, then don't we want to know what He really teaches?

We need to ask ourselves, "OK; I read this or heard this. Now let me understand directly from the Church's mouth, not only what it teaches, but why it teaches what it does."

Is there a Church teaching that stumps you? That you find out of touch with the world? That you find too different as to be acceptable? It is OK to question, as long as we seek answers. Some of the great saints were full of questions. St. Augustine immediately comes to mind.

Give the Church a chance. Find out why she teaches what she does. Start with that one major issue, concern or doubt you have. Who knows where it might lead? It could lead to a devotion to a particular saint and trying to follow his or her example; or it could lead to being a better spouse or parent. God only knows. But only you and I can take that first step.

All we need are open hearts and minds. And isn't that what teaching and learning are all about? Having open hearts and minds that we may grow.

In the Gospel today, in effect we hear Jesus reinforcing that commission to Peter and the Apostles to teach. Peter needed that threefold reinforcement after his three-fold denial. "Feed my sheep." Friends, let's give the Church the chance to feed us with Christ's teaching.

St. TITUS OUTREACH PROGRAM

St. Titus Parish has been making casseroles for St. John's Hospice in Center City Philadelphia for over 25 years. *On an average day, SJH serves 57 casseroles to hundreds of residents and day service guests. Casseroles are donated by 47 parishes in the area including our parish.*

The casseroles are the "Main Course" of a complete, hot meal that is served to hundreds of God's poor and homeless who come to St. John's for their daily bread. Please do not feel restricted to the recipes which can be found on the recipe sheets near the casserole pan in the vestibule. Your favorite recipe is most welcome! So are store bought casseroles such as Stouffers or Oncor. St. John's provides us with pans and lids for your dishes. If you provide your own, please use a standard "half tray". Each casserole serves 6-8 men. Each month, St. John's picks up the dishes from our freezer.

Here are some useful hints:

- Please bring your casseroles frozen to church and put them in the freezer located in the vestibule of the Social Hall. If the door to the Social Hall is locked, please leave the casserole with a sacristan or maintenance.
- Prepare your recipe so that it can be eaten with a plastic "spork" (a combination spoon and fork).
- Please mark the lid with the main ingredients and date you prepared your casserole.

A Foley artist is a craftsman who re-creates sounds for film, video, and other media in post-production to enhance audio quality. The artist replaces sounds that cannot accurately be recorded on set. Foley studios have viewing screens and props, as well as recording equipment to record sounds as they watch the film. Holy Rosary's eighth graders wrote and filmed their own short movie scenes. They then performed custom-made sound effects for the movie. For example, the students poured water into a cup in which they had drilled holes to reproduce the sound of rain. They banged a rubber ball on a desk to replicate a heartbeat. Other examples included shaking a towel to simulate blowing wind, and banging a large, plastic container to mimic thunder. The eighth graders recently completed a unit on sound and applied their knowledge of the properties and behaviors of sound to their videos. They filmed a scene and then inserted their original sound effects in post-production. The artists shared their films with their classmates and all got rave reviews. Titles of their productions were: *Jungle, A Walk in the Park, Beach Day Gone Wrong,* and *Locked In*. Oscars could be in their futures, and we knew them when!!

HOLY ROSARY REVIEW Fourth Grade's Dissection of Owl Pellets

Holy Rosary's fourth grade is part of the Archdiocese's STREAM Initiative. The students and Ms. Rae Morrow were quite excited when a kit entitled Stalking Our Prey arrived at school. It contained a series of lessons on predatory relationships among animals. One of the lessons involved dissecting the owl pellets of barn owls. Barn owls swallow their prey whole. They feed mostly on rats, voles, mice, shrews, and moles. Owl pellets are the undigested part of the owl's food and can include fur and bones. The owls then regurgitate this material.

Our fourth graders excitedly plunged into the dissection of the pellets as they investigated what the owls had eaten. They removed the fur and analyzed the bones. The students primarily found vole, mice, and shrew skulls. They used a bone identification chart to determine the type of rodent. Bones that they found included the humerus, radii, femurs, and even some teeth. A special guest was invited to observe this lesson, but she ended up putting on her gloves, using the tweezers and magnifying glass to get right in on the action.

After completing the balance of the lessons, the students will use their findings to create exhibits for the Archdiocesan STREAM Expo at Pope John Paul II on April 27th.
