POSTLUDE

#### The Shape of the Liturgy

"Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven"

Although written in 1834, the hymn "Praise, my soul, the King of heaven" remains to our own day one of the most popular and widely sung hymns in English-speaking Christendom. Perhaps that is because of the transparent beauty and power of both its words and the hymn tune to which it is sung. The words were written by the Anglican clergyman Henry Francis Lyte (1793-1847), and are based on Psalm 103.

In the nineteenth century, the pressure was on hymn writers to keep their versifications of psalms as close to the Scriptural text as possible. However, The Rev. Mr. Lyte felt that he could maintain the spirit of these beautiful texts of the psalms, while using his own words, probably with the intention of helping the reader see the psalms in a deeper light. One such paraphrase is our processional hymn for Mass today, "Praise, my Soul, the King of Heaven."

Lyte's text speaks to us of the love of God and of our dependence on Him in clear and easily remembered words. Think of what might happen if we woke up every morning with these words on our lips: "Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, evermore His praises sing." How would our lives change if we walked through our days singing "Alleluia!" or through our times of sorrow declaring that we rest in the gentle hand of God? This is a text with beautiful imagery and thoughtful prose that, like Psalm 103, gives us words to praise our God with heart, mind, and soul.

This hymn is most commonly sung to the uplifting tune "Lauda Anima" ("Praise, my soul"), which was written in 1868 as a setting for Lyte's words by the English organist and composer John Goss (1800-1880). Although an avid composer of hymns and anthems, Goss is best remembered for "Praise, my soul." Hymn authors, composers, and organists also usually have good senses of humor, and sometimes they are needed. On one occasion when Mr. Goss was organist and choirmaster at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, when, forgetting that pedal stops were pulled, he absent-mindedly stepped on the pedals of the organ during a service of Morning Prayer, before he quickly realized that he was the cause of the alarming thunderings which echoed through the cathedral, frightening the congregation and putting a temporary pause in the sermon.

(On a personal note, the present writer once had a similar experience. In 1963 at the University of Texas, and to receive my grade in organ for the semester, I went into the practice room to play for the jury [the organ faculty of the Fine Arts College]. I walked in, greeted everyone, sat down on the organ bench, swung my legs around, and like Mr. Goss, forgetting pedal stops were pulled, put my feet on the organ pedals, producing an overpowering thundering in the small room. To which my organ teacher calmly piped up and said, "Mr. Ramsey, what is your second selection?" I hope Mr. Goss was not as embarrassed as I was! And hopefully we both learned our lesson – never step on the pedals.)

#### SYNOD ON SYNODALITY: DIOCESAN PHASE

#### **BEGINS THIS SUNDAY**

Pope Francis has invited the entire Church to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium."

A basic question prompts and guides us: How does this "journeying together," which takes place today, allow the Church to proclaim the Gospel in accordance with the mission entrusted to her; and what steps does the Spirit invite us to take in order to grow as a synodal Church? Addressing this question together requires listening to the Holy Spirit, who like the wind "blows where it wills; you can hear the sound it makes, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes," remaining open to the surprises that the Spirit will certainly prepare for us along the way.

Our Diocese will formally open the "diocesan phase" of the synod process this Sunday, October 24, with Bishop Cahill celebrating the Eucharist in our Cathedral of Our Lady of Victory. Our Synod will be coordinated by Jennifer Vincent and Dr. Glenn Hunter with the assistance of Aldo Camacho and Deacon Tran Dinh. They will help organize and facilitate the consultation of faithful throughout the diocese in the upcoming months.

As the Holy Father expressed: "... We recall that the purpose of the Synod, and therefore of this consultation, is not to produce documents, but to "plant dreams, draw forth prophecies and visions, allow hope to flourish, inspire trust, bind up wounds, weave together relationships, awaken a dawn of hope, learn from one another and create a bright resourcefulness that will enlighten minds, warm hearts, give strength to our hands..." These are expansive goals that only through our turning to the power and trusting the guidance of the Holy Spirit can we accomplish.






